BOARD OF TRUSTEES

Mission: To serve the people of the State of Arkansas by providing management and control of Arkansas State University campuses in Jonesboro, Beebe, Newport, Mountain Home, and Heber Springs; degree centers of the University at sites in Blytheville. Forrest City, and West Memphis; and other academic programs throughout the state.

The Trustees of Arkansas State University serve as a board of management and control. In this capacity, the Trustees hire the Arkansas State University president to serve as the Chief Executive Officer, approve the curriculum of the institution, annually approve an operating budget, establish policies for the efficient operation of the institution, and approve those matters which require participation of the governing board of the university. Trustees' duties include: appointing, supporting, and assessing the performance of the president; maintaining the clarity of the mission of Arkansas State University; approving long-range plans: approving the educational program: ensuring the well-being of the students, faculty, and staff; ensuring strong financial management; approving significant faculty and staff appointments and dismissals; ensuring adequate resources for quality programs; preserving institutional autonomy; interpreting the campus to the community; and interpreting the needs of society to the campus.

The governor of Arkansas appoints members of the Board of Trustees for a period of five years. The Senate of the General Assembly must confirm each appointment.

The President of Arkansas State University is the chief executive officer of the university system and the Jonesboro campus. The president is appointed by the Board of Trustees and is directly responsible to the Board of Trustees for the conduct of the institution, the development of institutional goals, the formulation of policies, and the overall well-being of the university.

The President's Office has established its values as integrity, dedication, excellence, cooperation, and a collegial work place.

Strategies to fulfill the President's Office mission include: Providing personal assistance to every person who contacts the office. Treating each person with whom we come in contact with respect and as a unique individual. Reflecting pride in who we are and what we do.

The Arkansas State University System includes campuses in Jonesboro (Craighead County), Beebe (White County), Mountain Home (Baxter County), Newport (Jackson County), and the Technical Center at Marked Tree (Poinsett County). The Jonesboro campus offers degrees at the doctoral, specialist, master's, bachelor's, and associate levels through eleven colleges. The Beebe, Mountain Home, and Newport campuses offer associate degrees with bachelor's degrees being offered through ASU -Jonesboro, ASU - Jonesboro offers bachelor's degree programs and upper level courses through institutions in Blytheville, Forrest City, and West Memphis; and associate's degrees through the ASU Technical Center. ASU also has sites in Heber Springs (Cleburne County), Paragould (Greene County), and Searcy (White County).

Arkansas State University - Jonesboro Mission Statement:

We pursue and share knowledge within a caring community that prepares students in challenging and diverse ways to become more productive global citizens.

ASU-Jonesboro is the second largest institution of higher education in the state. The arts and drama departments and the historical museum on campus provide a cultural background for the city of Jonesboro. Located in Northeast Arkansas, Jonesboro is the trade, cultural, and medical center for a market area of 500,000 people.

HISTORY

Arkansas State University was established in 1909 as a state agriculture school. The institution opened as a vocational high school in 1910 and changed to State Agricultural and Mechanical College in 1925. Authority to extend the curriculum, offer senior college work, and grant degrees was given to the institution by the legislature in 1925. Senior college work was initiated in 1930, and the first bachelor's degrees were granted in 1931. In 1933, the legislature changed the name of the college to Arkansas State College. Master's degree graduate programs were initiated in 1955 and Doctorate degree programs were added in 1999. Arkansas State College was granted university status in January 1967.

PROGRAMS OF STUDY

Arkansas State University offers programs at the doctoral, specialist, master's, bachelor's, and associate degree levels through the colleges of Agriculture, Business, Communications, Education, Engineering, Fine Arts, Honors, Humanities & Social Sciences, Nursing & Health Professions; Sciences & Mathematics; University College; and the Center for Regional Programs. Additionally, ASU offers bachelor's degree programs at Mid-South Community College in West Memphis. ASU-Beebe, ASU-Mountain Home, and ASU-Newport; and offers associate degree programs at ASU Technical Center in Marked Tree.

Arkansas State University - Beebe Mission Statement:

By providing comprehensive training and technical support for business and industry, the institution contributes to the economic development of Arkansas. Cultural enrichment activities are provided to enhance the quality of life for the citizens of the local communities.

