BOARD OF TRUSTEES

The Trustees of Arkansas State University serve as a board of management and control of Arkansas State University campuses in Jonesboro, Beebe, Newport, Mountain Home and Heber Springs; degree centers of the university at sites in Blytheville. Forrest City and West Memphis; and other academic programs throughout the state.

In this capacity, the Trustees hire the Arkansas State University president to serve as the Chief Executive Officer, approve the curriculum of the institution, annually approve an operating budget, establish policies for the efficient operation of the institution, and approve those matters which require participation of the governing board of the University. Trustees' duties include: appointing, supporting, and assessing the performance of the president; maintaining the clarity of the mission of Arkansas State University; approving long-range plans; approving the educational program; ensuring the wellbeing of the students, faculty and staff; ensuring strong financial management; approving significant faculty and staff appointments and dismissals; ensuring adequate resources for quality programs; preserving institutional autonomy; interpreting the campus to the community; and interpreting the needs of society to the campus.

The governor of Arkansas appoints members of the Board of Trustees for a period of five years. The Senate of the General Assembly must confirm each appointment.

HISTORY

Arkansas State University-Jonesboro (ASUJ) is celebrating its 100-year anniversary in 2009-2010! ASUJ was established in 1909 as a state agriculture school. The institution opened as a vocational high school in 1910 and changed to State Agricultural and Mechanical College in 1925. Authority to extend the curriculum, offer senior college work and grant degrees was given to the institution by the legislature in 1925. Senior college work was initiated in 1930, and the first bachelor's degrees were granted in 1931. In 1933, the legislature changed the name of the college to Arkansas State College. Master's degree graduate programs were initiated in 1955 and Doctorate degree programs were added in 1999. Arkansas State College was granted university status in January 1967.

Since 1909, the institution that evolved into ASUJ has been served by eleven presidents/chancellors.

HISTORY

As the oldest two-year college in the state, ASU-Beebe (ASUB) has paved the way in making a quality education affordable and attainable for Central Arkansas students. ASUB celebrated its eightieth anniversary in 2007, originally opening its doors as Junior Agricultural School of Central Arkansas in 1927 after Beebe citizens donated 300 acres of land to start the school. The college has been affiliated with the Arkansas State University System since 1955, when it became a sister campus of Arkansas State College.

HISTORY

In 1991, the Arkansas General Assembly created technical colleges from the Baxter County Vocational-Technical Center and the North Arkansas Community/Technical College Center in Mountain Home. Mountain Home Technical College was established on July 1, 1991. In 1992, the Mountain Home Technical College agreed to seek affiliation with Arkansas State University-Jonesboro to form a sister campus. On July 1, 1993, Mountain Home Technical College became Arkansas State University Mountain Home Technical College.

Arkansas State University-Mountain Home (ASUMH) was established on July 1, 1995 due to the commitment of the residents of Baxter County and the cooperation of the Department of Higher Education and Arkansas State University in Jonesboro.

ASUMH has an open door admissions policy. This policy is designed to enhance access to educational opportunities. Standards of quality are maintained and students are required to remove deficiencies before entering certain programs or courses.

Nestled in the beautiful Ozark Mountains, 156 miles north of Little Rock, the environment at ASUMH encourages free expression, leadership and innovation. Small class size means personal attention and support from instructors. Additionally, the construction of a new campus accommodating 1,200 students offers an even more appealing setting for students to pursue higher education.

PROGRAMS OF STUDY

It can be designed to meet the General Education requirements for those individuals planning to transfer to a four-year institution in order to complete a bachelor's degree. An Associate of Art is offered in General Education and Teaching. HISTORY

Arkansas State University-Newport (ASUN) has been in continuous operation since August 1975. Prior to being named ASU-Newport, the campus was known as White River Vocational Technical School. In 1991, the Arkansas Legislature passed Act 1244 which merged White River Vocational Technical School with ASU-Beebe. In 1992, it became ASU-Beebe/Newport and in 1997 became ASU-Newport. The 83rd General Assembly of the Arkansas Legislature passed Act 297 into law on February 19, 2001, creating a separate budget appropriation for ASUN effective July 1, 2001. The Higher Learning Commission of the North Central Accreditation Association of Colleges and Schools (NCA) granted the college initial accreditation for stand-alone status for five years in August 2002. In April 2007, the college received ten year accreditation status from the NCA. In March 2001, the state legislature approved the merger of Delta Technical Institute with Arkansas State University to produce the ASU Technical Center (ASUTC). In 2008, ASUTC was aligned with ASUN.

