 - Advancing the Integration of Digital Therapeutics into Addiction Management Strategies: Engaging Multidisciplinary Stakeholders for Optimal Application in Practice

Student Health Center:

- The Director and Assistant Director earned the American College Health Association (ACHA) College Health and Wellness Professional (CHWP) certification over the summer. This endorsement authenticates the Center's commitment to providing quality healthcare and supports ADHE's mission to successfully transform the lives of students.
- The Student Health Center provided full access to students during both summer terms. More than 40% of patients treated during that time reported having no medical insurance.
- Provided more than 100 screenings for Sexually Transmitted Infections (STIs). The CDC estimates that youth, ages 15-24, account for half of the 20 million new sexually transmitted infections that occur in the United States each year, making testing essential in reducing transmission rates.
- Provided Family Planning services for 50 students.

- Completed 200 various vaccinations and immunization titers for Summer I and Summer II students to verify adequate immunity from communicable diseases.
- Provided Hepatitis A vaccines for newly hired Sodexo employees to promote the availability of vaccine and prevent disease transmission on campus.
- Completed TB skin tests to date for healthcare majors screening for tuberculosis (TB). This is a key strategy for controlling and preventing infection on university campuses.
- Performed pre-participation physical exams (90) to verify the health statuses of nursing students prior to clinical curriculum participation.
- Provided educational sessions for student groups, including a Physical Therapy Workshop: How to Examine the Breasts for Healthcare Professionals; Protect the Skin You're In; Sun-safe Summer, and a student athlete recruitment event.
- Student Health Center staff completed various continuing education hours required to maintain designated licensures, including basic life support (BLS), advanced cardiac life support (ACLS), APN primary care conference, and numerous disease-specific credits. This allows staff to keep up-to-date with advancements and new research, thus improving their skills and knowledge about patient care.
- Provided mass health screening for new incoming international students to ensure adequate health status and documentation.

ENROLLMENT MANAGEMENT

Admissions:

- Technolutions Slate, the customer relations management (CRM) platform for undergraduate admissions, launched August 1. Procedures are being developed to promote consistent processing of applications and multimedia communication. Applications are in progress for graduate and international student populations.
- Fall 2019 application processing continues to be done in a timely manner, allowing students to move promptly to the next step in the onboarding process. Staff participated in July advising events to assist with enrollment.
- Key positions have been filled to advance the division's enrollment initiatives, including a new senior director of admissions and transfer-student services director.
- Office realignment has already expanded our capacity to reach students. Processing staff have assisted counselors with school visits this month. Transfer student services held transfer days at four two-year sites over the summer, and participated in two community events.
- Additional new staff include part-time transfer coordinators across the state at four two-year sites. Degree centers at Beebe, Mid-South, and Mountain Home will not assist with recruitment. Vacancies will be filled for a processor and counselor.
- Campus visits have been revamped and integrated with Slate for better functionality and ease of use.
- Upcoming recruitment events include the following: Jonesboro Rivalry Football Game (8/26), Salt Bowl (8/30), and ASU-Beebe Transfer Tailgate (9/4).

Financial Aid and Scholarships:

- Financial Aid & Scholarships disbursed more than \$10,000,000 in financial aid for the 2019 summer terms.
- Scholarship processing and award offers continue for the Fall 2019 new freshman class. Federal and state financial-aid award processing for current and returning students for the 2019-2020 academic is underway.
- Department staff participated in various campus and community outreach events:

DEAN OF STUDENTS

Residence Life:

- Residence Life hosted an External Review Team on campus to provide expert feedback on the department operations/long-term strategy for improvement. The three-person team, including a professional with tenure in the field of Residence Life, met with administrators, department staff, students, and campus partners, and focused on the following items:
 - Better utilization of resources (budget, staff, campus partners) to improve brand, student retention, and overall student experience
 - Options for long-term facility allocation and usage
 - Strategies to maximize efficiency of StarRez occupancy management system
 - Programming model to create an engaged campus community
- Residence hall summer renovations/updates include: refurbished showers for Kays Hall; updated lobby (paint, flooring, furnishings) for Kays Hall; balcony restoration for Kays Hall; new beds for female residents in Kays Hall; hallway carpet removal in University Hall; and closure of Collegiate Park pool.
- Residence Life hosted various special population move-in dates and the annual Operation Move-In during the month of August. A total of 3,179 assignment reservations were made for Fall 2019. Residence Life staff confirmed housing assignments by the 11th class day.
- The department collaborated with the Leadership Center to host the annual Back-to-School Luau in August. The event is designed to provide an opportunity for students to socialize and tour campus prior to the first day of classes.
- The department collaborated with International Programs to host a Fall Welcome Party for campus residents in August.

