ACADEMIC AFFAIRS AND RESEARCH

Academic Affairs and Research

- Through the work of both the Office of Academic Affairs and Research and the
 Office of Institutional Research, faculty transcripts/credentials data have been
 transitioned from paper to digital format, making the data more easily retrieved
 from Banner for federal and state reporting.
- The Office of the Registrar has partnered with Parchment beginning fall 2023, allowing graduates to receive both a digital and printed version of their credentials. The digital version of a credential is certified and can be accessed from any device and location at any time, shared using all social-media platforms, and provided to potential employers. This is particularly beneficial for our international graduates and graduates seeking employment in other states. Students are already taking advantage of the digital credential, and we expect this to increase.
- A-State Online Services reports a record number of online students in fall 2023, with 7,700 online students in both terms combined.
- During the period from June 2023-October 2023, Research and Technology
 Transfer (RTT) had a 26% success rate in sponsored proposals awarded, with a
 total funding of \$756,834. Under the leadership of the new Vice Provost for
 Research, Innovation and Discovery, RTT has shown a 54% increase in funds
 requested from submitted proposals, compared to the same five-month period the
 year before.
- A-State Arkansas Biosciences Institute (ABI) is planning a 20th anniversary celebration for September 18, 2024. More information will be forthcoming.

- The Arkansas State University College of Agriculture Meat Market has partnered with Arkansas Hunters Feeding the Hungry (AHFH) to produce and distribute shelf snack sticks for school children across the state in an effort to battle food insecurity.
- A vendor has been selected for developing the new Arkansas State University website, with development expected to commence in January.
- The Higher Learning Committee is set to visit A-State on January 6-7, 2024, to review the Doctor of Veterinary Medicine program, with hopes for an accreditation visit from the American Association of Veterinary Medical Colleges in the summer of 2024.

Access and Accommodations (AAS)

- The number of new students registered this September is currently 51, bringing total registration numbers to 947.
- The staff of AAS attended and/or conducted seven trainings and workshops combined, administered approximately 500 tests, filled two new requests for conversion of textbooks into alternative formats, and provided 430 van pickups and drop-offs to classes.

AmeriCorps

A-State's Neighborhood Red Wolves Community Engagement Program (NRWCEP)
 onboarded eight new AmeriCorps members as tutors and mentors in local
 elementary and high schools in Jonesboro.

- As a service project, NRWCEP students volunteered at an A-State childcare facility and served at a Learn, Explore and Grow community event, working with area youth.
- The director attended the annual Program Director Training, hosted by Engage
 Arkansas through the Arkansas Department of Higher Education and the Program
 Set-Up for Directors and State Commission Staff training to help combat social
 inequities and strengthen local communities.

Community Engagement

 Activities sponsored or co-sponsored during this period included promotional spots on KLEK Radio, Kwanzaa Community Awards with KLEK Radio, a silver sponsorship to El Centro Hispano Hispanic Community Center for the annual Day of the Dead celebration, and the annual Homecoming Scholarship Brunch by the Strong-Turner Alumni Chapter of the A-State Alumni Association.

Diversifying Our Curing Community (DOCC)

- DOCC is a grant-funded program for students interested in a career as a medical doctor. Students who qualify receive several benefits, including a \$1,500 stipend per semester and intensive advising and mentoring by science faculty members.
- On October 4, 2023, Rebecca Patillo, the Executive Director of the Blue and You
 Foundation, conducted an on-site visit of the DOCC program. The meeting served
 as an opportunity to review the grant's management and speak to participants,
 while ensuring the grant's objectives were being met.
- DOCC participants have had one-on-one sessions with representatives from UAMS; participated in the Heart & Sole Marathon, hosted by the Community Health Education Foundation with proceeds from the event going toward purchase of Automated External Defibrillators (AED); attended a suture clinic organized by the NYIT College of Osteopathic Medicine, providing hands-on experience in suturing techniques; attended a CPR class and received certification; and attended the Student National Medical Association's Region III Conference, hosted by UAMS.

Multicultural Center (MC)

 The MC staff has conducted 28 cultural diversity workshops during this reporting period, reaching more than 700 students through classroom presentations. Activities sponsored or participated in by the staff during this reporting period include the following: recruiting students to participate in the Salvation Army Bell Ringing program; presenting at the High School Counselors Summit in September, hosted by Admissions; setting up a recruitment table at the Southern Heritage Classic in Memphis, co-sponsored the NEA Black Health Expo in September; and the director served as the chairman of the Alpha Phi Alpha Theta Upsilon Alumni Association Planning Committee that led to the endowment of a \$50,000 scholarship during Homecoming.

Student Diversity Recruitment

 Programs to recruit underrepresented students by their student peers included assisting the Admissions staff with 145 high school students of color from eSTEM Academy in Little Rock, who visited campus on November 13.

- Coordinated the second employee Support Staff Connection Summer Workshop in July and the Department Chairs' Summer Workshop in August.
- Launched the second cohort of Leadership A-State in September.

