### Chancellor's Report Arkansas State University-Jonesboro

## ACADEMIC AFFAIRS AND RESEARCH

### Office of the Provost:

- Arkansas State has received 4,917 undergraduate domestic applications for Fall 2025, a 4% increase from last year. Changes under Dr. Fen Yu's leadership have greatly improved our application processing speed. As of November 12, there have been 3,634 students have been admitted to Arkansas State, nearly twice the number admitted the previous year. We will continue to deploy new strategies to yield a higher percentage of admitted applicants.
- Our office continues to provide deans with new data to enable them to make more informed hiring decisions in both the staff and faculty ranks. Examples of such data are as follows:
  - ADHE Program Viability Report;
  - DFW Rates by instructor;
  - Student Faculty Ratio by College and Department; and
  - Enrollment by Majors.
- As of November 12, 58% of the on-campus student body had registered for Spring 2025. This is due to strategic changes and improvements in our oncampus advising and registration processes, which have resulted in more students registering for classes earlier than in previous years. This allows us to hire faculty for the Spring 2025 workload efficiently.
- We continue to have conversations with the Deans' Council to modify the current advising and registration structure. The new model should be operationalized for Fall 2025.
- The Office of the Provost is spearheading the initiative to implement centralized scheduling. Each college now offers classes on a five-day-per-week rotation. Vice Chancellor Boothman is working to implement the software CourseDog, which will strategically populate courses across campus, giving us better space utilization.
- The Office of the Provost continues to work in conjunction with marketing and communications lead Todd Clark to oversee the development of a new University website, with a target launch of Summer 2025.
- A-State Qatar continues to see enrollment growth, with 113 students currently enrolled in its three degree programs: MSE Educational Leadership; BS Digital

Technology & Design; and BS Engineering Management Systems. This marks an increase of 105% compared to the Fall 2023 enrollment of 55 students.

- The A-State Online total combined enrollment for Fall 2024 (including Fall 1 and Fall 2 sessions) is 8,861, a 16.5% (1,259) increase from Fall 2023's enrollment of 7,602.
- The Center for Excellence in Teaching and Learning (CETL) has increased the number of activities and professional development events for faculty.
  - There are 30 faculty currently enrolled in the 2024-25 Association of College and University Educators (ACUE) cohort.
  - There are 75 faculty enrolled in an online course on Teaching with Artificial Intelligence facilitated by CETL.
- Assistant Vice Provost Madeline Ragland continues to offer workshops on using artificial intelligence in the curriculum. She is scheduled to attend a second national conference regarding the intersection of academic integrity and artificial intelligence in Spring 2025.

# ACCESS AND INSTITUTIONAL ENGAGEMENT

## Access and Accommodation Services (AAS):

- The number of new students registered during this period is 190. This brings the total active registration numbers to 1,055.
- During the previous quarter, approximately 635 tests were administered.

- Our office processed seven e-text requests, 20 technology/assistive devices checkouts, and three class instruction videos were captioned.
- The AAS Transportation Program has facilitated approximately 283 pickups and drop-offs and completed approximately nine classroom setups (e.g., seating accommodations, classroom signage for allergy accommodations).
- Approximately 92 ESAs have been approved, with other applications pending.
- AAS implemented an online process to evaluate and track ESA requests.
- AAS staff conducted eight training sessions and attended one workshop during the quarter. These trainings are disability-specific, in terms of programming and service delivery. Primary audiences are faculty, staff, and students. The trainings also satisfy continuing-education requirements for state and national licenses and certifications held by AAS staff members.
- Disability Awareness Week was held October 21-24. We received positive student feedback from the events.
- The AAS Student Satisfaction Survey is being disseminated to registered students in order to gauge their satisfaction with programs, services, and sense of belonging. These numbers will be shared with University officials to improve the quality of services through AAS.