Leadership Center:

- Transitioned New Student Registration to a comprehensive New Student Orientation program. The
 college-specific, full-day program provides incoming students and parents a more in-depth opportunity to
 interact with faculty/staff, to learn about campus resources, and to create a fall course schedule. The
 new platform offers an occasion to welcome new students to the A-State community and demonstrate
 our commitment to student success. Sessions began in April and continued through June.
- Greek Life hosted the fraternity and sorority recruitment in August. A total of 247 women were extended membership bids at the conclusion of sorority recruitment. A total of 145 men participated in fraternity recruitment, and fraternities continue to extend open bids to interested students.
- Welcome Week was hosted the first week of classes. Events included Water Wars, the annual Community and Organization Fair, Silent Disco, a downtown block party in partnership with Downtown Jonesboro, and Aux Wars.
- Order of Pack was held on August 29. The annual event highlights spirit traditions and prepares students for the home football games.
- Volunteer A-State hosted a blood drive in September to support the local blood bank and continues to serve the campus community with the Food Pantry.

Campus Recreation:

- Fall club sports include the following: rugby, spirit squads, softball, shooting sports, swimming, bass fishing, archery, and eSports.
- Fall fitness classes include the following: spin, body fit, Zumba, yoga, abs, and cardio mashup. Classes are offered five days a week for students.

FINANCE AND ADMINISTRATION

First National Bank Arena (FNBA):

- Maintenance and repair for Parking Lots A, B, and C are completed
- Tickets are on sale now for Zack Williams on Thursday, October 24.

Facilities Management (FM):

• Hotel & Conference Center: The record 2018-2019 precipitation has delayed the hotel completion date to November 1, 2019.

Budget Planning/Development:

- The FY20-approved ASUJ and ASU-System operating budgets were successfully loaded into Banner to facilitate the seamless workflow for departmental constituents.
- Budget office staff rolled budget and payroll records within the Banner system to provide a seamless transition for employee payroll payments on the July 15, 2019, payroll. In addition, multiple audits of the data occurred to insure that the Student Affairs organizational restructuring was incorporated correctly into the Banner systems.

Human Resources:

- Office of Title IX & Institutional Equity:
 - Title IX team members attended the Association of Title IX Administrators (ATIXA) Sexual Harassment Case Processing & Resolution: Civil Rights Investigator Level Three Certification Course (May 2019) and Title IX Compliance and Athletics Certification Course (August 2019).

Employee Training & Development:

- Hosted 120 new staff members for Part 1 and Part 2 of Orientation from May to August
- Delivered 36 (and counting) new faculty welcome boxes and presented at New Faculty Orientation
- Coordinated an active shooter training for all faculty members in conjunction with Fall Faculty Conference

Environmental Health and Safety (EHS):

Significant items this quarter include the following: discussion with Associate Vice Chancellor of
research about additional animal research space, completion of the application for renewal of the
University radioactive materials license, and completion of the permit renewal for the University
municipal separate storm sewer system program.

Payroll Services:

• Time Clock Plus (TCP) Integration with go-live set for September 2, 2019. TCP pilot testing is continuing, as Payroll and IT work together to resolve issues with leave appearance on check stubs for employees. IT is currently working on the COMP extract that is required for a go-live.

Red Wolf Wellness:

- Developed a new wellness education program for faculty and staff. Multiple departments on campus, Blue Cross Blue Shield, and St. Bernards will be assisting with these educational offerings. Offerings will include various health and wellness topics in the form of presentations, lunch and learns, workshops, etc., and are designed to educate, motivate, and encourage employees to make improvements and seek assistance through the Red Wolf Wellness program.
- Submitted the application for the A-State Archery Club to become a club sport. We were accepted by club sports and will be building a collegiate archery team this fall.
- Created a new wellness screening offering for campus. We have purchased new screening equipment and now are offering satellite wellness screenings at multiple locations on campus.