University Safety and Emergency Management

- Created emergency action plans for residence halls.
- Worked with housing on Living Learning Center address changes.

Enterprise Risk Management

- Continued implementation of the Henderson State University Vehicle Safety Program.
- Held training meetings with EHS for the Department of Biological Sciences, relating to Vehicle Safety Program and Environmental Health and Safety information.

Fiscal Operations

- The fiscal year 2023 audit is complete, with the exit conference taking place
 November 13. Financial reports are currently being prepared and will be ready for the March Board Meeting.
- The Student Accounts area is working to help provide financial options for our students who want to register for the spring term but currently have unpaid balances.

 Parking Services has added a second option for online parking-permit order delivery; students may now choose to pick up an ordered permit at the Parking Services Office rather than have a permit delivered by USPS to a mailing address, providing a reliable option for residential students, who may not have a local mailing address.

Delta Center for Economic Development

- The Delta Center hosted its first Leadership in Banking Series session on October
 11. The group included 22 bankers representing 13 banks. The series has been
 well received and will continue on a monthly basis through February 2024.
 Instructors and discipline expertise are provided by the Neil Griffin College of
 Business, the Delta Center for Economic Development, and in partnership with
 Jonesboro Unlimited.
- A total of 57 applications were received for the first cohort of the Arkansas Delta Women's Leadership Academy, including applications from 17 counties. Only 25 will be selected for the January 20 class.
- Approximately 80 people attended the 2023 Economic Update Forum on October 20.
 This was a joint effort between the Delta Center for Economic Development and the Neil Griffin College of Business.

University Police Department

Lt. Thrasher completed a 40-hour Crisis Intervention Negotiator course. Hostile
environments and crisis situations require that officers are able to diffuse
potentially deadly scenarios with the fewest possible casualties. The course is
designed to provide law enforcement with the necessary tools to communicate as
trained crisis negotiators with subjects in volatile situations.

STUDENT AFFAIRS

Campus Recreation

- Notable campus recreation activities at the Red WOLF Center during the fall 2023 semester (September-December) include:
 - Group fitness classes, including yoga, spin, sculp, cardio/tone, HIT, and butt/guts;

- Fitness challenges to encourage students to achieve wellness goals;
- Intramural events hosted throughout the semester include football, soccer, softball, bowling, volleyball, table tennis;
- Club Sports, including Rugby, Spirit Squads, eSports, and Softball competed in a variety of events during the fall semester.

Wilson Counseling Center

- Student Affairs and the Department of Psychology and Counseling continue to partner on efforts to increase student/employee mental-health awareness and promote overall wellness initiatives for the campus community.
- The Wilson Counseling Center increased services and student outreach during Fall
 2023, including the following:
 - Individual counseling appointments: increased by 25%, compared to Fall 2022;
 - Student intake appointments: increased by 30%, compared to Fall 2022;
 - Workshops/Presentations highlighting personal development strategies: increased by 42%, compared to Fall 2022.

Leadership Center

- The Arkansas State University Parent Facebook page is used to connect parents to
 one another for support/encouragement and to serve as a question/answer venue.
 This page is active daily and allows staff to post reminders, event announcements,
 and helpful tips for supporting a college student. The platform also provides a
 "private" opportunity to parents to state a complaint and/or seek assistance for a
 frustrated student. Daily activity and group members continue to increase monthly.
- During the month of November, Student Affairs staff presented to each section of the First Year Experience-Making Connections Course. This retention basis effort provided first-year students with an overview of campus life, resources, soft skill development, goal setting, and career preparation.

Student Events on Campus

 The National Pan-Hellenic Council (NPHC) hosted NPHC Week, which consisted of volunteering and social events to encourage campus involvement. The week included the annual Best Stepper on the Yard and a Benefit Walk for Red Wolves for St. Jude's Children's Hospital.

- Student Affairs hosted a campus educational program featuring guest speaker Savvy Shields. The program focused on empowering women and promoting a positive self-image.
- Greek Life hosted a campus educational program targeting male students. Guest speaker Dr. Louis Profeta presented information on drugs, sex, and drinking.
- Volunteer A-State hosted the annual Blood Drive supporting the efforts of the American Red Cross.
- The "Reign of the Red Wolves" was the theme for Homecoming 2023. The Student Activities Board hosted an array of events for students, including a lip-sync battle, laser tag, games on the lawn, a parade, bonfire, and more! Lawson Davis and Alandria Maddox were crowned the 2023 Homecoming King and Queen.
- The fifth annual on-campus Haunted House was deemed as the "Stephen King's Madhouse" in Kays Hall.
- The A-State Food Pantry partnered with Sodexo to institute a Food Recovery Program. Each week, students pack and distribute fresh meals for those in need. The Pantry will distribute holiday bags in advance of the Thanksgiving holiday, as well as boxes of food prior to the winter break.