## Multicultural Center (MC):

The Multicultural Center's involvement in the activities listed below highlights our commitment to fostering a campus environment that supports all students:

- The MC staff and ambassadors provided presentations for all FYE: Making Connections courses, delivering 29 training sessions this quarter, which focused on the MC's resources and communication methods while respecting all differences;
- The MC staff collaborated with the Admissions team on recruitment initiatives, including participating in the Southern Heritage Classic Academic and Career Fair in Memphis, TN. We shared information with prospective students about the Center and its resources;
- Hosted El Grito with the Student Activities Board (SAB) and student organizations Hermana y Hermano (mentorship program) and Hermandad de Sigma Iota Alpha, Incorporated (SIA), a Latina sorority, to kick off Hispanic Heritage Month. More than 75 students attended. The event featured Hispanic cuisine and a history hunt, where students visited tables to learn about the Hispanic community and answer questions for a chance to win a gear basket;
- Initiated the reinstatement of the Non-Traditional Student Organization. As part of this initiative, we sent 20 non-traditional students and their families to the Northeast Arkansas District Fair;

- Collaborated with the Office of Institutional Integrity and Title IX and the Wilson Counseling Center on Domestic Violence Awareness Initiatives;

## Athletics Administration:

## Football:

• A-State reached five overall wins and three Sun Belt victories, which is the earliest this has been accomplished in a season since 2017.

## <u>Baseball</u>:

• The ASU Board of Trustees voted to approve the installation of a turf playing surface at Tomlinson Stadium and to name the baseball field "Slayton Family Field" in honor of the Slayton Family Foundation.

## Cross Country:

 Jacob Pyeatt claimed the individual title at the Sun Belt Conference Championships, helping lead the men's program to a runner-up finish. The women's program, which also finished runner-up, was led by Third Team All-Sun Belt selection Maja Dzialoszewska. Pyeatt was named the league's Runner of the Year.

## Men's Basketball:

• The Red Wolves were picked to win the Sun Belt Conference in the league's preseason coaches poll for the first time in school history, and Kobe Julien was tabbed the preseason Player of the Year.

## Women's Basketball:

• The Red Wolves defeated Arizona State, 100-96, marking their first win over a Power-4 Conference opponent since the 2017-18 season.

## Volleyball:

• The Red Wolves claimed the Sun Belt Conference West Division title for the first time since 2016 and went undefeated at First National Bank Arena for the first time since 2015.

## <u>Men's Golf</u>:

• A-State won a pair of fall tournaments, including the Golf Week Fall Challenge and the Bubba Barnett Intercollegiate.

## Women's Golf:

• The Red Wolves won the team title at the Maverick Classic at Tierra Verde Golf Club in Arlington, Texas.

## Women's Bowling:

• The Red Wolves were ranked second in the National Tenpin Coaches Association Preseason Poll.

## ENROLLMENT MANAGEMENT, GLOBAL ENGAGEMENT AND OUTREACH

## Undergraduate Recruitment:

- First-year applications for Fall 2025 are at 4,918, as compared to 4,732 at this time last year for Fall 2024;
- Admitted first-year applications for Fall 2025 are at 3,634, compared to 2,037 for Fall 2024, reflecting a 78% year-to-date increase;
- Students from Arkansas who have been admitted for Fall 2025 have shown an 81% year-to-date increase;
- International admitted applications are at 2,423 for Spring 2025.

## Outreach:

- Total group visits to campus have increased by 8% from last year;
- Group visits, in addition to individual visits, have increased by 24%;
- This year's Free Application Week yielded 2,149 applications compared to 2,098 last year;
- Pack Preview attendance saw an 18% increase compared to last year, with a total of 748 students and more than 1,900 guests attending across both events;
- Digital advertising, social media, and email communications have shown strong growth in engagement and reach. We are developing promotional materials, yield communications, and social media advertisements for Spring 2025 to help admitted students register for upcoming events and NSO.

## Recruitment:

• Since August, the recruitment team has attended more than 440 recruitment events across Arkansas, Missouri, Texas, Mississippi, and Tennessee. This, alongside our more than 1,800 individual student interactions (emails, calls, and texts), has increased applications and admitted students.

## Early College Programs:

• We anticipate a 15% increase in enrollment for the upcoming Spring 2025 semester, supported by new strategic partnerships and improved retention processes.

## Financial Aid:

- Completed testing for the 2025-2026 first-year class, utilizing CSS Profile information;
- As of November 12, we have sent award notifications to more than 1,500 students.