University Safety and Emergency Management (USEM):

- Coordinated Lock Out/Tag Out training for Facilities Management electricians
- Conducted driving-safety training for Facilities Management
- Installed AEDs and bleeding control kits in Military Science, SAC, Eugene Smith, Animal Science, Equine Center, Centennial Bank Stadium, Educational Leadership, ABI, Administration, and Delta Center
- Conducted fire extinguisher and evacuation training for Residence Life

Information and Technology (ITS):

- Uniform ERP for System Campuses Jonesboro's transition to the cloud to create a multi-entity ERP environment is underway and making good progress. Jonesboro's transition will require 12 months. The five campus cohort that includes all two-year schools will begin directly after Jonesboro's completion, and they will embark on an 18-month trek to transition to the uniform ERP for all campuses. The total six-campus project timeline is scheduled for 30 months.
- Campus Projects For the fiscal year to date, 36 classroom audio/visual upgrades and remodels were completed, eight major construction projects requiring full detailed IT integration and installation were completed, and various campus-safety door locks and cameras were installed across campus.
- ASUJ CIO Continues to host weekly meetings with the other System campus IT leaders. The group continues to create opportunities to leverage investments between campuses and to better contain costs.
- IT Security Please continue to be diligent and on the lookout for suspicious emails and malicious websites. If in doubt, don't click.

Fiscal Operations:

- Controller's Office: TCard and Department Card transactions are now live in the Concur Travel System and will be reconciled and approved in Concur. The PCard implementation in Concur will begin soon and is expected to go live in October.
- Treasurer's Office: In coordination with the Controller's Office, the 2019 fiscal year was closed successfully. Efforts continue to assist students in enrolling for the fall semester, including assisting with payment strategies for past balances and financial counseling for upcoming charges.
- Business Services and Risk Management: The office completed a review of the University's policy and procedure process, resulting in a recommendation of centralized administration and an updated online platform to enhance communication. In addition, the University's property was reappraised by the Arkansas Division of State Risk Management for the 2019-20 property insurance renewal.
- Procurement/Contract Administration and Strategic Sourcing: Procurement Services sponsored the annual Supplier Trade Show on May 8, with 41 vendors and more than 400 employees attending.

Delta Center for Economic Development:

• The Delta Center was selected by the Delta Regional Authority to continue as one of the University partners administering the Delta Leadership Institute and Delta Leadership Network, a Delta Regional Authority leadership program in eight states.

University Police Department (UPD):

- University Police Officers delivered approximately 1,400 welcome packets in each room of the freshmen residence halls. The welcome packets include information about how to contact UPD, upcoming events during Campus Safety Week, downloading the campus safety app <u>*Quiktip*</u>, registering for the emergency alert system, and general information about the department and services it offers.
- The agency successfully completed the annual accreditation review by the Commission on Accreditation of Law Enforcement Agencies (CALEA) in August. The review found the agency in full compliance with all applicable professional standards.

Auxiliary Services Unit Report:

• The Acansa Dining Hall underwent an extensive renovation this summer, adding two new concepts, a To-Go area and Simple Serving, which offers allergen- and gluten-free fare, fully funded by Sodexo Investment monies.

UNIVERSITY ADVANCEMENT

Advancement Services:

• For the fiscal year, July 1, 2018 through June 30, 2019, the University recorded a total of 29,260 gifts and commitments from 8,740 individual donors for a total of \$16,373,277.85. The overall giving total includes outright donations of cash, gifts-in-kind, planned gifts, and new pledges. This makes for the fourth-best giving year in our history.

Alumni Relations:

- Alumni Association memberships have remained at more than 5,000 for the second year in a row. Since fiscal year-end 2018, our 1924 Sustaining Life Memberships have increased by 44.
- The alumni giving rate at fiscal year-end 2019 was 9.3 percent. That is an increase of 1.08 percent from fiscal year-end 2018.
- The faculty and staff giving rate for A-State is at 56 percent, which is a one percent increase from fiscal year-end 2018.
- The number of official A-State license plates continues to grow, with revenues in excess of \$134,000. As of June 30, 2019, we had sold 5,006 license plates.
- The Cooper Alumni Center continues to increase its usage for events. Comparing the 2017-2018 year to 2018-2019, more events were booked, and a record number of attendees visited the facility once again. We are cautiously looking at the future when setting goals for the building due to Embassy Suites opening at the end of this calendar year. The close proximity of that facility will impact our rental revenues.
- The 2019 Distinguished Alumni have been selected. The three individuals to be honored this year are Dalton "Alec" Farmer of Jonesboro, Thomas Fowler of Jonesboro, and Donald Harmon of Jonesboro. They will be honored at a breakfast to be held October 26 at the Cooper Alumni Center.
- A new award, the Emerging Young Alumni (EYA) award, was developed between the Alumni Association and the Student Philanthropy Council. The 2019 EYA recipients are Cale Block of Little Rock, Catherine Rasberry of Atlanta, GA, Katrina Scoggin of Cordova, TN, Jamie Scott of North Little Rock, and Sydney "Ali" Sugg of Heber Springs. These outstanding alumni will be honored at a reception held on September 20 at the Cooper Alumni Center.
- Alumni outreach events are in the works for the upcoming year. Two of these alumni gatherings were held in Las Vegas during the A-State vs. UNLV football game the weekend of September 6 and 7. An Alumni & Friends Homecoming Tailgate Party will take place at the Cooper Alumni Center before the football game against Texas State on October 26. Pancakes & PJs will be held December 7 at the Cooper Alumni Center.

Career Services:

- Career Services reviewed 1,091 resumes, cover letters, and graduate application letters; conducted 252 mock interviews; and hosted 17 employer interviews for 160 students during the 2018-19 academic year. Student participation with campus interviews increased by 31 percent.
- Approximately 4,721 student contacts were made through classroom presentations, after-hours workshops, career fairs, and special events during the 2018-19 academic year.
- Approximately 458 employers and 1,667 students participated in six careers fairs. This shows that student participation increased by 12 percent, and employer participation increased by three percent.
- Career Services increased *Employer Sponsorship* funds by 45 percent.

Marketing and Communications:

• Marketing and Communications provided support to the NEA Race for the Cure, involving special testimonial packages that featured A-State campus survivor, Sandra Combs. In addition to promotion

and videos, on-campus banners were created to promote the event, the largest 5K in the region. The introduction of a new provost, Alan Utter, was also managed live for our own media and other traditional media. The delivery of diplomas to two A-State graduates in Mississippi, through our online master's program, was one of the top individual online traffic features.

- Digital Creative Media generated special packages concerning study-abroad programs, including the first of a series of videos shot overseas with study-abroad students in Eastern Europe. Digital Creative Media also began providing direct assistance to Enrollment Management's communication front end on the Slate software system. Overall, Digital Creative Media generated 46 video packages for distribution.
- Social Media registered another record day with the livestreaming of the Spring 2019 commencement exercises from First National Bank Arena. Facebook remains the primary platform for video viewing, particularly streaming content. Facebook also changed its metrics. According to its new measures, our video engagement was up 248 percent, compared to the first quarter, with 126,600 minutes viewed, and with just over 35,000 minutes during commencement. In overall social media, our audience remained steady in Facebook at 113,397 followers. In other channels, A-State's main page broke past 40,000 on Twitter and captured almost 13,000 (12,900) on Instagram.
- Creative Services logged 292 jobs, but the most significant was the completion of an all-new campus viewbook in support of Enrollment Management. Also, special retirement items were created for departing provost, Lynita Cooksey, and Arkansas Heritage Sites director, Ruth Hawkins.

ATHLETICS

Men's Golf:

- A school-record four students were named All-Sun Belt, including Zan Luka Stirn, Julien Sale, Luka Naglic and Joel Wendin. Naglic was also tabbed the league's Freshman of the Year.
- The Red Wolves were named a Golf Coaches Association of America (GCAA) All-Academic Team for the 2018-19 season. Joel Wendin and Matthew Cole were named Srixon/Cleveland Golf All-America Scholars.

Women's Golf:

• The Red Wolves placed five student-athletes on the Women's Golf Coaches Association's (WGCA) prestigious All-American Scholars list. A-State posted the fifth-best team GPA in the nation, making it one 25 teams in the country to earn a WGCA All-Scholar Team GPA award.

Track & Field:

- Senior Michael Carr was named a First Team All-American after collecting a fifth-place finish in the pole vault at the NCAA Outdoor Championships.
- Sophomore Carter Shell finished 14th in the long jump to earn Second Team All-American recognition.
- Senior sprinter Caitland Smith also earned Second Team All-American honors in both the 100-meter and 200-meter dash events.

• The women's team was recognized as a US Track & Field & Cross Country Coaches Association (USTFCCCA) All-Academic Team after posting a 3.38 GPA for the 2018-19 academic year.