HISTORY

ASU-Beebe first opened in 1927 as Junior Agricultural School of Central Arkansas. In 1931, the institution was renamed the Junior Agriculture College of Central Arkansas. The college became a campus of Arkansas State College in 1955 and in 1967 changed to Arkansas State University-Beebe Campus. ASU-Beebe has established a strong reputation of providing quality, affordable instruction and service programs to the surrounding communities. The Beebe campus is located 31 miles north of Little Rock and 17 miles south of Searcy on U.S. Highways 67/167.

In addition to the original campus in Beebe, ASU-Beebe operates campuses in Heber Springs, Searcy, and since 1965, has operated programs at the Little Rock Air Force Base. Act 426 of 1999 of the Arkansas Legislature authorized the creation of ASU-Heber Springs as A Center of ASU-Beebe. In July 2003, Foothills Technical Institute in Searcy merged with ASU-Beebe and is now referred to as ASU-Searcy, A Technical Campus of ASU-Beebe. With the combined and integrated capabilities of the four locations, the institution is prepared to provide quality education and service programs to its students and the communities. With the programs provided on the Beebe campus by ASU-Jonesboro, students now have the opportunity to achieve their educational goals through the Master's degree level, providing a unique opportunity for students and the community.

PROGRAMS OF STUDY

ASU-Beebe offers certificates of proficiency, one-year technical certificates, two-year associate degrees, and a strong developmental program in English, math, and reading. Through its advanced technology division, programs are available with emphasis on the fast changing needs of a modern industrial society. Advanced technology programs offered include computer systems technology, computer-aided drafting/design, industrial technology, John Deere agriculture equipment technology, medical laboratory technology, and a Bachelor of Technology offered by ASU-Jonesboro. With the merger of the technical campus in Searcy, ASU-Beebe is now able to provide the full spectrum of occupational technology programs as a part of the institution's mission. These additional programs include automotive technology, auto body. machining technology, industrial electronics, air conditioning, and additional allied health programs such as licensed practical nursing, emergency medical technician, and paramedics.

Arkansas State University-Mountain Home was established on July 1, 1995 due to the commitment of the residents of Baxter County and the cooperation of the Department of Higher Education and Arkansas State University in Jonesboro.

Additionally, the construction of a new campus accommodating 1,200 students offers an even more appealing setting for students to pursue higher education.

PROGRAMS OF STUDY

It can be designed to meet the General Education requirements for those individuals planning to transfer to a four-vear institution in order to complete the bachelor's degree. Associates of Applied Science are offered in Business Technology, Crime Scene Investigation, Criminal Justice. Funeral Science. Hearing Healthcare. Information Systems Technology, Law Enforcement Administration, Opticianry, Paramedic Technology, and Respiratory Care. Associates of Arts are offered in General Education and Teaching. The SREB system for categorizing postsecondary education institutions is based upon a number of factors relevant to determining resource requirements. Differences in institutional size (number of degrees), role (types of degrees), breadth of program offerings (number of program areas in which degrees are granted), and comprehensiveness (distribution of degrees across program areas) are the factors upon which institutions are classified. Other factors relevant to determining resource requirements such as cost differences among programs or externally funded research are not taken into account in the SREB system.

CATEGORIES

Institutions are assigned to categories for a report year using the previous academic year's data on program completions. To keep the statistical comparison groups relatively stable over time and to assure that institutions change categories only when their measures on a criterion are relatively stable, institutions change categories when they meet the criterion for another category for the third consecutive year.

- ♦ Four-Year 1: Institutions awarding at least 100 doctoral degrees distributed among at least 10 CIP categories (2-digit classification) with no more than 50 percent in any one category.
- ♦ Four-Year 2: Institutions awarding at least 30 doctoral degrees distributed among at least 5 CIP categories.
- ♦ Four-Year 3: Institutions awarding at least 100 master's, education specialist, post-master's, or doctoral degrees with master's, education specialist, and post-master's degrees distributed among at least 10 CIP categories.
- ♦ Four-Year 4: Institutions awarding at least 30 master's, education specialist, post-master's, or doctoral degrees with master's, education specialist, and post-master's degrees distributed among at least 5 CIP categories.
- ♦ Four-Year 5: Institutions awarding at least 30 master's, education specialist, post-master's, or doctoral degrees.