## International Programs:

- Achieved record Fall 2024 enrollment, with a 100% increase in first-year undergraduate international freshmen, currently hosting over 1,100 international students on campus;
- Over 400 undergraduate and 80 graduate international students are registered for Spring 2025 classes.

## English Learning Academy (ELA):

- Achieved the highest Fall enrollment with 17 new students and a record mid-fall enrollment of eight additional students;
- Attained a 79% graduation rate for first-time students.

## Study Abroad Initiatives:

- Fall 2024: 18 students are actively studying abroad;
- Spring 2025: 23 students are preparing for study abroad experiences;
- Summer 2025: Six faculty-led trips are planned to Greece, ASUCO, Dominica, Taiwan, Costa Rica, and South Korea.

## International Student Services:

- Launched a new outreach strategy to track student yield from admission through arrival on campus;
- Introduced "Homesickness Conversations" to assist students in managing homesickness.

- Expanded the ITS cybersecurity team, led by Patrick Jeffrey, Director of IT Security, to strategically focus on proactive procedures to combat cyber threat attacks and ensure sufficient resource allocation to handle incidents immediately as they occur;
- Coordinated the implementation of Syntellis budgeting platform with Finance & Administration, and continued efforts to leverage data from multiple platforms (Canvas, Slate, and Banner) to provide real-time information and insights for student success and retention initiatives led by Dr. Nikesha Nesbitt.

## **STUDENT AFFAIRS**

### Campus Recreation:

Notable campus recreation activities at Red WOLF Center during the Fall 2024 semester (September-December) include:

- Group fitness classes including yoga, spin, sculp, cardio/tone, HIT, and butt/guts;
- Fitness challenges to encourage students to achieve wellness goals;
- Intramural events hosted throughout the semester include football, soccer, softball, bowling, volleyball, basketball, and table tennis;
- Club Sports, including rugby, spirit squads, eSports, and softball, competed in a variety of events during the Fall semester.

### Wilson Counseling Center:

- The Wilson Counseling Center staff visited our First Year Experience: Making Connections courses to present information about managing the transition to college and campus resources. The goal is to expose first-year to campus services that aid in student success;
- The Wilson Counseling Center increased services during Fall 2024 semester:
  - Individual counseling appointments increased by 13% compared to Fall 2023;
  - Student intake appointments increased by 10% compared to Fall 2023.

### Leadership Center:

The following notable campus student events occurred in Fall 2024:

- NPHC hosted NPHC Week, which consisted of volunteering and social events to encourage campus involvement. The week concluded with the annual Best Stepper on the Yard;
- Greek Life hosted a fire safety program presented by Jonesboro Fire Chief Jason Wills. The goal is to educate students residing in Greek housing about fire safety prevention and overall chapter house management. This partnership with the City

of Jonesboro allows for current students to become familiar with city personnel and understand guidelines pertaining the fire safety;

- Greek Life partnered with the Chancellor to host a fraternity advisor roundtable to discuss the current state of the Greek system and brainstorm about improvements. The goal is to strengthen partnerships with campus and fraternity volunteers to offer a quality experience for current members;
- InterHOWLactic: Mission to Homecoming 2024 was the theme for Homecoming 2024. The Student Activities Board hosted various events for students including a roller skating, games on the lawn, concert on the lawn and more. Jonathan Schaufler and Amber Yates were crowned the 2024 Homecoming King and Queen;
- The sixth annual on-campus haunted house was deemed as the "Haunted Hospital" in University Hall;
- Student Affairs partnered with International Programs to host two key events:

## Advancement Services

• For the first quarter of the fiscal year, July 1, 2024, through September 30, 2024, the University recorded a total of 6,676 gifts and commitments from 2,754 individual donors for a total of \$2,497,456.03. The overall giving amount includes outright donations of cash, gifts-in-kind, planned gifts, and new pledges.

## <u>Alumni Relations</u>

- Alumni Association membership numbers continue to increase. First quarter report showed 29.5% increase in paid memberships.
- To date, we have secured 81 new 1924 memberships toward our goal of 100 in honor of the Alumni Association turning 100 in 2024.
- Applications for the 2025 entering freshmen License to HOWL scholarships are now being accepted. Eight recipients will be selected to receive \$5,000 annual awards with an option to renew in successive years if they continue to meet the criteria. We currently have 31 students receiving this annual scholarship.