Baseball:

• Senior first baseman Kyle MacDonald was selected with the 825th pick in the 27th round by the New York Yankees in the 2019 Major League Baseball Draft.

Football:

- Hosted by the Red Wolves Foundation, the eighth annual "Helmets and Heels" program, featuring members of the A-State football team, was held July 30 at Centennial Bank Stadium.
- The Red Wolves have placed nine players on 10 different preseason watch lists.
- The Red Wolves had a league-high of 11 different players named as 2019 Preseason All-Sun Belt Conference.
- A-State signed a one-game contract to play at Ohio State on September 10, 2022.

Athletics:

- The A-State Lettermen's Club will induct five new members into the A-State Hall of Honor, including former football players Alex Carrington, Greg Lee, and Jimmy Lisko; former women's soccer player Shawna Sparks; and the late Rachel Stewart of the women's golf team.
- Five current and four former A-State student-athletes, including Super Bowl champion Bryan Hall, earned either their bachelor's or master's degree at A-State's Summer Commencement ceremony in August.

Created a streamlined admission process that aligns with ways in which domestic and international students are admitted to ASU-Jonesboro. Students will be admitted in three categories just as they are on the ASUJ campus: unconditionally, conditionally, or ESL. - 4. Northwest Office: A new office will be launched next September and will be responsible for Baja and Sonora.

- 6. South Office: All states in the southern part of the country; will be located in Puebla.

Advanced Engineering and Collaborative Design Laboratory:

ASU Campus Queretaro held the opening ceremony of the ASUCQ Advanced Engineering and Collaborative Design Laboratory on August 21, 2019. The main campus was represented by the Provost Utter, Dean Bhattacharyya, and Dr. Sivakumaran. This exciting project is a joint effort of ASUCQ, General Motors, and Siemens, and represents a significant step in building relationships with education and industry. It is Phase 2 of ASUCQ's strong relationship with GM Mexico. The ceremony was attended by the CEO of General Motors Mexico, Ernesto Hernandez, and the Vice-President and General Country Manager for Mexico and Central America of Siemens, Alejandro Canela. The laboratory hosts state-of-the-art software for automotive design and will be used not only to train industry professionals but ASUCQ students as well.

There are other exciting developments with respect to the collaboration between the College of Engineering and Computer Science on the main campus and their colleagues in Queretaro. These are listed below:

- Five juniors, four in electrical engineering and one in mechanical engineering, are visiting the main campus from Queretaro. Dr. Paul Mixon is acting as their college faculty mentor. In order to enhance their learning experience, student visits to local industries are planned as well as student internships.
- The Mechanical Engineering Program Director from ASUCQ, Dr. Shivan Haran, is working to develop a tribology minor. Tribology is the science of friction, lubrication and wear. The tribology minor will help the mechanical engineering program at ASUCQ initiate an education and research program with financial support from and in collaboration with <u>CSWI</u>, a global leader in the manufacturer of specialty chemicals, including high performance lubricants.
- Other activities that are being planned are "virtual" engineering faculty gatherings between both campuses, presentation of research talks via "zoom," and visits by one or more ASUCO engineering faculty members to Jonesboro during the summer of 2020.

Chancellor's Report Arkansas State University-Beebe

New Program Partnership

During a ceremony on July 17, Arkansas State University-Beebe and Yamaha Motor Corporation, U.S.A. formally signed a partnership agreement to establish a training program for outboard marine motor technicians at ASU-Beebe's Searcy campus. The Yamaha-specific outboard training will be incorporated into ASU-Beebe's current Power Sports program, in which students learn to repair and maintain a variety of outdoor sports vehicles and engines. This two-year program is the first of its kind in the state, open to both high-school and college-level students. High-school students from area schools participate in this and other technical training programs through the Regional Career Center at the ASU-Beebe Searcy campus. No changes to the current curriculum are required. Most importantly, this partnership and enhanced training program represent a generous commitment by Yamaha Motor Corporation USA in the form of advisement, endorsement, training aids, instructional materials, and equipment. It is a model industry investment in higher education, providing both expertise and resources to support high-tech training.