University Housing

- University Housing assisted the Office of Admissions with tours, information sessions, and other requests to assist prospective students with details about campus life at A-State.
- University Housing resident assistants hosted a variety of educational and social programming throughout the semester in each of their residential areas. These have been informative, fun, and well attended.
- University Housing is assisting with the University retention efforts by working with campus residents to ensure that Spring 2024 class schedules are completed and students are prepared for finals.

UNIVERSITY ADVANCEMENT

Advancement Services

- For the first quarter of the fiscal year, July 1, 2023 through September 30, 2023, the
 University recorded a total of 5,690 gifts and commitments from 2,282 individual
 donors for a total of \$1,782,062.30. The overall giving amount includes outright
 donations of cash, gifts-in-kind, planned gifts, and new pledges.
- For the 2023-24 academic year, there have been 672 privately funded scholarships awarded, totaling \$995,722.02 in awards.

Alumni Relations

- Alumni Association membership numbers continue to increase. The first quarter report showed a seven percent increase from the previous year.
- First-Year applications License 2 HOWL scholarships are now being accepted.
 Eight recipients will be selected to receive \$5,000 annual awards, with an option to
 renew in successive years if they continue to meet the criteria. These
 scholarships are funded by the official Red Wolves license plate, offered by the
 Department of Motor Vehicles in Arkansas. We currently have 30 students
 receiving this annual scholarship (seven seniors, seven juniors, eight sophomores,
 and eight freshmen).
- Our annual Pancakes and PJs with Santa and Howl event is scheduled for December 2, along with the Howlidays on the Rooftop alumni event in Little Rock that evening at the ASU System Office.
- The Alumni Association Board of Directors has begun the initial planning for the Association's centennial celebration in 2024. More details will be coming soon.

Chancellor's Report Arkansas State University-Beebe

ASU-Beebe Increases Fall Enrollment

Arkansas State University (ASUB) joins other Arkansas State University System campuses in exceeding fall enrollment expectations. For Fall 2023, the campuses of ASUB saw a headcount of 3,018, which is a 3.1% increase over Fall 2022 and includes a 4.3% increase in student semester credit hours. ASUB continues to build relationships with area high schools and in providing programs through Regional Career Centers, and concurrent credit has proven valuable with a 2.1% increase in concurrent high school student enrollment. The work being done by Admissions, the Registrar's Office, Financial Aid, and other departments across campus has helped to reach new students and increase student retention by 6.7%.

ASUB Opens Vanguard One Stop

On September 28, ASUB hosted the grand opening for the Vanguard One Stop in the Dr. Eugene McKay Student Center on the Beebe campus. The college was awarded a Title III Strengthening Institutions grant in 2022. This grant partially funded the renovation of a former bookstore in the Student Center. The renovations established one centralized location where students can meet their needs related to Admissions, Financial Aid, Disability Services, and Information Technology without visiting multiple campus buildings.

In addition, a portion of the Title III grant focused on the development of the Virtual One Stop to provide online resources for student services. Users can easily access information about enrollment, student resources, and other "need-to-know" information by visiting www.asub.edu.

ASUB Heber Springs Signs an MOU with the Police Department

ASUB and the City of Heber Springs signed a memorandum of understanding (MOU) on September 29, for a Heber Springs Police Department patrol vehicle to be used by the ASU-Beebe Heber Springs Campus Police Department. The partnership between the college and the city fills a critical need on campus. While ownership of the patrol vehicle will remain with the City of Heber Springs, ASUB will include it on the college's insurance and provide maintenance for the vehicle while in possession of it. The patrol car provides added safety protection for the Heber Springs campus and underscores the value of the existing cooperative relationship between the college and the surrounding community.

ASUB Celebrates the 20th Anniversary of the Foothills Merger

In 2003, the Foothills Technical Institute merged with ASUB to become the ASUB-Searcy Regional Career Center. The merger has brought remarkable growth and progress to the area. In conjunction with the ASUB Alumni Reunion, Dr. Methvin hosted a breakfast on the Searcy campus on September 22. Former employees and alumni from Foothills, along with community leaders and manufacturing partners, were invited for a morning presentation and campus tours.

Chief Workforce Officer Visits the Campuses of ASUB

Mike Rogers, Chief Workforce Officer for the State of Arkansas, spoke with faculty and students during his visit to the Searcy and Beebe campuses on October 5. He toured the HVACR, Diesel, Welding, Computerized Machining, Industrial, Power Sports, and Automotive Technology programs on the Searcy campus. On the Beebe campus, he visited with students and faculty in the John Deere Agriculture Equipment Technology) and Pharmacy Technician Science programs.

ASUB Students Featured in Arkansas Next Pros Magazine

ASUB alum, Jake Phillips, is featured on the cover of the 2023-2024 annual edition of the *Arkansas Next Pros* magazine. Phillips is a service technician with Greenway Equipment and a 2022 graduate of the ASU-Beebe John Deere Ag Tech program. Three young workforce professionals with ASUB degrees are also highlighted in the magazine. They are Matthew Penn, an HVAC Technician from ASUB; Landon Casey, an agriculture drone pilot, with an ASUB degree; and Elijah Woodward, another ASUB graduate with an associate's degree in Agricultural Technology.