The Blue Eats Café provides an extended menu with fresh sandwiches and made-to-order restaurant-style options. Great Western Dining, the Arkansas State University-Beebe (ASUB) dining vendor, provided funding for the remodeling of the food-preparation area. The service-counter design looks fresh and modern, and the Café' is adorned with ASUB blue colors and branding.

### **ASUB Featured on Popular Higher Education Podcast**

Dr. Methvin was the featured guest recently on *The EdUp Experience Podcast*. The episode, "Serving the 'Gray Box'", was released on October 9, and is a part of the "President Series." ## Chancellor's Report Arkansas State University-Mountain Home

### Launch of Element 451

Arkansas State University-Mountain Home (ASUMH) joined the growing number of ASU System colleges investing in the artificial intelligence-enabled, customer-service, management-system known as Element 451. This student-engagement solution aligns with students' expectations for increased digital experiences for all aspects of their interaction with processes throughout the entire time that they are connected to the College. From the very first connection, through the application for admission, to graduation, and beyond, this platform allows students, faculty, and staff to know exactly where every student is along their educational journey, with insights to help everyone remain engaged and on track to success. ASUMH is well into the development phase, with the full launch being rolled out through late 2024 and early 2025.

### <u>StreamTeam</u>

Mountain Home High School students on the "STREAMTeam" gathered at ASUMH to study Dodd Creek, which runs through the campus. The students took several stream-bank measurements to measure erosion levels along the creek's banks, as well as studying the stream's aquatic life and chemical balance. The StreamTeam takes a deeper look at the ways that human activity has coincided with natural environmental events to improve or harm the environmental situation. This ongoing "living laboratory" project is working in partnership with ASUMH's Biology Department and is made possible by the Friends of the North Fork and White Rivers.

### Winter Intersession

ASUMH is currently registering students for fully online, four-week, winter classes that begin December 16 and end on January 9. Offerings include a wide variety of General Education courses for ASUMH and transient students, who may need to complete an additional course during the academic year. The winter-session concept was tested with just three classes in December 2023. Based on the success of that test run, the project was expanded significantly for 2024.

### Center for Student Success

As part of the comprehensive, organization-structure, review and realignment that occurred at ASUMH from October 2023 through September 2024, a new "one-stop" Center for Student Success was developed and launched. Part of the College's overall recruiting, advising, and retention plan, the Center houses essential student services, including Admissions, Financial Aid, Registrar Services, Veterans and Disability Services, Student Success coaches, and more. Other colleges that have all these functions in one central location have experienced positive gains with students, and similar early indications are already showing the same to be true at ASUMH.

### **Comprehensive Academic Program Review**

In November 2024, ASUMH began an initiative to review every academic program and degree option, with a strategic team approach for studying viability and growth potential. The team, comprised of new and veteran employees, is learning about program-specific operations, historical outcomes, capacity opportunities or constraints, return on investment, etc. This work will lead to each program having growth goals, targeted marketing plans, fundraising goals, and an enhanced focus on employer-partner engagement.

**Curriculum Revision**

### Chancellor's Report Arkansas State University Mid-South

### Enrollment Update

Fall 2024 marks the second consecutive fall semester of growth for ASU Mid-South. While headcount increased by only five students year over year, the total number of student semester credit hours (SSCH) increased 7.3 percent. That increase indicates that attending students are enrolling in more courses than during the previous fall semester.

While overall enrollment showed a mere 0.6 percent growth, enrollment in shortterm (8-week semester) coursework indicated significant increases. Short-Term 1 showed a 24.2 percent increase in headcount and a 24.6 percent increase in SSCH. Short-Term 2 revealed a 14.2 percent increase in headcount and a 14.3 increase in SSCH. These increases reflect a changing landscape in higher education, as more students are eschewing the traditional 16week model of instruction, in favor of a model that provides them a more flexible and quicker return on their investment of time and tuition.