Student Leadership Scholars Field Experience

Student Leadership Scholars at ASU-Beebe recently participated in a Student Leadership Experience field trip to Washington, D.C. The field study experience provides ASU-Beebe leadership students the opportunity to engage with other leadership cohorts in practicing the Student Leadership program learning outcomes. Student leaders are able to experience co-curricular opportunities to study, engage, and collaborate with others in practicing the four main goals of the student leadership program: advocate for others, serve others, inspire others to join, and celebrate diversity.

100% Licensure Pass Rate

Administration and nursing faculty at ASU-Beebe's Practical Nursing program are celebrating the recently released statistics from the Nursing National Council on Licensure Examination results, which revealed that ASU-Beebe's classes achieved a 100 percent pass rate for 2019.

Celebration of Giving

A special "Celebration of Giving" thank-you event was held at the home of John and Robin Hayes in June to honor the 2018-2019 donors of ASU-Beebe. Dr. Methvin honored eight donors with special recognition in appreciation for their gifts and for the essential role they play in support of ASU-Beebe students. The *2018-2019 Community Report* was also unveiled at the event.

Upward Bound

Students participating in this summer's Upward Bound program at ASU-Beebe recently returned from an educational trip to Colorado. The program requires students to attend 16 Saturday classes during the academic year, participate in after-school tutoring programs, and a six-week summer program. The

summer program consists of the students living in the ASU-Beebe residence halls for five weeks during the months of June and July. The sixth week is spent going on an educational and cultural trip. In Colorado, the Upward Bound group visited the U.S. Air Force Academy Planetarium, the Garden of the Gods, the Manitu Cliff Dwellings, and local museums.

Vanguard Discovery Camps

The Vanguard Discovery Camps were held for two weeks each on the Heber Springs, Searcy, and Beebe campuses. The STEM-focused summer learning camps began June 3 and wrapped up July 19. Designed for students entering the fourth through eighth grades, Vanguard Discovery Camp offers a series of fun, hands-on, engaging, and challenging courses in the science, engineering, technology, and math (STEM) fields.

Community Connections through Art

ASU-Beebe Professor of Art, Thomas Fernandez, and his wife Irina, with the help of lots of students and community members, spent many hot summer evenings painting a mural depicting the history of Beebe in downtown Beebe. The mural was designed to commemorate the city's 144th birthday. Part of the mural portrays ASU-Beebe's State Hall Building, which was dedicated in 1938 and is a Beebe landmark as the second oldest building on the ASU-Beebe campus. In August, Dr. Methvin hosted a "Meet Me at the Mural" painting party, where many employees and community members enjoyed lending their hands to the project.

Welding Shop Remodel

After a careful review of the facilities related to the welding program on the Searcy Campus, the decision was made to move forward with a plan to increase the efficiency of the HVAC and exhaust system and make improvements to the space utilization. Chancellor's Report Arkansas State University – Mountain Home

1. Charity Classic Golf Tournament

The Charity Classic Golf Tournament raised \$25,717.53 to be used for the Arkansas State University-Mountain Home Technical Center. The three-person scramble was held on June 8 and 9 at Big Creek Country Club.

2. Suzanne Schmoker Sutherland Scholarship

Suzanne Schmoker Sutherland, a former faculty member at ASUMH, recently made a donation of \$32,542 to establish the Suzanne Schmoker Sutherland Scholarship.

3. Cynthia J. Aldrich Scholarships

Cynthia J. (CJ) Aldrich recently named Arkansas State University-Mountain Home as a beneficiary of her trust. Two scholarships were established: the Cynthia J. Aldrich Women's Scholarship, and the Cynthia J. Aldrich Veteran's Scholarship. The CJ Aldrich Women's Scholarship will be an endowed amount of \$225,000. The CJ Aldrich Veteran's Scholarship will be established with an endowed amount of \$112,000.

4. Beshears/Tinnon Endowed Scholarship

A gift of Integrity First Bank stock was recently bestowed by Sanford Beshears. An endowed scholarship in the amount of \$51,205 from the sale of the stock was established in memory of Sanford's late wife, Cynthia Tinnon Beshears, and her parents, Thomas B. Tinnon and T. Adele Tinnon.

5. ASUMH Amphitheatre

A gift of approximately \$200,000 has been presented to ASUMH to build an Amphitheatre on campus. Two possible sites include the approximate location of the stage used for the Red, White and Blue Festival, or directly east of the First Security Amphitheatre at the Sheid. Architects and engineers will be consulted regarding these two locations.

