- The unit assisted with insurance coverage for the flooding event during winter break and in obtaining repair approval.
- Staff members conducted VSP training and Workers' Compensation information for Facilities Management.

# Environmental Health and Safety (EHS)

• Staff completed 77 lab inspections and provided radiation-safety training to all ABI ancillary employees.

• Collaborating with student groups, the unit participated in seven litter pick-up events, yielding more than 500 pounds of trash.

## Facilities Management

- <u>Record Freeze Event Mitigation</u>: A-State experienced a "once-in-a-generation" freeze event over the 2022 holiday break. The drying and demo portion of the restoration process is complete. The scope of work, contracting, and bidding are complete, with repair work underway.
- <u>Ventilation Air HVAC Upgrades</u>: University funds have been designated for multiple campus projects to upgrade the ventilation air and HVAC systems to improve indoor air quality.
- <u>Judd Hill Farmers' Market Expansion</u>: The expansion will provide an additional airconditioned building adjacent to the current structure. Construction of the building is progressing on schedule and is ready to open, pending the completion of the parking lot paving.
- <u>Windgate Hall Architectural Design</u>: WER Architects have been hired, and they have partnered with Environments for Health Architecture. The firms have completed programmatic design and have begun the architectural design process. Selection of the construction management firm should be finalized in June 2023.
- <u>Campus Master Planning Update</u>: A-State contracted with the SmithGroup to develop and update to the campus Master Plan with presentation of an initial draft, anticipated in August or September 2023.
- <u>Other Notable Projects</u>: In planning, bidding, execution, or close-out phase are Phase III of the Multi-use Trail, Library tower elevator modernization, demolition and remediation plans, and Reng Student Union partial reroofing.

## First National Bank Arena

- Along with A-State commencement, the arena hosted several high school graduations, including the addition of Wynne High School, with Governor Sarah Huckaby Sanders as speaker.
- Among upcoming events, the Hardy concert for October 12 sold out its initial ticket allotment the first week it was offered.

# **Fiscal Operations**

• Fiscal Operations completed the planning and compilation stages of the FY24 budget for the A-State campus. A thorough review of faculty and staff vacancies occurred during this budget-development process. The FY24 operating budget includes reallocations/reductions of both faculty and staff positions, as well as a focus on continued support of existing employees.

## Title IX and Institutional Equity

• As an ongoing participation in campus training events, seven Title IX sessions were completed, including the Chancellor's Cabinet.

## Training & Development

• The office launched its Leadership Development Program in April.

## University Police Department

- The agency was audited on March 1 by the Federal Bureau of Investigation concerning Criminal Justice Information Systems Security compliance. The audit resulted in no findings, and the agency being in full compliance.
- Lieutenant Andrew Thrasher assisted in a multi-agency sex-offender, registration compliance operation held on April 25 -27 that resulted in the arrest of 25 non-compliant sex offenders in Craighead County.
- All sworn members of the agency completed the Criminal Justice Institute training across a wide range of specialized areas, including racial profiling training, behavioral health and crisis intervention, sexual assault investigation, autism spectrum disorders, use of force and advanced use of force, ethics for law enforcement, and duty to intervene.

## Advancement Services

- For the third quarter of the fiscal year, January 1, 2023, through March 31, 2023, A-State recorded a total of 6,196 gifts and commitments from 2,348 individual donors for a total of \$1,813,626.27. The overall giving amount includes outright donations of cash, gifts-in-kind, planned gifts, and new pledges. Major gifts included are the following:
  - \$200,000 commitment from Greenway Equipment, to support the Ag Academy, targeted agriculture scholarships and marketing of the meat lab;

- \$25,000, committed by Michael Ellis, to establish the David James Memorial Endowed Scholarship to benefit students in the College of Agriculture;
- Stock gift valued at \$102,947.84, from Dr. J. B. Penn, to establish Penn Trading, a live trading platform to benefit the College of Agriculture;
- \$25,000, provided from the Beck Foundation, Inc., to benefit veterans' suicide-prevention research;
- \$25,000, given by the Judd Hill Foundation Trust, to benefit the ASU System Foundation; and
- Buddy and Charlotte Beck, with the Beck Foundation, provided funding to complete their commitment for two endowed professorships – one in mechanical engineering and the other in chemistry.

# Alumni Relations

### **Faculty Receive National Credentials in Teaching Excellence**

Twenty-six faculty members at ASU-Beebe were recognized for earning a nationally recognized teaching credential co-endorsed by the Association of College and University Educators (ACUE) and the American Council on Education (ACE) during a pinning ceremony on April 27. Faculty demonstrated their commitment to student success by completing a year-long course in effective online teaching practices to equip them with the instructional skills shown to promote student motivation, learning, and persistence.