## Higher Learning Commission Update

## Reaffirmation of Accreditation

On August 30, ASU Mid-South received the following confirmation that the Institutional Actions Committee (IAC) of the Higher Learning Commission, "...continued the accreditation of Arkansas State University Mid-South with the next Reaffirmation of Accreditation in 2033-34." This long-awaited result follows a 10-Year Comprehensive Evaluation Site Visit by a Peer Review Team from the Higher Learning Commission (HLC), which was held on April 8-9. This positive outcome was the culmination of a lot of hard work and a committed team effort. Special thanks go to Dr. Emilee Sides, Associate Vice Chancellor for Institutional Effectiveness and Planning, for her outstanding leadership as Accreditation Liaison Officer (ALO) and for her positive spirit throughout the preparation and review processes.

### New HLC Peer Reviewers Appointed

Vice Chancellor for Student Services, Jeremy Reece, and Associate Vice Chancellor for Institutional Effectiveness and Planning, Dr. Emilee Sides, were both recently selected to become a part of the Higher Learning Commission's Peer Corps of reviewers. The insight and knowledge they will gain from this experience will no doubt help to inform our own internal policies and processes and help to ensure that ASU Mid-South remains solidly positioned for our next accreditation cycle.

### **Complete College America (CCA)**

### Annual Convening

CCA invited ASU Mid-South to present an overview of its student-success work at its Annual Convening, held in Indianapolis, Indiana, on November 17-21. A team, consisting of Chancellor Debra West, Vice Chancellor for Student Affairs Jeremy Reece, Vice Chancellor for Learning and Instruction Jeff Gray, and Dean for Student Success Dr. Stephanie Krehl, will be discussing the various changes the College has made to advising, course scheduling, developmental education, financial aid, and student support services in its efforts to incentivize credit accumulation and credential completion. ASU Mid-South has increased its IPEDS graduation rate from 13% to 50% and its overall student success rate (which includes graduation, retention, and transfer) from 38% to 69% over the past six years and continues to be recognized by Complete College America as a national leader in its efforts to improve student success.

## <u>CCA Leadership Academy Participants Selected</u>

CCA is dedicated to empowering leaders from Predominantly Black and Historically Black Community Colleges (PBCCs and HBCCs) through Mid-Manager and Executive Leadership Academies. The mission of these yearlong, leadership-development programs is the following: (1) to develop and empower leaders from PBCCs and HBCCs; and (2) to build a robust network of change-makers who are committed to fostering student success and transforming institutions for the better.

ASU Mid-South is pleased to announce that Bridget Stewart, Director of our PBI (Predominantly Black Institutions) Grant, was accepted to Complete College America's PBCC/HBCC Mid-Manager Leadership Academy. We also congratulate Jeff Gray, Vice Chancellor for Learning and Instruction, who was accepted into the Complete College America's PBCC/HBCC Executive Leadership Academy.

Because these leadership programs are competitive, these deserving individuals' selection reflects not only the quality of their applications, but in the words of CCA, "...their outstanding accomplishments and commitment to advancing educational equity and their potential to make a significant impact in the community-college landscape." ASU Mid-South is thrilled to have them represent us in this year's leadership cohorts, and we look forward to the new perspectives and innovative ideas they will bring back to our campus as a result of their participation.

### New Hybrid Classrooms

ASU Mid-South's five-year Title III Strengthening Institutions Grant, entitled "Increasing Student Success Through Technology, concluded on September 30, 2024. This grant, awarded just prior to the pandemic in the fall of 2019, provided for the strategic implementation of various technology-driven initiatives to support delivery of both instruction and student-support services. It arrived at a critical time, as the pandemic soon forced the College to shift to more online-andalternative delivery instruction and support.

During the last quarter of the grant, funds were directed to the redesign and equipping of two classrooms, one in the University Center and the other in the Southland Science Building, which where they were converted into hybrid classrooms. These enhanced learning environments, popular with both students and faculty, allow for a mix of students to be present in the physical classroom, as well as for students joining the class virtually. They provide faculty and students more flexibility, allowing individuals to connect to the class from home when they must, while simultaneously maintaining the in-person classroom experience for those who prefer more robust, face-to-face engagement.