The Agriculture Equipment Technology (John Deere) program offers a full associate degree that includes a full academic course load and technical training. In May of 2023, ASUB graduated the first completely virtual cohort of John Deere students. The second cohort began this fall with 20 students in North Dakota and South Dakota. There are five additional dealerships in the northern region of the U.S. interested in sponsoring students in the virtual program.

ASUB Celebrates ACC (Arkansas Community Colleges) 2023 Awards

Outstanding ASUB winners of the ACC Awards were announced at the Arkansas Community Colleges conference held October 8-10 in Hot Springs. Their dedication and hard work exemplify the spirit of excellence on community college campuses. Jacob Cater, from Quitman, received the Academic All-Star award; Meredith Gordon, Assistant Professor of Biology and Botany, received the Outstanding Faculty Award; and Dr. Connie Nowell, Director of the TRIO programs, received the Outstanding Staff Award. The ASUB Outstanding Alumni for 2023 was awarded to Garth Martin. Mr. Martin received his Associate of Arts degree in 1950 from ASUB, formally known as the Junior Agricultural College of Central Arkansas. He is a longstanding member and supporter of Arkansas's performing arts and historic

associations and has been a member of the ASUB Development Council for over 25 years. He was recognized by Dr. Jennifer Methvin at the alumni reunion held in September.

White County Single Parent Scholarship Awards (WCSPSA)

The White County Single Parent Scholarship Fund held its fall scholarship presentation at the ASUB Student Center on October 12. Since 1999, WCSPSF has awarded scholarships to single parents pursuing a post-secondary education. This year, 13 scholarships were awarded with a combined value of \$12,000.

Pharmacy Technician Science Program Recognition

The State of Arkansas has designated the third week of October as Pharmacy Week, and the third Tuesday of October as Pharmacy Technician Day. ASUB's Pharmacy Technician Science Program provides online coursework and in-person lab instruction and practice for students who can either meet on campus once a month or attend classroom sessions twice a week.

Pharmacy Technician students from ASUB collaborated with students from the Harding University School of Pharmacy to organize the Swabbing for a Cure event in October. The main objective of the event was to raise awareness about blood cancer and encourage people to become potential donors by providing a cheek swab. The collected samples will be added to the national registry for potential bone-marrow and stem-cell matches. The event was also supported by two pharmacy technology interns from the Doctor of Pharmacy program at Harding University's College of Pharmacy.

Janet McGregor Liles, the director and advanced instructor of the Pharmacy Technician Science Program at ASUB, has been appointed to serve as a member on the American Society of Health System Pharmacists (ASHP) New Practitioners Forum Practice Advancement and Advocacy Advisory Group for the 2023-2024 term. She was chosen from a record number of qualified nominations because of her skills and potential insight for the program.

Phi Theta Kappa Scholarships and Guest Speaker

ASUB Pharmacy Tech student Kristina Busbea has been awarded a \$250 scholarship to cover the cost of the Pharmacy Technician Certification exam fee from Walgreens and PTK (Phi Theta Kappa) (Phi Theta Kappa Honor Society). Busbea, from Garner, is pursuing an Associate of Applied Science degree in Pharmacy Technician Science.

ASUB Phi Theta Kappa member, Shawn Murphey, has been named as a 2023 Coca-Cola Leaders of Promise Scholar and recipient of a \$1,000 scholarship. Murphey, from Cabot, is majoring in computer systems and networking technology. The Coca-Cola Leaders of Promise Scholarship Program helps new Phi Theta Kappa members defray educational expenses while enrolled in associate degree programs.

Scholars are selected based on scholastic achievement, community service, and leadership potential. 1,100 applications were received.

On October 23, the Phi Theta Kappa chapter at ASUB hosted a guest presentation "The Dust of Kabul: The Root Causes of the Hamas Attack on Israel". The guest speaker, Sam Jeffrey, Director of Harding University's Criminal Justice Program, addressed questions submitted by ASUB students. Cyndy Rios served as the moderator for the event.

ASUB Students Volunteer with Sunshine Rodeo

The November 2023 issue of *Arkansas Living Magazine* featured a cover story on the Sunshine Rodeo sponsored by the Crossroads Cowboy Church in El Paso, Arkansas. The event began in 1996 and features rodeo-themed activities specifically tailored for elementary to high school-age students with mental and physical challenges. Each year more than 100 ASUB students volunteer.

ASUB Supports Community Events

Staff and faculty members from ASUB passed out program information cards and visited with members of the community during the 45th Annual CabotFest and the Fallin' Blackbird Festival & 5K held in downtown Beebe.