PROGRAMS OF STUDY

Programs and services are designed to assist students (both traditional and nontraditional) in determining and achieving their educational, personal and career goals.

These programs and services include associate degrees, certificates, continuing education, workforce development, adult education, ESL, and opportunities through the Career Pathways program.

The college offers transfer degree programs, including a new online degree (AA in Liberal Arts), an AA degree in Teaching (including Middle School and P-4 grade options) and Computer Information Systems. applied science degrees (including RN and General Technology with an emphasis in such areas as High Voltage Lineman Technology), technical certificates in such areas as Practical Nursing, Business Technology, High Voltage Lineman Technology, and Diesel Mechanics and certificates of proficiency in such diverse areas as CNA and Truck Driver Training (the largest commercial driver training program in the state).

SREB CLASSIFICATIONS

The SREB system for categorizing postsecondary education institutions is based upon a number of factors relevant to determining resource requirements. Differences in institutional size (number of degrees), role (types of degrees), breadth of program offerings (number of program areas in which degrees are granted), and comprehensiveness (distribution of degrees across program areas) are the factors upon which institutions are classified.

Institutions are assigned to categories for a report year using the previous academic year's data on program completions. To keep the statistical comparison groups relatively stable over time and to assure that institutions change categories only when their measures on a criterion are relatively stable, institutions change categories when they meet the criterion for another category for the third consecutive year.

- ◆Four-Year 1: Institutions awarding at least 100 doctoral degrees distributed among at least 10 CIP categories (2-digit classification) with no more than 50 percent in any one category. (University of Arkansas - Main Campus)
- ◆Four-Year 2: Institutions awarding at least 30 doctoral degrees distributed among at least 5 CIP categories.
- ◆ Four-Year 3: Institutions awarding at least 100 master's, education specialist, post-master's, or doctoral degrees with master's, education specialist, and post-master's degrees distributed among at least 10 CIP categories. (Arkansas State University-Jonesboro, University of Arkansas - Little Rock, University of Central Arkansas)
- ◆Two-Year 2: Institutions awarding associate degrees and offering college transfer courses with FTE enrollment of between 2,000 and 4.999. (Arkansas State University-Beebe)
- ◆Two-Year 3: Institutions awarding associate degrees and offering college transfer courses with FTE enrollment of less than 2,000. (Arkansas State University-Mountain Home, Arkansas State University-Newport)

CARNEGIE CLASSIFICATION

The Carnegie Commission developed a classification of colleges and universities to support its program of research and policy analysis. With the 2005 revision, the single classification was replaced by a set of multiple. parallel classifications. They are organized around three fundamental questions: what is taught (Undergraduate & Graduate Instructional Programs), who are the students (Enrollment Profile & Undergraduate Profile), and what is the setting (Size & Setting).

ASUJ's Classifications by Category*

Basic: (Master's L - Master's Colleges and Universities with larger programs) Generally includes institutions that award at least 50 master's degrees and fewer than 20 doctoral degrees per year.

Size & Setting: (M4/NR - Medium four-year, primarily nonresidential) Fall FTE enrollment of 3.000 - 9.999 degree seeking students at these bachelor's degree granting institutions. Fewer than 25% of dearee-seeking undergraduates live on campus.

Enrollment Profile: (VHU - Very high undergraduate) Fall enrollment data show both undergraduate and graduate/professional students. with the graduate enrollment accounting for less than 10% of FTE enrollment.

Undergraduate Profile: (FT4/I - Full-time four-year, inclusive) Fall enrollment data show at least 80% of undergraduates enrolled fulltime at these bachelor's degree granting institutions. At these institutions test scores indicate that they extend educational opportunity to a wide range of students with respect to academic preparation and achievement.

