BOARD OF TRUSTEES

Mission: To serve the people of the State of Arkansas by providing management and control of Arkansas State University campuses in Jonesboro, Beebe, Newport, Mountain Home, and Heber Springs; degree centers of the University at sites in Blytheville, Forrest City, and West Memphis; and other academic programs throughout the state.

The Trustees of Arkansas State University serve as a board of management and control. In this capacity, the Trustees hire the Arkansas State University president to serve as the Chief Executive Officer, approve the curriculum of the institution, annually approve an operating budget, establish policies for the efficient operation of the institution, and approve those matters which require participation of the governing board of the university. Trustees' duties include: appointing, supporting, and assessing the performance of the president: maintaining the clarity of the mission of Arkansas State University; approving long-range plans; approving the educational program; ensuring the well-being of the students, faculty, and staff; ensuring strong financial management; approving significant faculty and staff appointments and dismissals: ensuring adequate resources for quality programs; preserving institutional autonomy; interpreting the campus to the community; and interpreting the needs of society to the campus.

The governor of Arkansas appoints members of the Board of Trustees for a period of five years. The Senate of the General Assembly must confirm each appointment.

The President of Arkansas State University is the chief executive officer of the university system. In 1998, the ASU Board of Trustees approved the recognition and designation of the Arkansas State University System. The ASU System includes campuses in Jonesboro (Craighead County), Beebe (White County), Mountain Home (Baxter County), Newport (Jackson County), and the Technical Center at Marked Tree (Poinsett County). The Jonesboro campus offers degrees at the doctoral, specialist, master's, bachelor's, and associate levels through eleven colleges. The Beebe, Mountain Home, and Newport campuses offer associate degrees with bachelor's degrees being offered through ASU - Jonesboro. ASU - Jonesboro offers bachelor's degree programs and upper level courses through institutions in Blytheville, Forrest City, and West Memphis; and associate's degrees through the ASU Technical Center. ASU also has sites in Heber Springs (Cleburne County), Paragould (Greene County), and Searcy (White County).

ASU-Jonesboro is located in Northeast Arkansas, Jonesboro - a trade, cultural, and medical center for a market area of more than a half million people.

HISTORY

Arkansas State University was established in 1909 as a state agriculture school. The institution opened as a vocational high school in 1910 and changed to State Agricultural and Mechanical College in 1925. Authority to extend the curriculum, offer senior college work, and grant degrees was given to the institution by the legislature in 1925. Senior college work was initiated in 1930, and the first bachelor's degrees were granted in 1931. In 1933, the legislature changed the name of the college to Arkansas State College. Master's degree graduate programs were initiated in 1955 and Doctorate degree programs were added in 1999. Arkansas State College was granted university status in January 1967.

Since 1909, the institution that evolved into ASU-Jonesboro has been served by eleven chancellors/presidents.

In March 2001, the state legislature approved the merger of Delta Technical Institute with Arkansas State University to produce ASU Technical Center (ASUTC).

The major purpose of this institution is to provide affordable, comprehensive, and high quality instruction and service programs. University transfer and technical programs are available to students at the associate degree and certificate levels. In addition to the Beebe campus, instruction is also available at education centers at ASU-Searcy, ASU-Heber Springs, Little Rock Air Force Base, and through other off-campus locations. Instructional programs beyond the associate degree are available on the Beebe campus from ASU-Jonesboro.

An open admission policy encourages the enrollment of both traditional and nontraditional students. The institution recognizes the uniqueness of each student and provides support programs designed to assist students in determining and achieving their educational, personal, and occupational goals. By providing comprehensive training and technical support for business and industry, the institution contributes to the economic development of Arkansas. Cultural enrichment activities are provided to enhance the quality of life for the citizens of the local communities.

HISTORY

ASU-Beebe first opened in 1927 as Junior Agricultural School of Central Arkansas. In 1931, the institution was renamed the Junior Agriculture College of Central Arkansas. The college became a campus of Arkansas State College in 1955 and in 1967 changed to Arkansas State University-Beebe Campus. ASU-Beebe has established a strong reputation of providing quality, affordable instruction and service programs to the surrounding communities. The Beebe campus is located 31 miles north of Little Rock and 17 miles south of Searcy on U.S. Highways 67/167.

In addition to the original campus in Beebe, ASU-Beebe operates campuses in Heber Springs, Searcy, and since 1965, has operated programs at the Little Rock Air Force Base. Act 426 of 1999 of the Arkansas Legislature authorized the creation of ASU-Heber Springs as A Center of ASU-Beebe. In July 2003, Foothills Technical Institute in Searcy merged with ASU-Beebe and is now referred to as ASU-Searcy, A Technical Campus of ASU-Beebe. With the combined and integrated capabilities of the four locations, the institution is prepared to provide quality education and service programs to its students and the communities. With the programs provided on the Beebe campus by ASU-Jonesboro, students now have the opportunity to achieve their educational goals through the Master's degree level, providing a unique opportunity for students and the community.