ASUB celebrated Halloween as employees and students participated in entertaining activities. Eight student clubs and academic programs hosted tents and passed out loads of candy during the Trunk-or-Treat event in downtown Beebe. The Searcy campus hosted a Halloween Carnival in the Student Center. Students, faculty, and staff members enjoyed fun games, candy treats, and a special lunch on Halloween day.

Workforce and Career Education programs were promoted during the Cleburne County manufacturing hiring event held at the Heber Spring Community Center on August 25. Karen Drobeck, Director of Workforce and Community Development, was able to make connections with several industry partners to set up training programs for their employees.

ASUB faculty and staff from the Searcy campus met with members of the community at the Searcy Regional Chamber of Commerce Spooktacular Business Showcase on October 20. Allied Health and Workforce Development programs were represented along with Adult Education and ASUB Admissions.

ASUB Makers Days Support Student Fund

ASUB held the annual Makers Days on October 19 and October 24 in the England Center pottery studio. Community members, alumni, employees, and students participated by channeling their inner artisans to craft pottery with guidance from Lisa Floryshak, Assistant Professor of Art. These handmade creations

will be included in the annual pottery sale at the upcoming ASUB Tree Lighting Ceremony, scheduled for November 30. The proceeds from the sale will go to support the Student Emergency Hope Fund. This fund serves as a vital resource for students facing unexpected challenges, offering them support and hope during times of need.

ASUB Literary and Arts Magazine Published

Members of the ASUB Publishing Studio welcomed students, faculty, and staff on September 26 to view the fourth edition of *Uncharted*. The magazine is a product of the Division of Arts and Humanities, published by students and faculty, and featuring literary and art submissions by talented authors and artists who are students and alumni of ASUB. The fourth volume of the magazine highlights winners of the 2022 Poetry Contest, which was held in honor of National Poetry Writing Month, as well as the winner of the "Think Globally, Act Locally" essay contest sponsored by the ASUB Global Awareness Committee.

ArkACRAO Preview Day hosted by ASUB

ASUB welcomed high school students, their counselors, and representatives from Arkansas colleges to the Beebe campus on October 18. Approximately 393 high school students attended from around the state. The event is co-hosted by ASUB and the Wilbur D. Mills Education Service Cooperative to provide students the opportunity to explore careers and courses of study offered at the member institutions.

Chancellor's Report Arkansas State University-Mountain Home

Mountain Home High School

The Mountain Home Promise (made possible through the Mountain Home Education Foundation) continues to encourage Mountain Home High School graduates to choose ASUMH. In 2023, Mountain Home High School graduated 254 seniors. Of those graduates, 102 are attending ASUMH this fall, with 9 out of 10 enrolled as full-time students. With a capture rate of over 40%, this fall's MHHS enrollment numbers far exceed previous years.

New and Improved Collaboration Spaces on Campus

On-campus participation has increased among ASUMH students, faculty, and staff through the creation of new collaboration spaces, including the new Learning Commons in Dryer Hall (previously the Tutoring Center) and the reconfiguration of the Wright and Chancellor's conference rooms in Roller Hall. Power of the Parliament, a new, virtual collaboration space meets each Friday via Microsoft Teams to share and celebrate institutional and departmental updates and special events at ASUMH.

MOA Review

ASUMH was selected for a Methods of Administration (MOA) review related to equitable and accessible services and facilities for career and technical educational activities at the college. Our reviewer from the Arkansas Department of Education Perkins and Accountability Office conducted one-on-one interviews with seven CTE students and 10 faculty and staff who work with CTE students. Our exit interview was excellent with only minor suggestions for possible enhancements.

Aspen Prize

For the fifth time, ASUMH has been recognized by the Aspen Institute as one of the top 150 community colleges in the nation. With this recognition comes the opportunity to compete for the 2025 Aspen Prize for Community College Excellence.

Organizational Structure Review

As of November 8, ASUMH has launched a strategy to undergo a full review of the institution's organizational structure. The goal of the review is to consider structural changes that can lead to improvements in efficiency, sustainability, and student success.-Work groups comprised of faculty and staff will research, review, and propose structure options through three lenses: academics, student services, and operations. All faculty and staff have been encouraged to participate.

 ASUN program, will earn two Certificates of Proficiency, a Technical Certificate, and a portable

- ASUN received the Delta Regional Authority Grant (DRA) of \$221,000. This grant will be used to help fund the Newport Healthcare Workforce Training Center project and to construct a state-ofthe-art nursing and allied health professions simulation workforce training center on the ASU-Newport Campus.

Chancellor's Report Arkansas State University Mid-South

Fall 2023 Enrollment Update

ASU Mid-South's final fall headcount of 1,086 students reflects an 8.3% enrollment increase over final enrollment at the end of Fall 2022. Student semester credit hours also increased this fall, with a 6.3% gain over last fall. These gains are attributed to increases in Secondary Center enrollment, as well as the addition of Commercial Driver Training and the Baseball Program.