Undergraduate Instructional Program: (Prof+A&S/SGC - Professions plus arts & sciences, some graduate coexistence) 60-79% of bachelor's degree majors were in professional fields, and graduate degrees were observed in some of the fields corresponding to undergraduate majors (but less than half).

Graduate Instructional Program: (Doc/Prof - Doctoral, professions dominant) These institutions award doctoral degrees in a range of fields, with the plurality in the professions other than engineering (such as education, health professions, public policy, or social work).

Quick**Fact**:

The Arkansas State University System offers degree programs from certificates through the doctoral level in more than 200 fields of study.




Geographic Origin of International Students








Academic Preparation - Admission Test Scores












Undergraduate Transfer Students - In-State Transfers








Arkansas State University-Jonesboro fields 16 sports seven for men and nine for women - in NCAA Division I. ASUJ's football program competes in NCAA Division I-A. the highest level for NCAA football.

CONFERENCE:

ASUJ belongs to the Sun Belt Conference in all sports with the exception of bowling.

ACADEMICS:

- ◆ Senior baseball player Brandon Eller and senior football player Brian Flagg were both named First Team ESPN The Magazine Academic All-America.
- ♦ Five bowlers were named to the NTCA All-Academic Team, including Samantha Morrison who was a Second Team Academic All-America selection.
- ♦ Senior football player Brian Flagg was named the College of Engineering's Distinguished Graduating Senior and Outstanding Student.
- ♦ Volleyball player Heather Gillom and Brian Flagg both received the ASUJ's Distinguished Service Award.
- ♦The men's golf team and the football team both won the Sun Belt Conference Team Academic Award.
- ♦ Senior women's basketball player Caroline Starr was nominated for the Sun Belt Conference Postgraduate Award.
- ♦ Over 130 ASUJ student-athletes were named to both the spring and fall 2008 Athletic Director's Honor Roll.
- ♦ All ASUJ student-athletes combined to post a 2.92 GPA for the fall 2008 semester.
- ♦ Women's golfer Amanda Harvey was awarded a full-paid fellowship to the University of Sheffield in South Yorkshire, England.
- ♦ Men's basketball guard Mike Lance was named a First Team ESPN The Magazine Academic All-District VI.

COMPETITIVE PERFORMANCE:

- ◆ Senior baseball player Chase Ware signed a free agent contract with the Cincinnati Reds.
- ◆The baseball team claimed its first series victory over traditional SBC power South Alabama since 2005.
- ♦ The men's basketball team's 8-3 non-conference record was its best since 2003-2004. The team eclipsed its win total for last year by three victories.
- ◆David Johnson was selected by the Pittsburgh Steelers in the 2009 NFL Draft.
- ◆ Placekicker Josh Arauco was one of the three finalists for the 2008 Lou Groza Collegiate Placekicker Award.
- ◆The football team was bowl eligible for the third time over the last four years.
- ◆The football team defeated Texas A&M for its first victory over a BCS school since it joined NCAA FBS.
- ◆The men's golf team had two top-three finishes, including runner-up finish at the 13th Annual Red Wolf Classic, and completed the season with a winning record.
- ◆The women's golf team had four top-five finishes and ended the season with a winning record under first-year head coach Ginger Brown-Lemm.
- ◆The women's basketball team secured a first-round Sun Belt Conference Tournament home game for the third consecutive year.
- ♦ ASUJ made its second consecutive appearance at the NCAA Women's Bowling Championships.
- ◆The women's soccer team broke the school records for single-season attendance, points, assists and shots.
- ◆ Justin Ingram was named ASUJ's sixth head volleyball
- ◆The volleyball team won at least 20 matches for the second time over the last three seasons, and also won two tournaments in 2008.
- ◆The track and field teams had eight student athletes qualify regionally for the NCAA Outdoor meet.
- Amy Bowman won the women's pentathlon and was the women's high-point scorer, Stephanie Foreman won the pole vault, and Carlos Mattis won the high jump at the SBC Indoor Championships, while ASUJ claimed four of the top six spots in the event.