6. Walking/Biking Trail Update

The design work is progressing on the Walking/Biking Trail. The initial drawing of the proposed trail is completed. The design work is approximately 30% complete, and final drawings and specifications for bidding should be completed by late winter. Construction is anticipated to begin in the spring of 2020.

7. WalletHub Ranking

WalletHub recently ranked ASUMH the #2 Community College in the nation based on analysis of 19 metrics including: 1) cost and financing, 2) education outcomes, and 3) career opportunities.

Report of the Chancellor Arkansas State University-Newport

Strategic Priority 1: Student Success

- Several ASUN students competed in the National Skills USA conference in Louisville, KY. Kimberly Davison placed third in Cosmetology and Bianca Sebastian placed fourth in Aesthetics. Faculty member Kevin Gee judged a portion of the competition.
- Phi Beta Lambda (PBL) student Meghan Cantara won a \$500 Distinguished Business Leadership Scholarship and was recognized at the National Leadership Conference.
- ASUN received a \$401,000 Regional Workforce Continuation Grant to support its Northeast Arkansas Educating Agriculture Technology (EAT) program. ASUN plans to build an equipment facility/lab and purchase several pieces of equipment, including a pickup truck and hopper bottom trailer. ASUN is in the process of purchasing a greenhouse and raised plant beds, so that students can participate in the agricultural process regardless of the season and weather. The grant has also allowed ASUN to expand its program offerings to 10 partner high schools, so that students can earn dual-enrollment credit. In addition, partner high schools will have access to dedicated space in the greenhouse for their own growing activities, in order for students to be further introduced to agriculture technology even before they enroll at ASUN. Finally, ASUN will expand its scholarship opportunities for both secondary and post-secondary students.

Strategic Priority 2: Institutional Excellence

- ASUN purchased a 1.84 acre tract of land with a 1,267 square-foot building surrounded on three sides by ASUN property. ASUN purchased the property from the NEA Charitable Foundation at a substantial discount from the appraised price. ASUN will continue to lease the land to the Arkansas State Police for CDL testing to complement ASUN's Commercial Driver Training program.
- ASUN has completed several major improvements in Newport. The remodel of the Student Community Center is complete – creating a one-stop service area for student success. With the help of A-State, ASUN also has its 54-camera security system up and running. Finally, ASUN has completed a rekeying of its buildings and installation of an automated locking system with keycard access – providing a greater level of safety and security for faculty, staff, and students. ASUN plans to make similar improvements in both Jonesboro and Marked Tree.

Strategic Priority 3: Community Engagement

• ASUN, in connection with the Newport Downtown Entertainment Series, hosted "Movies in the Park" this summer. In May, families came out to watch "Incredibles 2." In June, the feature film was "Jumanji." The final installment in September was "Mary Poppins Returns." "Movies in the Park" is free to everyone and open to the public.

- Several employees and 23 nursing students helped the Cornerstone Transition Home prepare for a remodel at Rebecca's House of Hope. Volunteers organized donated clothes and household goods, and tore out drywall and cabinets. When completed, Rebecca's House will serve as a clothing storeroom and food pantry for those in need.
- The ASUN Board of Visitors held its quarterly meeting on August 15.
- ASUN hosted the TekStarz Camp in Newport for seventh through tenth graders interested in manufacturing. Fourteen students participated in the camp, which included industry tours, hands-on activities, and group projects introducing campers to the field of advanced manufacturing. The Jonesboro Chamber of Commerce also hosted a TekStarz Camp in which students toured ASUN-Jonesboro.
- Nineteen third through seventh graders participated in ASUN's Junior Culinary Camp. They learned kitchen basics, including food prep, following recipes, sanitation, and kitchen cleanup. They prepared their own lunch of pizza and salad, and made ice cream and cotton candy. Seven eighth through twelfth graders joined ASUN for Day 2 of Camp, where they learned skills ranging from table setting to torching crème brûlée.

Report from Chancellor Debra West Arkansas State University Mid-South

New Chief Academic Officer

ASU Mid-South is proud to welcome Dr. Debbie Thomas as its new Vice Chancellor for Learning and Instruction and Chief Academic Officer. Dr. Thomas brings with her more than 28 years of transformative higher education experience, having served in executive leadership positions in academic affairs at colleges in Kentucky, Connecticut, North Carolina, Indiana, Tennessee, Arkansas, and Florida. Dr. Thomas has consistently excelled in the areas of communication, collaboration, community outreach, and cultural diversity. We could not be more excited to have her perspective, experience, and leadership on our campus.