ADTEC Meeting

On September 28, ASU Mid-South hosted a meeting of the Presidents and Chancellors of the five Arkansas Delta Training and Education Consortium (ADTEC) Colleges. The purpose of the meeting was to orient the new ADTEC presidents and chancellors to the history and purpose of the consortium and to allow the colleges to re-commit to a regional approach to workforce and economic development moving forward.

ADTEC was created in 2005, when four community colleges in eastern Arkansas - Arkansas Northeastern College, Arkansas State University Mid-South (then Mid-South Community College), East Arkansas Community College, and Phillips Community College of the University of Arkansas - decided to use their collective resources to address current and future training needs of business and industry in the Arkansas Delta. Arkansas State University-Newport joined the consortium the following year.

The purpose of ADTEC is to provide a collaborative regional approach that addresses the unique workforce development needs of the Delta. Member colleges collaborate to share curriculum, expertise, support strategies, and industry input regarding the training needs of the region. The colleges also work together to secure the grant funding necessary to provide the high-wage, high-skill, high-demand training needs required to move the region forward. Over the past years, ADTEC has secured eight federal grants and seven state grants, totaling more than \$31 million dollars.

State funding for the ADTEC Consortium goes to support training initiatives at the five member colleges, as well as University Center Partnerships with Arkansas State University and the University of Arkansas-Fort Smith.

Interim Dean of Advanced Manufacturing and Transportation

ASU Mid-South's Director of Workforce Training and Community Education, Michelle Bennett, has agreed to also serve in an interim role as Dean of Advanced Manufacturing and Transportation, until that position can be permanently filled.

2023 Halloween Bash

ASU Mid-South welcomed area sixth graders to campus on October 31, for a Trick-or-Treat College Tour. The first buses arrived from area elementary schools at 9:00 a.m., with students beginning their routes in the Allied Health Building, the Reynolds Center, the Workforce Technology Center, and the Welding Annex. Groups, varying

in size from 44 to 75, progressed from these drop-off points to other campus buildings, accompanied by their teachers and chaperones. Staff from the Administration Building, dressed as characters from "Toy Story", served as guides to ensure that no one got lost between buildings. Participating offices and department staff were costumed and decorated and provided candy to the students along their walking tour of the College's facilities. Additional candy and information stations were manned by community partners, East Arkansas Family Health, Crowley's Ridge Development Council, and Crittenden County Boys and Girls Club, as well as industry partners, West Memphis Steel and Hino Motors. In total, approximately 400 sixth grade students visited campus between 9:00 a.m. and 2:00 p.m.

Greyhound Basketball Update

The ASU Mid-South Greyhound Basketball Season kicked off in November, with the Greyhound Men's team hosting Division I Jones College (MS) on November 3, and Division I Northwest MS Community College on November 4 for the Greyhound Tip-Off Classic. The Lady Greyhounds Tip-Off Classic was played the following weekend, with the women hosting Division I Northwest MS Community College on November 10 and Region II rival, Connors State College (OK), on November 11. The Greyhound Men have received votes in the pre-season NJCAA Division II rankings for the upcoming season, the only Arkansas NJCAA program to do so.

Project Upskill Mid-South

The University of Memphis was recently awarded a \$21.5 million Good Jobs Challenge grant by the U.S. Economic Development Administration (EDA) to fund a project called "Upskill Mid-South." ASU Mid-South will serve as a partner and regional training center with the University of Memphis as part of this project.

The goal of the project is to address future industry needs in advanced manufacturing, construction, and transportation/logistics through collaboration and innovation and by creating regional workforce training pipelines across West Tennessee, East Arkansas, and North Mississippi. The primary focus of the project will be to support Ford Motor Company's Blue Oval Electric Vehicle Assembly Complex being constructed near Stanton, TN. However, the skills training delivered as part of this project will be transferable to other industries within these sectors.

Round 4 DOL Strengthening Community College Grant Applications

ASU Mid-South is submitting two different applications for grants under Round 4 of the Department of Labor's Strengthening Community Colleges Training Grants program.

- Bridging Healthcare Workforce Shortages in Arkansas (BRIDGE-AR) The first of these applications focuses on developing and enhancing pathways in Nursing (specifically CNA and LPN) and EMT/Paramedic. The University of Arkansas Pulaski Technical College is serving as the lead institution for this application, with participants to include ASU Mid-South, East Arkansas Community College, Phillips Community College of the University of Arkansas, and Southeast Arkansas Community College.
- Arkansas Delta Strengthening Community Colleges The second of these applications focuses on developing/enhancing pathways in Transportation/Distribution/Logistics. ASU Mid-South is serving as the lead college on this application, with participants including three of the other four ADTEC colleges – Arkansas Northeastern College, East Arkansas Community College, and Phillips Community College of the University of Arkansas.

The deadline for submission is November 14, and while we will not know until later whether our applications are successful, we do know that the tremendous amount of groundwork we have put into these applications will pay dividends in other ways - mainly by positioning us for future funding opportunities.