### New Ambulance Simulator

ASU Mid-South recently purchased and installed a state-of-the art ambulance simulator, thanks to funding provided by its Predominantly Black Institutions (PBI) grant. This programmable simulator joins with ASU Mid-South's ambulance as a valuable training tool in efforts to fulfill the demand for EMS, EMT, and Paramedics in our region, while ensuring that our graduates are positioned to be job-ready on day one.

### **BOSCH Grant**

ASU Mid-South is the recipient of a \$10,000 Bosch Community Fund Grant. Bosch Community Grant funds support education programs focused on science, technology, engineering and math (STEM), robotics and environmental sustainability. ASU Mid-South's grant funding will be used to support the College's Information Systems Technology program, including the purchase of routers and switches for its CISCO Networking Academy. Funding is by invitation only, and ASU Mid-South has been invited to participate in each round of funding since the program's inception in 2015.

### **Strategic Planning**

ASU Mid-South kicked off its 2025-2028 strategic planning cycle on November 22, with a Campus Luncheon and Planning Meeting. The first step in this work, which will conclude in the spring, was to engage on-campus stakeholders in an analysis designed to gauge our institution's strengths, weaknesses, opportunities, and threats. Dr. Martin Eggensperger, President of Black River Technical College, facilitated this highly interactive activity. Results will inform the College's Planning Committee as it works to update ASU Mid-South's 2022-2025 Strategic Plan.

## Arkansas Research and Education Optical Network (ARE-ON) Service Advisory Panel

Dr. Michael Lejman, ASU Mid-South's Associate Vice Chancellor for Institutional Technology and Research, will begin serving a two-year term on the ARE-ON Service Advisory Panel (ASAP), effective January 2025. ASAP's purpose is to provide strategic guidance that helps shape ARE-ON's services and initiatives to better serve its member institutions throughout the state. ARE-ON is a not-forprofit organization, the mission of which is to promote, develop, and apply leading technologies to support and enhance research, education, public safety, health care, and economic development in the state of Arkansas

## Small Works on Paper Exhibit

ASU Mid-South hosted the 37<sup>th</sup> Annual Exhibition of Small Works on Paper in the Donald W. Reynolds Center on November 8–25. This annual, juried, touring, visual-art exhibition showcases 2D artwork, no larger than 18-by-24 inches, that is created by Arkansas artists. All work selected for this exhibit must be original, on paper, and completed within the last two years. Submitting artists must be on the Artist Registry. The exhibit at ASU Mid-South was made possible by the support of the Arkansas Arts Council, the Arkansas Department of Heritage, DeltaARTS, and the Rocky Smith Endowment for the Arts at ASU Mid-South.

## Saline County CareerTechnical Campus

Saline County CareerTechnical Campus<u>(SCCTC)</u> received a \$20,000 planning grant through the HIRED Grant process and an invitation to submit a larger grant request in mid-November. The focus of the program is to develop pathways for skills-development in the advanced manufacturing, aerospace, and defense sectors.

## Arkansas State UniversityThree Rivers Adult Education

A new Integrated Education and Training (IET) program is underway at our Malvern Site. The Certified Clinical Medical Assistant training class will conclude in late October, with a new class beginning in early November. These eight-week courses provide specialized training and prepare students for certification exams in their respective fields.

### Malvern Campus Career Center and Workforce Development Update

The Skills USA annual Fresh Country Fund Raising drive was a success, generating more than \$23,000 in sales and donations. This resulted in a profit of approximately \$9,000 to support student activities.

Our Workforce Development's partnership with West Fraser Qualified Millwright and Electrician programs continues, with 2,442 hours of training scheduled through the end of FY 2025. We are currently conducting the ASUTR Professional Development Academy for the following mills: West Fraser of Joyce, LA; Angelina,TX; and Henderson,TX; as well as Xpress Boats and Veranda Luxury Pontoon; the Clark County Workforce Training Group (Siplast, South Central Electric Cooperative/South Central Connect, Drumco, Samantha's Café and Bakery, Arkadelphia Alliance); RBD Construction; Jasper Lumber Co., Jasper, AL; SoutheasternTimber Do, Akerman MS.

ASUTR Workforce hosted several Welding Basics classes in September and will provide professional development training for Southern Bancorp in Arkadelphia in November.

