BOARD OF TRUSTEES

The Trustees of Arkansas State University serve as a board of management and control of Arkansas State University campuses in Jonesboro, Beebe, Newport, Mountain Home and Heber Springs; degree centers of the university at sites in Blytheville, Forrest City and West Memphis; and other academic programs throughout the state.

In this capacity, the Trustees hire the Arkansas State University president to serve as the Chief Executive Officer, approve the curriculum of the institution, annually approve an operating budget, establish policies for the efficient operation of the institution, and approve those matters which require participation of the governing board of the University. Trustees' duties include: appointing, supporting, and assessing the performance of the president; maintaining the clarity of the mission of Arkansas State University; approving long-range plans; approving the educational program; ensuring the wellbeing of the students, faculty and staff; ensuring strong financial management; approving significant faculty and staff appointments and dismissals; ensuring adequate resources for quality programs; preserving institutional autonomy; interpreting the campus to the community; and interpreting the needs of society to the campus.

The governor of Arkansas appoints members of the Board of Trustees for a period of five years. The Senate of the General Assembly must confirm each appointment.

Arkansas State University-Jonesboro Mission Statement: Arkansas State University educates leaders, enhances

ASU's main campus in Jonesboro is located in Northeast Arkansas. Jonesboro is the fifth largest populace city in the state and has a trade, cultural and medical center for a market area of more than a half million people.

HISTORY

Arkansas State University (ASU) was established in 1909 as a state agriculture school. The institution opened as a vocational high school in 1910 and changed to State Agricultural and Mechanical College in 1925. Authority to extend the curriculum, offer senior college work and grant degrees was given to the institution by the legislature in 1925. Senior college work was initiated in 1930, and the first bachelor's degrees were granted in 1931. In 1933, the legislature changed the name of the college to Arkansas State College. Master's degree graduate programs were initiated in 1955 and Doctorate degree programs were added in 1999. Arkansas State College was granted university status in January 1967.

Since 1909, the institution that evolved into ASU has been served by thirteen presidents/chancellors.

Arkansas State University-Beebe Mission Statement:

HISTORY

As the oldest two-year college in the state, ASU-Beebe has paved the way in making a quality education affordable and attainable for Central Arkansas students. In 1927, ASU-Beebe was founded as Junior Agricultural School of Central Arkansas after Beebe citizens donated 300 acres of land to start the school. In 1931, the name was changed to Junior Agricultural College of Central Arkansas, and a college curriculum was established. The college has been affiliated with the Arkansas State University System since 1955.

HISTORY

In 1991, the Arkansas General Assembly created technical colleges from the Baxter County Vocational-Technical Center and the North Arkansas Community/Technical College Center in Mountain Home. Mountain Home Technical College was established on July 1, 1991. In 1992, the Mountain Home Technical College agreed to seek affiliation with Arkansas State University-Jonesboro to form a sister campus. On July 1, 1993, Mountain Home Technical College became Arkansas State University Mountain Home Technical College.

Arkansas State University-Mountain Home (ASUMH) was established on July 1, 1995 due to the commitment of the residents of Baxter County and the cooperation of the Department of Higher Education and Arkansas State University in Jonesboro.

ASUMH has an open door admissions policy. This policy is designed to enhance access to educational opportunities. Standards of quality are maintained and students are required to remove deficiencies before entering certain programs or courses.

Nestled in the beautiful Ozark Mountains, 156 miles north of Little Rock, the environment at ASUMH encourages free expression, leadership and innovation. Small class size means personal attention and support from instructors. Additionally, the construction of a new campus accommodating 1,200 students offers an even more appealing setting for students to pursue higher education.

PROGRAMS OF STUDY

An Associate of Arts is offered for those students needing maximum flexibility in the selection of a course of study to meet individual employment and educational needs. It can be designed to meet the General Education requirements for those individuals planning to transfer to a four-year institution in order to complete a bachelor's degree. Associates of Applied Science are offered in Crime Scene Investigation, Criminal Justice, Funeral Science, Information Systems Technology, Law Enforcement Administration, Management, Nursing, Paramedic Technology, Respiratory Care and Welding Technology. The bachelor's degrees are offered by building on the existing Associate of Arts degree offered at ASUMH. The Center currently offers bachelor's degrees in Agricultural Business, Business Administration, Clinical Lab Science, Criminology, Early Childhood Education, Management, Middle-Level Education, Nursing and Technology. Master's degrees are offered in Business Administration, Curriculum and Instruction, and Educational Leadership.