PROGRAMS OF STUDY

ASU-Beebe offers certificates of proficiency, one-year technical certificates, two-year associate degrees, and a strong developmental program in English, math, and reading. Through its advanced technology division, programs are available with emphasis on the fast changing needs of a modern industrial society. Advanced technology programs offered include computer systems technology, computer-aided drafting/design, industrial technology, John Deere agriculture equipment technology, medical laboratory technology, and a Bachelor of Technology offered by ASU-Jonesboro. With the merger of the technical campus in Searcy, ASU-Beebe is now able to provide the full spectrum of occupational technology programs as a part of the institution's mission. These additional programs include automotive technology, auto body, machining technology, industrial electronics, air conditioning, and additional allied health programs such as licensed practical nursing, emergency medical technician, and paramedics.

In 1992, the Mountain Home Technical College agreed to seek affiliation with Arkansas State University-Jonesboro to form a branch campus. On July 1, 1993, Mountain Home Technical College became Arkansas State University Mountain Home Technical College.

Arkansas State University-Mountain Home was established on July 1, 1995 due to the commitment of the residents of Baxter County and the cooperation of the Department of Higher Education and Arkansas State University in Jonesboro.

ASU-Mountain Home has an open door admissions policy. This policy is designed to enhance access to educational opportunities. Standards of quality are maintained, and students are required to remove deficiencies before entering certain programs or courses.

Nestled in the beautiful Ozark Mountains, 156 miles north of Little Rock, the environment at ASU-Mountain Home encourages free expression, leadership, and innovation. Additionally, the construction of a new campus accommodating 1,200 students offers an even more appealing setting for students to pursue higher education.

PROGRAMS OF STUDY

It can be designed to meet the General Education requirements for those individuals planning to transfer to a fourvear institution in order to complete the bachelor's degree. Associates of Applied Science are offered in Business Technology, Crime Scene Investigation, Criminal Justice, Funeral Science, Hearing Healthcare, Information Systems Technology, Law Enforcement Administration, Opticianry, Paramedic Technology, and Respiratory Care. Associates of Arts are offered in General Education and Teaching. The Center currently offers bachelor's degrees in Criminology, Early Childhood Education, Management, Middle Level Education, and Nursing. Master's degrees are offered in Business Administration, Educational Leadership, and Elementary Education.

HISTORY

Arkansas State University-Newport (ASUN) has been in continuous operation since August 1975. Prior to being named ASU-Newport, the campus was known as White River Vocational Technical School. In 1991, the Arkansas Legislature passed Act 1244 which merged White River Vocational Technical School with ASU-Beebe. In 1992, it became ASU-Beebe/Newport and in 1997 became ASU-Newport. The 83rd General Assembly of the Arkansas Legislature passed Act 297 into law on February 19, 2001, creating a separate budget appropriation for ASUN effective July 1, 2001. The Higher Learning Commission of the North Central Accreditation Association approved the college for Initial Accreditation for stand-alone status for five years in April 2002. The college received a recommendation for continued accreditation for ten years in November of 2006.

PROGRAMS OF STUDY

The SREB system for categorizing postsecondary education institutions is based upon a number of factors relevant to determining resource requirements. Differences in institutional size (number of degrees), role (types of degrees), breadth of program offerings (number of program areas in which degrees are granted), and comprehensiveness (distribution of degrees across program areas) are the factors upon which institutions are classified. Other factors relevant to determining resource requirements such as cost differences among programs or externally funded research are not taken into account in the SREB system.

CATEGORIES

Institutions are assigned to categories for a report year using the previous academic year's data on program completions. To keep the statistical comparison groups relatively stable over time and to assure that institutions change categories only when their measures on a criterion are relatively stable, institutions change categories when they meet the criterion for another category for the third consecutive year.

- ♦ Four-Year 1: Institutions awarding at least 100 doctoral degrees distributed among at least 10 CIP categories (2-digit classification) with no more than 50 percent in any one category.
- ♦ Four-Year 2: Institutions awarding at least 30 doctoral degrees distributed among at least 5 CIP categories
- ♦ Four-Year 3: Institutions awarding at least 100 master's, education specialist, post-master's, or doctoral degrees with master's, education specialist, and post-master's degrees distributed among at least 10 CIP categories.
- ♦ Four-Year 4: Institutions awarding at least 30 master's, education specialist, post-master's, or doctoral degrees with master's, education specialist, and post-master's degrees distributed among at least 5 CIP categories.
- ◆ Four-Year 5: Institutions awarding at least 30 master's, education specialist, post-master's, or doctoral degrees.

- ♦ Four-Year 6: Institutions awarding less than 30 master's, education specialist, post-master's, or doctoral degrees.
- ♦ Two-Year 1: Institutions awarding associate degrees and offering college transfer courses with FTE enrollment of 5,000 or more; some certificates and diplomas may also be awarded.
- ♦ Two-Year 2: Institutions awarding associate degrees and offering college transfer courses with FTE enrollment of between 2,000 and 4,999; some certificates and diplomas may also be awarded.
- ♦ Two-Year 3: Institutions awarding associate degrees and offering college transfer courses with FTE enrollment of less than 2,000; some certificates and diplomas may also be awarded.