CDL Class B Driver's Training

Thanks to funding provided by a regional workforce grant from the Arkansas Department of Higher Education and a partnership with County Judge Woody Wheeless, ASU Mid-South has begun offering noncredit CDL Class B driver's training to Crittenden County employees who are required to operate single vehicles with a gross combination weight rating of 26,001 or more pounds, or tow a vehicle not heavier than 10,000 pounds. County employees are receiving both the classroom and practical instruction that prepares them to sit for the CDL-B exam. In this partnership, ASU Mid-South provides the instructor, while the county provides the students and the vehicles necessary for the training. This training is the college's first step towards filling a growing need for Class B drivers in both city and county government, as well as in area school districts.

Transitions for Life and Career

This fall, Transitions for Life and Career (TLC), a division of Building Better Futures, LLC, will begin offering non-credit courses at ASU Mid-South. Building Better Futures is a nonprofit organization founded by former Arkansas State Representative Mary Broadaway. Its stated mission is to "implement the state legislation that was specifically designed to enable students with intellectual/developmental disabilities (ID/DD) to participate in post-secondary educational and vocational programs." The TLC division focuses specifically on training individuals with ID/DD to become Direct Care Professionals (personal-care aides for the elderly, disabled, or those suffering from illness). TLC provides the curriculum and instruction and contracts with ASU Mid-South for training space and supplies. A primary target for this training program will be students who currently receive Individualized Education Program services in our area high schools.

Community of Champions

On July 17, ASU Mid-South hosted the Community of Champions "Advocacy Takes Action Mock Vote." The Community of Champions is a nonprofit organization that works throughout the state to advocate on behalf of citizens with disabilities. The "Advocacy Takes Action" initiative helps to educate individuals with disabilities and their families about the voting process. The free event, open to the public, included voter registration, an information station, guest speakers on disability-related issues, and – with the help of the Secretary of State's office – hands-on experience with an accessible voting booth.

Arkansas Public Fleet Professionals Association Annual Conference

ASU Mid-South will host the 2019 Arkansas Public Fleet Professionals Association (APFPA) Conference on September 18-20. APFPA's membership includes educational and governmental agencies from across the state. This year's conference boasts a diverse agenda, with team-building exercises, presentations, and panel discussions on a wide range of topics, including "Millennials in the Workplace," "Designing an Effective Succession Plan," "Pressing Fleet Issues," and "Telematics." Approximately 100 fleet superintendents and vendors are expected to be in attendance.

ASU Mid-South Greyhound Athletics

Our men's basketball season will get underway with the Greyhound Tip-Off Classic on November 1-2, followed by the Lady Greyhound Classic on November 8-9. The men's team is led by Coach Chris Parker, who is in his tenth season. The women are led by Coach Mercedes Corona, in her second season as head coach. This year's schedule features 18 home games, including 11 home double-headers. It should be an exciting year, as it will be the first year that four NJCAA teams from Arkansas will compete for the Region 2 title (North Arkansas College in Harrison, ASU Mid-South, National Park College in Hot Springs, and Southern Arkansas University Tech in Camden). Two other colleges – South Arkansas Community College in El Dorado and UA Cossatot in De Queen– also have teams, but have not yet met the requirements to be admitted into NJCAA Region 2.

Upcoming Events

ASU Mid-South has several community events upcoming for the fall semester, including the following:

• 4th Annual Hometown Showdown

September 27 is the date of the fourth annual Hometown Showdown, a community-wide tailgate party preceding the West Memphis vs. Marion High School football game. Last year's event saw more than 4,000 people in attendance, while this year's anticipated turnout is projected to be closer to 5,000. ASU Mid-South co-sponsors this event, which raises money each year to benefit the West Memphis and Marion Public Schools, as well as ASU Mid-South. This year, the event is also being used to raise money for St. Jude Children's Research Hospital. ASU Mid-South is competing with both West Memphis and Marion High Schools to raise funds for St. Jude. Third Annual Halloween Bash

It will feature a performance by the original Hi Rhythm Section, with vocal accompaniment by the illustrious Don Bryant. Presenting sponsors for this event include the City of West Memphis and Southland Gaming and Racing. All proceeds will be used to support athletic scholarships for the ASU Mid-South Greyhounds and Lady Greyhounds.