HISTORY

Arkansas State University-Newport (ASUN) has been in continuous operation since August 1975. Prior to being named ASU-Newport, the campus was known as White River Vocational Technical School. In 1991, the Arkansas Legislature passed Act 1244 which merged White River Vocational Technical School with ASU-Beebe. In 1992, it became ASU-Beebe/Newport and in 1997 became ASU-Newport. The 83rd General Assembly of the Arkansas Legislature passed Act 297 into law on February 19. 2001, creating a separate budget appropriation for ASUN effective July 1, 2001. The Higher Learning Commission of the North Central Accreditation Association of Colleges and Schools (NCA) granted the college initial accreditation for stand-alone status for five years in August 2002. In April 2007, the college received ten year accreditation status from the NCA. In March 2001, the state legislature approved the merger of Delta Technical Institute with Arkansas State University to produce the ASU Technical Center (ASUTC). In 2008, ASUTC was aligned with ASUN.

PROGRAMS OF STUDY

Programs and services are designed to assist students (both traditional and nontraditional) in determining and achieving their educational, personal and career goals. These programs and services include associate degrees, certificates, continuing education, workforce development, adult education, ESL and opportunities through the Career Pathways program.

The college offers transfer degree programs, including an online degree (AA in Liberal Arts), an AA degree in Teaching (including Middle School and P-4 grade options) and Computer Information Systems, applied science degrees (including RN and General Technology with an emphasis in such areas as High Voltage Lineman Technology), technical certificates in such areas as Practical Nursing, Business Technology, High Voltage Lineman Technology, and Diesel Mechanics and certificates of proficiency in such diverse areas as CNA and Truck Driver Training (the largest commercial driver training program in the state).

Partnering with business and industry and working to meet the local, county and regional needs of its students and employers, ASU-Newport is truly a "Great Place to Start."






Arkansas State University System



2014-2015 Organizational Structure






Arkansas State University-ASU, Jonesboro



2014-2015 Organizational Structure







SREB CLASSIFICATIONS

The SREB system for categorizing postsecondary education institutions is based upon a number of factors relevant to determining resource requirements. Differences in institutional size (*number of degrees*), role (*types of degrees*), breadth of program offerings (*number of program areas in which degrees are granted*), and comprehensiveness (*distribution of degrees across program areas*) are the factors upon which institutions are classified.

Institutions are assigned to categories for a report year using the previous academic year's data on program completions. To keep the statistical comparison groups relatively stable over time and to assure that institutions change categories only when their measures on a criterion are relatively stable, institutions change categories when they meet the criterion for another category for the third consecutive year.

◆ Four-Year 1: Institutions awarding at least 100 doctoral degrees distributed among at least 10 CIP categories (2-digit classification) with no more than 50 percent in any one category. (University of Arkansas-Fayetteville)

◆Four-Year 2: Institutions awarding at least 30 doctoral degrees distributed among at least 5 CIP categories.

◆ Four-Year 3: Institutions awarding at least 100 master's, education specialist, post-master's, or doctoral degrees with master's, education specialist, and post-master's degrees distributed among at least 10 CIP categories. (Arkansas State University, University of Arkansas-Little Rock, University of Central Arkansas)

◆**Two-Year 2:** Institutions awarding associate degrees and offering college transfer courses with FTE enrollment of between 2,000 and 4,999. (*Arkansas State University-Beebe*)

◆**Two-Year 3:** Institutions awarding associate degrees and offering college transfer courses with FTE enrollment of less than 2,000. (*Arkansas State University-Mountain Home, Arkansas State University-Newport*)

CARNEGIE CLASSIFICATION

The Carnegie Commission developed a classification of colleges and universities to support its program of research and policy analysis. With the 2005 revision, the single classification was replaced by a set of multiple, parallel classifications. They are organized around three fundamental questions: what is taught (Undergraduate & Graduate Instructional Programs), who are the students (Enrollment Profile & Undergraduate Profile), and what is the setting (Size & Setting).