Geographic Origin of Total Enrollment








Geographic Origin of International Students




Full-Time Equivalent Enrollment (FTE)*


Semester Credit Hour Production (SCH)












FIRST-TIME FRESHMAN REMEDIATION ASSESSMENT BY ETHNICITY





AFFILIATION:

Arkansas State University fields 16 sports - seven for men and nine for women - in NCAA Division I. Arkansas State University's football program competes in NCAA Division I-A, the highest level for NCAA football.

CONFERENCE:

ASU belongs to the Sun Belt Conference in all sports.

ACADEMICS:

- ♦The most recent NCAA data reflected a 52.0 percent overall graduation rate for student-athletes, which ties the second highest in ASU history. This rate marks the first time in history that ASU posted three consecutive overall graduation rates for student-athletes above 50 percent.
- ♦In women's bowling, four sophomores and one junior were named to the National Tenpin Coaches Association Academic All-America team for 2005-06.
- ♦For the third straight year, baseball and women's tennis received Sun Belt Conference Team Academic Awards.
- ♦ Women's basketball player Amber Abraham was named to the ESPN The Magazine First Team Academic All-District VI by CoSIDA in February 2006. Abraham also is the recipient of the 2006 Sun Belt Conference Sporting Behavior Award.
- ◆ASU's women's soccer team won the NSCAA/Adidas Women's Team Academic Award for the third straight year. The team posted a 3.22 overall grade point average.

TEAMS:

- ♦ASU played the 2006 season on a new ProGreen artificial playing surface at Indian Stadium. The surface was installed in the spring and summer of 2006 and is one of several major football facilities featured in the November issue of Athletic Business magazine.

- ♦ Josh Yates captured All-American and All-Region honors. ♦Yates and Brett Kinning were named All-Sun Belt Conference in 2006.
- ♦A new picnic area has been constructed at Tomlinson Stadium and will be enjoyed by fans in 2007.
- ◆The Indians defeated 18th ranked Ole Miss in 2006. ASU Coach Keith Kessinger, a graduate of Ole Miss, is 6-2 now against his alma mater.



ASU Employees are assigned to a primary occupational activity category according to the following EEOC* definitions:

Faculty - All persons whose specific assignments customarily are made for the purpose of conducting instruction, research, or public service as a principal activity and who hold academic rank titles of professor, associate professor, assistant professor, instructor, lecturer, or any equivalent.

Executive/Administrative/Managerial - All persons whose assignments require primary (and major) responsibility for management of the institution, or a customarily recognized department or subdivision thereof. Assignments require the performance of work directly related to management policies or general business operations of the institution, department, or subdivision, etc. Assignments in this category customarily and regularly require the incumbent to exercise discretion and independent judgement and to direct the work of others.

Professional/Non-Faculty - All persons employed for the primary purpose of performing academic support, student service, and institutional support activities, whose assignments would require either college graduation or experience of such kind and amount as to provide a comparable background.

Technical/Paraprofessional - All persons whose assignments require specialized knowledge or skills which may be acquired through experience or academic work, such as offered in many 2-year technical institutes, junior colleges, or through equivalent on-the-job training.

Clerical/Secretarial - All persons whose assignments typically are associated with clerical activities or are specifically of a secretarial nature.

Skilled Craft - All persons whose assignments typically require special manual skills and a thorough and comprehensive knowledge of the processes involved in the work, acquired through on-the-job training and experience or through apprenticeship or other formal training programs.

Service/Maintenance - All persons whose assignments require limited degrees of previously acquired skills and knowledge and in which workers perform duties which result in or contribute to the comfort, convenience, and hygiene of personnel and the student body or which contribute to the upkeep and care of buildings, facilities, or grounds of the institutional property.



FULL-TIME FACULTY BY RANK & GENDER







The Dean B. Ellis Library, centrally located in an eight-story building, functions as an educational center for the community. The Library of Congress classification system is used for the arrangement of books, and an online catalog provides access to the book collection. The library meets the informational needs of the university by offering a variety of services. A staff of 14 professional librarians and 20 support personnel acquires, organizes, and services the collection. Reference librarians assist users in locating information and in the use of the library. The reference staff also offers an active library instruction program which reaches numerous university classes. The library provides access to hundreds of online databases and search services via links on the library's web site. Materials that are not contained in the library's collection are accessible by interlibrary loan through the OCLC network.



The Jonesboro Campus has seen tremendous growth over the past few years. New construction projects have included the Arkansas Biosciences building, the Student Union, the Student Health Center, the HPESS Track Facility, a student parking lot, Jazzman's Hardwired Cafe, Indian Village Apartments and an upperclassman's residence hall - Northpark Quads. The residence hall provides housing for 836 students with at least one year of college experience. Each student will have a private room in a four student suite. Each suite contains a shared living room and bathroom. Nearing completion is the Cooper Alumni Center and the Judd Hill Center. The Judd Hill Center will house the President's Office and the ASU Foundation. Plans are also underway for the Child Development Center. The center anticipates serving 140 children; 80 of which will be in the ABC (Arkansas Better Chance) program thanks to grant funding. Additional slots will be available with priority given to children of ASU students, faculty, and staff.







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