SPECIAL EVENTS & FACILITIES:

- ◆The ASUJ Athletic Department received the largest single donation in its history, a \$400,000 gift that will be used to enhance the athletic academic facility, which has been renamed the Charles F. Luter Family Academic Success Center.
- ◆ASUJ secured an unprecedented \$1 million contract for its September 4, 2010 football game at Auburn.
- ◆The Athletic Department's largest and oldest fund raiser was a huge success. Lil' Bit of Christmas was held at the Convocation Center in November. All 250 booths were sold as nearly 9,000 people came through the doors.

ATTENDANCE:

- ♦ ASUJ increased its season ticket sales for men's basketball for the first time in 10 years, up 11% over last year's total. ASUJ doubled last season's walk-up ticket sales for its home games this year.
- ♦ ASUJ's first four football home crowds of the 2008 season all ranked among the top 10 in ASUJ Stadium history. It is the first time that the football team played four home games each in front of 20,000 or more spectators during the same season. The average attendance of 21,105 broke the single-season record for home attendance, which was previously 17,882 set in 2006.
- ♦The women's soccer team set a new school record for attendance.



ASU Employees are assigned to a primary occupational activity category according to the following EEOC* definitions:

Faculty - All persons whose specific assignments customarily are made for the purpose of conducting instruction, research, or public service as a principal activity and who hold academic rank titles of professor, associate professor, assistant professor, instructor, lecturer, or any equivalent.

Executive/Administrative/Managerial - All persons whose assignments require primary (and major) responsibility for management of the institution, or a customarily recognized department or subdivision thereof. Assignments require the performance of work directly related to management policies or general business operations of the institution. department, or subdivision, etc. Assignments in this category customarily and regularly require the incumbent to exercise discretion and independent judgement and to direct the work of others.

Professional/Non-Faculty - All persons employed for the primary purpose of performing academic support, student service, and institutional support activities, whose assignments would require either college graduation or experience of such kind and amount as to provide a comparable background.

Technical/Paraprofessional - All persons whose assignments require specialized knowledge or skills which may be acquired through experience or academic work, such as offered in many 2-year technical institutes, junior colleges, or through equivalent on-the-job training.

Clerical/Secretarial - All persons whose assignments typically are associated with clerical activities or are specifically of a secretarial nature.

Skilled Craft - All persons whose assignments typically require special manual skills and a thorough and comprehensive knowledge of the processes involved in the work, acquired through on-the-job training and experience or through apprenticeship or other formal training programs.

Service/Maintenance - All persons whose assignments require limited degrees of previously acquired skills and knowledge and in which workers perform duties which result in or contribute to the comfort, convenience, and hygiene of personnel and the student body or which contribute to the upkeep and care of buildings, facilities, or grounds of the institutional property.




FULL-TIME INSTRUCTIONAL FACULTY BY RANK & GENDER Fall 2009





The Dean B. Ellis Library, centrally located in an eight-story building, functions as an educational center for the community. The Library of Congress classification system is used for the arrangement of books, and an on-line catalog provides access to the book collection. The library meets the informational needs of the university by offering a variety of services. A staff of 11 professional librarians and 22 support personnel acquires, organizes and services the collection. Reference librarians assist users in locating information and in the use of the library. The reference staff also offers an active library instruction program which reaches numerous university classes. The library provides access to hundreds of online databases and search services via links on the library's web site. Materials that are not contained in the library's collection are accessible by interlibrary loan through the OCLC network.











Physical Facilities Inventory





ASUJ received the largest single donation in its history of \$14.5 million which was utilized to construct the Donald W. Reynolds Center for Health Sciences. The 46,440 sq. ft. building houses Nursing's clinical learning centers. The centers include a general nursing center with ICU and maternity simulation rooms, a nurse anesthesia simulation laboratory and two health assessment learning laboratories.

Other construction projects include the Delta Center for Economic Development, the Honors Living Learning Community, a Student Recreation Center, the Red Wolf Den Apartments, a Liberal Arts building that will house the College of Humanities and Social Sciences, along with other projects and renovations.