Chancellor's Report Arkansas State University Three Rivers

Arkansas State University Three Rivers (ASUTR) held a groundbreaking ceremony for its new Health Sciences building on October 26, 2023. We were honored to have ASU System President Dr. Charles Welch and ASU System Board Vice Chair Mr. Steve Eddington join us to offer remarks. We also appreciate members of the ASU System Board of Trustees, Rev. Robert Rudolph and Mr. Price Gardner; the ASUTR Board of Visitors, which includes State Representative Rick McClure; and representatives from the offices of U.S. Senator John Boozman, U.S. Senator Tom Cotton, and U.S. Representative Bruce Westerman for attending our celebration of this exciting new chapter at ASUTR. This 27,500-square-foot facility will include classrooms, testing rooms, computer labs, student study and assembly areas, as well as state-of-the-art simulation labs with observation rooms, 14 offices, conference rooms, and a lecture/meeting hall that seats approximately 200. In addition, we will be making improvements and enhancements to our existing facility. With the steady growth in our nursing program, we are very excited to provide the best training and education to benefit even more future health science professionals in our area. We extend our deepest appreciation to the office of Senator John Boozman for his assistance in securing funding for this project.





Year three fall enrollment for the Saline County Career Technical Campus (SCCTC) was 735 students, which is a 110-student increase over Fall 2022. Our staff includes 18 full-time and three part-time employees, and one contracted employee (SRO). Combined, they bring approximately 375 years of industry experience.

The ASUTR Career Center's total enrollment increased by 17% between Fall 2022 and Fall 2023, from 176 students to 206.

The ASUTR Library has made significant changes to the front and rear sections of the library. We replaced the awning and re-sodded the grass outside the rear entrance to the library, adding to the curb appeal. The front shelving units were moved to the back. That space was repurposed for a seating area with comfortable furniture. New lamps with USB ports, as well as USB-C and lightning cables, were added throughout the

library to add appeal and functionality, providing a more casual atmosphere, while adding multiple areas for students to charge their devices.

The West Fraser Qualified Millwright and Electrician programs, through our Workforce Development training, continue with a total of 3,488 hours of training scheduled through the end of FY 2024. We are currently conducting the ASUTR Professional Development Academy for the following:

West Fraser Mills in Leola, AR; Huttig, AR; Joyce, LA; Angelina, TX; Henderson, TX;

Xpress Boats and Veranda Luxury Pontoons;

Clark County Workforce Training Group (Siplast, South Central Electric Co-op/South Central Connect, Drumco, Samantha's Café and Bakery, Arkadelphia Alliance);

Jasper Lumber Company – Jasper, AL;

Southeastern Timber Company – Akerman, MS (one class).

Last month marked our first graduating class of Telecommunications Tower Technicians. John Caver is the Program Manager, and the current class is in the Tower Climbing portion of the program. The next Tower Technician class will begin on November 13.

The ASUTR Office of Financial Aid has had a complete turnover of staff in August/September, which precipitated the hiring of Financial Aid Services (FAS) to review, train, and recommend best practices in the management of financial aid to students. The new Financial Aid Director, Danielle Brown, has developed a close collaborative relationship with FAS consultants and is working to repair the perception of the Office of Financial Aid with students, faculty, and administration.

Ten Education Opportunity grants were awarded to employees seeking their bachelor's or master's degrees through ASU or HSU for the Fall 2023 semester.

TRiO Student Support Services submitted the 2023-2024 TriO budget and received approval from the U.S. Department of Education for \$318,277.00, which is a 4% increase from the previous budget year.

The Career Pathways Initiative's statewide goal is to end the dependence of parents on government benefits, and has identified the following objectives in order to accomplish this desired goal:

Objective1: Increase enrollment by 3% from the previous year;

Objective 2: 40% of students withdrawn earn a credential;

Objective 3: 80% of completers are employed within six months or withdraw.

The Eagle Outreach Food, Clothing, and Hygiene Pantry served 106 households during the month of July, 199 households during the month of August, and 147 households during the month of September.

On October 31, ASUTR held its annual Trunk-or-Treat event on campus for the community. Each department participated, decorating a themed station and handing out treats provided by the Student Government Association. We saw the biggest turnout to date this year, with more than 2,000 trick-or-treaters attending the event!

Chancellor's Report Henderson State University

Dr. Trey Berry Appointed Henderson Chancellor, Effective January 1, 2024

The biggest news of the fall is that Trey and Katherine Berry will be joining us January 1 as our campus leaders. As most of you know, Dr. Trey Berry brings his enthusiasm and creative leadership to us from his role as President of Southern Arkansas University, where he has served to the great benefit of that campus and community. The selection of Dr. Berry as our Chancellor has been enthusiastically welcomed across our campus and throughout our community.