ASU's Classifications by Category*

Basic: (Master's L - Master's Colleges and Universities with larger programs) Generally includes institutions that award at least 50 master's degrees and fewer than 20 doctoral degrees per year.

Size & Setting: (M4/NR - Medium four-year, primarily nonresidential) Fall FTE enrollment of 3,000 - 9,999 degree seeking students at these bachelor's degree granting institutions. Fewer than 25% of degree-seeking undergraduates live on campus.

Enrollment Profile: (HU - High undergraduate) Fall enrollment data show both undergraduate and graduate/professional students, with the graduate enrollment accounting for less than 10-24% of FTE enrollment.

Undergraduate Profile: (FT4/I - Full-time four-year, inclusive) Fall enrollment data show at least 80% of undergraduates enrolled fulltime at these bachelor's degree granting institutions. At these institutions test scores indicate that they extend educational opportunity to a wide range of students with respect to academic preparation and achievement.

Undergraduate Instructional Program: (Prof+A&S/SGC - Professions plus arts & sciences, some graduate coexistence) 60-79% of bachelor's degree majors were in professional fields, and graduate degrees were observed in some of the fields corresponding to undergraduate majors (but less than half).

Graduate Instructional Program: (Doc/Prof - Doctoral, professional dominant) These institutions award doctoral degrees in a range of fields, with the plurality in the professions other than engineering (such as education, health professions, public policy, or social work).





Academic Preparation - Admission Test Scores











Academic Progress - Retention Rates







AFFILIATION:

Arkansas State University fields sixteen sports - seven for men and nine for women - in NCAA Division I. ASU's football program competes in NCAA Football Bowl Subdivision (FBS).

CONFERENCE:

ASU belongs to the Sun Belt Conference (SBC) in all sports with the exception of bowling.

ACADEMICS:

♦ Academic performance reached an all-time high during a record setting 2013 fall semester for Arkansas State Athletics, which saw its student athletes achieve a 3.03 all department GPA that was the highest in school history.
♦ A school record 197 student athletes earned a spot on the AD's Honor Roll for the 2013 fall semester, including 45 with a 4.0 GPA.

◆A-State placed 185 student athletes on the SBC Commissioner's List (95) and Academic Honor Roll (90).

♦ The baseball team was one of just five SBC teams to obtain a 3.0 or higher GPA.

COMPETITIVE PERFORMANCE:

◆A-State enjoyed its highest ever finish in the prestigious Learfield Sports Director's Cup standings, ranking #83 in the nation among 297 schools. The Red Wolves' finish not only set a new A-State record, it topped the program's previous high of #134 set in 1999-2000 by 51 places.

• The women's athletics program claimed its highest finish ever in the Capital One Cup standings, earning a prestigious top-50 award for ranking #44 among all NCAA Division I programs in the nation. The ranking was the highest ever for a SBC women's program.

• The football team claimed the SBC championship for the third straight year and won the GoDaddy Bowl for the second consecutive year.

♦ The football team had a league high 12 players named All-Sun Belt Conference, 7 SBC Player of the Week selections and two players named Honorable Mention All-America.

 Senior football player Brian Davis was named a Lou Groz Award finalist.

The baseball team advanced to the SBC tournament semifinals for the second straight year.

•The baseball team claimed a win over the #2 ranked team in the nation.

The baseball team had two SBC All-Tournament selections.

◆The women's bowling team achieved a #1 national ranking in both the NTCA Coaches Poll and the NTCA Media Poll.

◆ The women's bowling team recorded a school record 98 victories and advanced to the NCAA Tournament for the seventh consecutive year.

♦ Three women's bowlers were named All-Americans, and the Red Wolves had 14 all-tournament selections throughout the course of the season.

♦Bowling coach, Justin Kostick, was named the NTCA Division I Coach of the Year for the second time.

◆ The men's cross country team produced a program tying best finish at the SBC Championships and qualified for the NCAA Division I South Central Regional.

♦ The men's basketball team recorded 19 victories to tie the program's most since 1997-98, and won at least 19 games in back-to-back seasons for the first time since 1986-87.

The men's golf team won the Red Wolves Intercollegiate for the first time since 2002 and collected top-five finishes at three tournaments.