- ♦ Four-Year 6: Institutions awarding less than 30 master's, education specialist, post-master's, or doctoral degrees.
- ◆ Two-Year 1: Institutions awarding associate degrees and offering college transfer courses with FTE enrollment of 5,000 or more; some certificates and diplomas may also be awarded.
- ♦ Two-Year 2: Institutions awarding associate degrees and offering college transfer courses with FTE enrollment of between 2,000 and 4,999; some certificates and diplomas may also be awarded.
- ♦ Two-Year 3: Institutions awarding associate degrees and offering college transfer courses with FTE enrollment of less than 2,000; some certificates and diplomas may also be awarded.








FIRST-TIME FRESHMAN REMEDIATION ASSESSMENT BY ETHNICITY












Transfer Students - In-State Transfers Among Undergraduates



AFFILIATION:

Arkansas State University fields 16 sports - seven for men and nine for women - in NCAA Division I, beginning in 2004. Arkansas State University's football program competes in NCAA Division I-A, the highest level for NCAA football.

CONFERENCE:

ASU belongs to the Sun Belt Conference in all sports.

ACADEMICS:

- ◆ASU's 2004 graduation rate for student-athletes ranked second in the Sun Belt Conference. This ranked ASU as highest among SBC's football-playing institutions.
- ◆The most recent NCAA data (1997-98 cohort) reflected a 59 percent overall graduation rate for student-athletes, the highest rate in ASU history.
- ♦ All six women's tennis players had GPA's above 3.50, one with a 4.00 in 2003-04.
- ♦17 of 23 women's soccer players had GPA's above 3.00, two with a 4.00 in 2003-04.
- ♦Seven of eleven women's volleyball players had GPA's above 3.00, one with a 4.00 in 2003-04.

TEAMS:

Football

- ◆Eleven victories in football over the last two years (2002-03) were the most in consecutive seasons since 1986-87.
- ♦Corey Williams was selected in the sixth round of the 2004 draft by the Green Bay Packers, and Jon Bradley signed as a free agent with the Philadelphia Eagles.
- ♦A home football attendance record of 30,427 was set when ASU hosted the University of Memphis on September 18, 2004
- ◆Average football attendance of 17,488 at Indian Stadium in 2003 was the highest in ASU history. There were several crowds of over 20.000 in 2003.

Baseball

♦In 2004. ASU Baseball set an attendance record with 700plus in the game with ASU vs. the University of Mississippi. ◆Brad Hayes became ASU Baseball's career doubles leader in 2004 and was selected in the 12th round of the MLB Draft by the Kansas City Royals.

Basketball - Men's

- ♦Men's basketball averaged over 5,000 fans per game for the eighth straight season in 2003-04.
- ◆Dewarick Spencer and J.J. Montgomery became the first men's basketball duo in school history to score at least 500 points each in a season in 2003-04.

Basketball - Women's

- ♦Women's basketball earned a share of the 2003-04 Sun Belt Conference East Division crown, the best regular season finish by an ASU women's basketball team thus far.
- ♦Brian Boyer was named 2003-04 Sun Belt Conference Women's Basketball Coach of the Year.
- ♦The Lady Indians women's basketball team returned to the postseason for the first time since 1999-2000 with a WNIT invitation.
- ♦Women's basketball averaged over 1.000 fans per game for the 11th straight season in 2003-04.
- ♦ASU drew the third-largest crowd of 2,193 among 16 firstround WNIT games for women's basketball in 2004.

Bowling

♦ASU added bowling as the number 16th sport overall and ninth sport for women's intercollegiate athletics in 2004, the most sports in ASU history.

Golf- Men's & Women's

- ♦Entire men's golf team participated in the NCAA Regional in 2000, 2001, and 2002,
- ♦Women's golf team won a Sun Belt Conference Championship in 2000.
- ♦Women's golf had its first individual participant in history to compete in the women's golf NCAA Tournament.
- ♦ASU hired Chris Adams in the spring of 2002 to take over the women's golf program.

Soccer - Women's

- ♦A new era in women's athletics began in August of 2000 when ASU began competition in women's soccer.
- ◆Soccer competed in 2001 in a brand new facility.
- ◆The young sport is in its' fifth season of competition. New head coach Jason Wharton took over the program in Januarv 2004.