CHI St. Vincent Partnership Provides Scholarships, Job Paths for HSU Nursing Students

Seven Henderson State University senior nursing students will receive financial aid, thanks to an agreement with CHI St. Vincent, a regional health network serving Central and Southwest Arkansas communities since 1888. The students were awarded \$1,250 for both the first and second semester of their senior year, based on academic performance, essays, and a desire to work for CHI St. Vincent after graduation for at least 18 months. The students signing the agreement were Alejandro Santos, Hot Springs; Kylie Wornick, Norman; Lunden Cotton, Arkadelphia; Karlie Hernandez, Kirby; Gabriela Velazquez, Amity; Mayra Altamirano, Hot Springs; and Astrid Jasso, De Queen.

The CHI St. Vincent Pathways Program, through the Henderson Foundation, included an initial \$20,000 commitment and will provide \$2,500 in financial aid for up to eight nursing students each year. "The partnership CHI St. Vincent has with Henderson State University has been priceless over the years. We have many of their former students, who are excellent nurses in many different roles, that allow us to give exemplary care to the patients in our community," stated Teresa Lambert, Vice President of Patient Care Services and Assistant Chief Nursing Officer of CHI St. Vincent Hot Springs. "It is an honor and a pleasure for CHI St. Vincent to support the Henderson State University nursing students. They are our community's future nurses and leaders in healthcare."

Other Examples of Progress on Campus Include the Following:

- Henderson received a clear audit from legislative auditors;
- The financial performance of the University is on track to produce better-than-expected results for the fiscal year, and we are hearing from alumni and friends, who are anxious to become involved again;

- Our final fall census enrollment numbers were down, as expected, as a result of the restructuring
 we have been making, but were down less than expected, which created a positive variance
 from the budget;
- Recruitment and retention of students remain at the core of our growth strategy. Admissions
 numbers to date are encouraging, but we are being relentless in pursuit of our goal to enroll at
 least new 500 freshmen for fall 2024. Every academic program has a set of ambitious goals for
 increasing student enrollment, and faculty/staff are leaning in with their best efforts to hit those
 targets;
- Small group brainstorming sessions were conducted with almost all of the faculty. These
 sessions yielded hundreds of ideas for improvement, some big and complicated and others that
 we can, and have already, implemented;
- We have acquired the use of two brand-new, twin-engine airplanes for use by our Aviation program. Our fleet of single-engine planes has been put on a funded engine replacement program to assure that we keep all of the planes flying in the coming years;
- We continue to find efficiency and cost-saving opportunities;
- · We are reducing our reliance on consultants;
- We are shifting our retention efforts from software apps to personal interactions, in keeping with our overall strategy of "personalization" of the campus culture;
- Our athletic programs have achieved great success on the field, court, and in the water. Our teams are also continuing to achieve a level of excellence in academics that is a point of pride for the entire campus. After a victory in the Battle of the Ravine, the Reddie football team was selected to participate as one of 28 universities in the Division II National Championships.

Henderson State Historic District Added to the National Register

The Henderson State University Historic District has been listed on the National Register of Historic Places. Henderson's historic district contains the central core of the campus and includes Proctor Hall (1938), Caddo Commons (1947); Evans Hall (1951); McElhannon Hall (1939, with additions in 1960s and c.2000 - Reynolds Science Center); Mooney Hall (1933); Education Center (2001); Huie Library (1967); Bell (1890/1954); Centurium (1990); Columns (1920)/Fence (1903); Arkansas Hall (1950); McBrien Hall (1964);Russell Fine Arts Center (1964); Smith Hall (1965); Chancellor's House (c. 1950); Greenhouse (c. 2000); and the Day Armory/Lookadoo Student Union (1945, 1958), whose buildings are now the Garrison Center.

Henderson Graduate Teams Up with Professor to Publish Paper

Michael Brotherton of El Dorado graduated from Henderson State this spring with a B.S. in biology and plans to attend medical school in 2024. He is currently conducting research under the direction of Dr.

Brett Serviss, a professor in Henderson's new Natural Sciences program. Serviss' research interests are in Arkansas floristics and the biology and ecology of non-native species. Through their combined research, Brotherton and Serviss recently co-authored a paper entitled "A First Report of Hibiscus Mutabilis (Malvaceae) from Arkansas," which was published in the floristics and taxonomy journal *Phytoneuron*. The paper focuses on a species of non-native woody plant (Confederate rose—mallow) that was recently documented for a first occurrence outside of cultivation in the state.

Dr. Langley's Newest Book in Popular Psychology Series Just Released

Dr. Travis Langley's newest book, *Doctor Who Psychology: Times Change*, has been released. It is part of a series, analyzing TV superheroes and other characters through psychological research. Dr. Langley calls this a "regenerated second edition" of his earlier book, *Doctor Who Psychology: A Madman with a Box.* It was updated for the sixtieth anniversary of a popular BBC television series, *Dr. Who.* Dr. Langley, distinguished professor of psychology at Henderson State, is best known for *Batman and Psychology: A Dark and Stormy Knight*, which has sold more than 300,000 copies, with the second edition released two years ago.