### **Student Affairs and Retention**

On September 23, ASU Three Rivers hosted the ASU Three Rivers College Fair, which was attended by students from Malvern, Poyen, Ouachita, Glen Rose, and Magnet Cove High Schools.

Six hundred twenty-eight ASU Three Rivers students received federal, state, institutional, or private aid, totaling \$5,223,523.76, an average of \$8,317.71 for each student. Vergina Smith, ASUTR's Associate Vice-Chancellor for Student Retention and TRiO Director, scheduled a Community Advisory Board Meeting/Ministers' Alliance Friendsgiving Dinner for November 11, and the Retention Awareness Council's "Sip 'N Mingle" event for December 9.

Our College Learning Advocate received 39 referrals, affecting 36 students from Early Alerts, PCS Course face-to-face meetings, C.A.R.E. (Campus Assessment Response and Education) Team referrals, and high school career coaches. We are pleased that ASUTR's Career Pathways program has been approved for continued funding from DHS for FY25, receiving \$417,988.

The Eagle Outreach Pantry served 56 unduplicated households in August, with 24 of these being new families. In September, the Pantry served 44 households, 20 of which were new. As of October 7, 2024, the Pantry had assisted 20 households, with seven being new clients.

### Chancellor's Report Henderson State University

### Spring and Fall 2025 Recruitment:

Recruitment for Spring and Fall 2025 is in full swing. This year, we have a full admissions staff (the first since 2017). We have also added two full-timeTexas and Louisiana recruiters. Below are the current recruitment statistics:

- B. Admits Fall: +641 (+80%)
- C. Students Accepting Scholarships Fall: +362
- D. International Applications: +7
- E. Spring Admits: +80

## High School Visits:

The Henderson Admissions team has visited more than 35 high schools and college fairs in Arkansas, Louisiana, and Texas since August. We have also begun holding "T-shirt Days" at many area high schools, where the chancellor visits and we give each student a T-shirt (acting as a walking billboard among their classmates). We have heldT-shirt Days at Centerpoint, Cutter Morning Star, Malvern, Arkadelphia, Mena, Lake Hamilton, and Sheridan (upcoming).

## Fiscal Strength:

Henderson continues to make great strides in fiscal strength. We held a budget review with our University Budget Committee in October, confirming that we met our budget for the fall. We received a clean audit from the state, and our Moody's rating was upgraded to Baa1. We will hold a second budget review in February. These are tremendous signs of increased stability.

## <u>Advertising:</u>

We continue to increase our advertising on social media, billboards, radio, television, and in print. We will have two billboards inTexas beginning in the spring semester.

## The Reddie Network:

In cooperation with our Board of Visitors and Alumni Board, we launched the Reddie Network. This organization engages alumni in recruiting, internships, job placement, and fundraising. Educators were our initial target group. Since its November 1 launch, 518 alumni have become members.

## Academics:

We will submit our new three-year (90-hour) Criminal Justice degree to the ADHE Coordinating Board for final approval in January.

Our new Film Acting major will begin in Fall 2025, pending approval.

A recent ACE visiting accreditation team gave a very positive review of our Master's in Nursing degree. This will now proceed to the national board.

We received a \$50,000 Windgate Foundation grant in November for classroom technology upgrades in ourTeachers College.

### **Campus Renovations and Improvements:**

General campus improvements continue, including power washing, painting, carpentry repairs, and new signage. We are developing a needed green space along Henderson Street for intramural sports, band practices, and university events. Renovations to Russell Fine Arts Building, Mooney Hall, Smith Hall, and two chemistry labs will begin before Christmas. The historic Henderson Bell, restored thanks to the Henderson Foundation, was dedicated on November 16. It's located on the south lawn.

### Athletics:

The Battle of the Ravine football game drew over 9,700 spectators to Carpenter-Hagood Stadium. Gate revenues exceeded \$44,000 (compared to \$12,000 last year).

We are hiring a new track coach (process to be completed by Christmas), and the track program will resume in August 2025.

Fundraising is underway for several sports, including a covered batting and pitching facility for baseball.

### Cafeteria and Community:

In September, we opened the Malachi Smith Cafeteria to the community for Sunday lunch and dinner (12:00–5:00 p.m.). Since September 15, 1,032 community members have dined there on Sundays.