Tennis - Women's

◆Team. doubles, and individuals have ranked regionally and nationally in the last six seasons.

◆Team selected to Intercollegiate Tennis Association All-Academic Team in 2001 (team must have cumulative grade point average of 3.2 or above).

Track/Cross Country - Men's & Women's

- ◆Beginning in 2004. ASU will compete at a new Track and Field Complex, to be shared with the Health, Physical Education, and Sports Sciences (HPESS) Department.
- ♦In men's outdoor track and field, Candon Powell set a school and conference record in the hammer throw and Greg Belger competed in the NCAA Outdoor Track and Field Championships in the 110-meter high hurdles.
- ♦ Produced six Olympians in the last decade, Al Joyner, Earl Bell, Patterson Johnson, Jeff Hartwig, Chat Harting, and Kellie Suttle. ASU has produced nine Olympians overall, one world record holder, and four American record holders.

Volleyball - Women's

- ♦Conference champions seven of the last eleven years.
- Four time NCAA participant and two time NIVC participant.
- ◆Twenty-one wins in 2003 was the highest total since 1999 for women's volleyball.

- For 2004-05, ASU Athletics has the first FM flagship station for all games in four sports (football, men's basketball, women's basketball, and baseball) in ASU history.


Athletic Administration - Jonesboro Campus






ASU Employees are assigned to a primary occupational activity category according to the following EEOC* definitions:

Faculty - All persons whose specific assignments customarily are made for the purpose of conducting instruction, research, or public service as a principal activity and who hold academic rank titles of professor, associate professor, assistant professor, instructor, lecturer, or any equivalent.

Executive/Administrative/Managerial - All persons whose assignments require primary (and major) responsibility for management of the institution, or a customarily recognized department or subdivision thereof. Assignments require the performance of work directly related to management policies or general business operations of the institution, department, or subdivision, etc. Assignments in this category customarily and regularly require the incumbent to exercise discretion and independent judgement and to direct the work of others.

Professional/Non-Faculty - All persons employed for the primary purpose of performing academic support, student service, and institutional support activities, whose assignments would require either college graduation or experience of such kind and amount as to provide a comparable background.

Technical/Paraprofessional - All persons whose assignments require specialized knowledge or skills which may be acquired through experience or academic work, such as offered in many 2-year technical institutes, junior colleges, or through equivalent on-the-job training.

Clerical/Secretarial - All persons whose assignments typically are associated with clerical activities or are specifically of a secretarial nature.

Skilled Craft - All persons whose assignments typically require special manual skills and a thorough and comprehensive knowledge of the processes involved in the work, acquired through on-the-job training and experience or through apprenticeship or other formal training programs.

Service/Maintenance - All persons whose assignments require limited degrees of previously acquired skills and knowledge and in which workers perform duties which result in or contribute to the comfort, convenience, and hygiene of personnel and the student body or which contribute to the upkeep and care of buildings, facilities, or grounds of the institutional property.









The Dean B. Ellis Library, centrally located in an eight-story building, functions as an educational center for the community. The Library of Congress classification system is used for the arrangement of books, and an online catalog provides access to the book collection. The library meets the informational needs of the university by offering a variety of services. A staff of 14 professional librarians and 23 support personnel acquires, organizes, and services the collection. Reference librarians assist users in locating information and in the use of the library. The reference staff also offers an active library instruction program which reaches numerous university classes. The library provides access to hundreds of online databases and search services via links on the library's web site. Materials that are not contained in the library's collection are accessible by interlibrary loan through the OCLC network.

Meal plans are mandatory for all residence hall students and may only be changed prior to the end of the first week of the semester. On the 5-Day meal plan, students may enter the Dining Hall unlimited times Monday through Friday. On the 7-Day meal plan, students may enter the Dining Hall unlimited times each day of the week. The 5-Day \$100 Flex Plan adds 100 declining balance points to the 5-Day meal plan, while the 7-Day \$50 Flex Plan adds 50 declining balance points to the 7-Day meal plan. The Flex Plan gives the student the flexibility of 925 declining balance points. The declining balance points may be used in the Acansa Dining Hall, Food Court, or the Twin Towers store. All declining balance points will rollover to the next semester.




Jonesboro Campus - Fiscal Year 2004