♦ The women's soccer team claimed its first ever victory in the SBC Tournament, advancing to the semifinals.

◆ The volleyball team won 15 or more matches for the sixth consecutive year and advanced to the SBC Conference Tournament semifinals, winning back-to-back matches for the first time since 1999-2000.

♦ The women's basketball team claimed its first ever SBC regular season championship.

• Brian Boyer was named the SBC Women's Basketball Coach of the Year, and he also became the Sun Belt's career leader in conference wins.

♦ The women's cross country team claimed its first ever SBC championship.

♦Kyle Chandler was named the SBC Women's Cross Country Coach of the Year.

• The women's cross country team held its highest regional ranking ever by the USTFCCCA.

SPECIAL EVENTS & FACILITIES:

◆The Red Wolves Foundation announced its latest fund raising initiative with the introduction of the "Red Wolves 500." Members will be the driving force behind building A-State Athletics into a national brand.

•The Athletics Department held a press conference announcing a new corporate sponsorship agreement with St. Bernards, which also designated it as the "Official Healthcare Provider for A-State Athletics."

◆The Red Wolves Foundation experienced a 41% increase in annual funds raised over the previous two years and a 63% jump in corporate sales over 2012-13.

 School records were set for both total season ticket sales and season ticket revenue.

•The athletics department received a \$5 million pledge from longtime supporter Johnny Allison for renovation to the football stadium press box. The donation is the largest ever in A-State Athletics history.

◆ The Lettermen's Club inducted four new members into the A-State Athletics Hall of Honor, including former football players Tommy Walker and David Mitchell, basketball player J.H. Williams and track and field performer Doug Shouse.

♦A-State advanced to the Final Four of the NCAA's 6th Fan Contest.

♦A-State broke ground on a new women's soccer and women's tennis facility.



ASU Employees are assigned to a primary occupational activity category according to the following EEOC* definitions:

Faculty - All persons whose specific assignments customarily are made for the purpose of conducting instruction, research, or public service as a principal activity and who hold academic rank titles of professor, associate professor, assistant professor, instructor, lecturer, or any equivalent.

Executive/Administrative/Managerial - All persons whose assignments require primary (and major) responsibility for management of the institution, or a customarily recognized department or subdivision thereof. Assignments require the performance of work directly related to management policies or general business operations of the institution, department, or subdivision, etc. Assignments in this category customarily and regularly require the incumbent to exercise discretion and independent judgement and to direct the work of others.

Professional/Non-Faculty - All persons employed for the primary purpose of performing academic support, student service, and institutional support activities, whose assignments would require either college graduation or experience of such kind and amount as to provide a comparable background.

Technical/Paraprofessional - All persons whose assignments require specialized knowledge or skills which may be acquired through experience or academic work, such as offered in many 2-year technical institutes, junior colleges, or through equivalent on-the-job training.

Clerical/Secretarial - All persons whose assignments typically are associated with clerical activities or are specifically of a secretarial nature.

Skilled Craft - All persons whose assignments typically require special manual skills and a thorough and comprehensive knowledge of the processes involved in the work, acquired through on-the-job training and experience or through apprenticeship or other formal training programs.

Service/Maintenance - All persons whose assignments require limited degrees of previously acquired skills and knowledge and in which workers perform duties which result in or contribute to the comfort, convenience, and hygiene of personnel and the student body or which contribute to the upkeep and care of buildings, facilities, or grounds of the institutional property.



FULL-TIME INSTRUCTIONAL FACULTY BY RANK & GENDER Fall 2014









The Dean B. Ellis Library, centrally located in an eight-story building, functions as an educational center for the community. The Library of Congress classification system is used for the arrangement of print books and media, and an online catalog provides access to the library's physical collections. The library meets the informational needs of the university by offering a variety of services. A staff of 16 professional librarians and 19 support personnel acquire, organize and maintain the collection, and provide a variety of library services. Reference librarians assist users in locating information and in using the library. The library also offers an active library skills instruction program which reaches numerous university classes. The library provides access to hundreds of online database and search services, including more than 350,000 E-Books, via links on the library's web site. Materials that are not contained in the library's collection are accessible by interlibrary loan through the OCLC network.