The event was hosted by ASU-Beebe's Distance Education program, which partnered with ACUE. The credentialed faculty members included instructors from the divisions of Arts and Humanities, Career Education, and Math & Sciences. To earn their Certificate in Effective College Instruction, faculty members completed a 25-module course that requires them to learn about and implement new evidence-based teaching practices in their courses and reflect on the experience. Aligned with the latest research in cognition and adult learning, ACUE's courses address over 200 evidence-based teaching practices, covering how to design an effective course, establish a productive learning environment, use active learning techniques, promote higher-order thinking, and utilize assessments to inform instruction and promote learning.

"Our faculty put a lot of work into earning this credential, and we were honored to celebrate this achievement. As a co-facilitator of the ACUE program for our cohort, I enjoyed hearing about all the strategies faculty members were implementing," said Stephanie Ungerank, Director of Distance Education.

### Students Attend Arkansas Center for Reach in Economics Meeting

Several Arkansas State University-Beebe students and a faculty member recently participated in the spring colloquium of the Arkansas Center for Research in Economics (ACRE). The meeting was held March 31-April 2 at the Winthrop Rockefeller Institute in Morrilton.

Participating students, Cyndy Rios, John-Paul Henderson, and Samantha Oliver, were selected by both ASU-Beebe faculty members and ACRE staff, based on their academic excellence and interests in history, politics, and economics. Dr. Blake Perkins, Associate Vice Chancellor for Academics at ASU-Beebe, joined the students at the event. Dr. Perkins is also an associate professor of history and has authored books and articles on American history and politics.

The meeting brought together forty students and faculty members from eight colleges and universities across the state to study and exchange ideas on the theme, "Liberty and the Founding." Attendees read historian Gordon Wood's 2021 book, *Power and Liberty: Constitutionalism in the American Revolution,* as well as several scholarly articles on various perspectives of history, politics, and economics related to the founding of the United States and the making of the U.S. Constitution. The meeting also featured a keynote address by University of Central Arkansas History Professor Dr. Vaughn Scribner, seven roundtable discussion seminars, and numerous networking opportunities.

Rios, a Searcy resident, is completing an associate of science degree in liberal arts and sciences (ASLAS). She plans to transfer to Arkansas State University in Jonesboro for a bachelor's degree in business administration. Beebe native Henderson is working toward earning an ASLAS degree and completing coursework in the 2+2 transfer agreement for a bachelor's degree in history at the University of Central Arkansas. He then plans to pursue law school and explore opportunities for legal work in the U.S. military and the civilian sector. Oliver, of Ward, is also pursuing an ASLAS degree. She plans to pursue a 2+2 transfer option toward a bachelor's degree in history. She then plans to earn a graduate degree and teach history at the college level.

### Chancellor's Report Arkansas State University-Mountain Home

#### **Technical Center Purchase**

The Arkansas State System Foundation through the Real Estate Foundation is in the process of purchasing the ASUMH Technical Center. This purchase will be made through funds available in the ASUMH accounts of the System Foundation. The purchase price will be \$750,000.00 for 25,000 square feet facility which sits on 5.64 acres. The purchase is expected to be completed in July of 2023. ASUMH will subsequently lease the facility from the ASU System Real Estate Foundation for \$24,000 per year.

#### **ASUMH Alumni Association**

The ASUMH Alumni Association continues to evolve with a number of initiatives accomplished this past year. The Alumni Association stages the 5-K Holiday Run with proceeds funding student scholarships. Other initiatives include sponsoring a display in the Coulter Celebration of Lights on campus, co-sponsoring a CPA continuing education event, and sponsoring a Trailblazer day at the baseball and softball games.

#### **APEX Fellowship**

An ASUMH student, Sam Adams, recently completed the APEX Fellowship. The APEX Fellowship is a year-long research project conducted by an ASUMH student with guidance from a faculty mentor. The conclusion of the fellowship includes a presentation to faculty, students, and community members concerning the findings of the research. Sam's research project was titled Story and Song: The Ballad and Its History. Sam's presentation outlined the evolution of the ballad from the progression of European origins to the American soil. His lecture included live performances of some of the iconic ballads of the past century.

#### Moore Walking/Biking Trail

The Moore Walking/Biking Trail continues to evolve on campus. The project to light the trail with solar lighting and to plant 80 trees is beginning this month. Additionally, the City of Mountain Home has connected to our campus trail under the 412 Highway bypass allowing access to the McCabe City Park trail and the new Community Center. A donor has also stepped forward to sponsor works of art to be placed along the trail creating an ASUMH Art Walk.

## Chancellor's Report Arkansas State University-Newport

### **Strategic Priority 1: Student Success**

- CJ Shelton, a student in ASUN's culinary program, was selected as a semi-finalist for the Jack Kent Cooke Foundation University Transfer Scholarship. This year, there were 459 semifinalists chosen from a pool of more than 1,700 applicants. The Cooke Transfer Scholarship is designed to create a clear pathway to a four-year degree, by offering up to \$55,000 per year, along with academic advising and access to a network of peers.
- Thirty-four students from ten area high schools competed in the ASUN-Marked Tree Automotive Service Technology, Collision Repair & Refinishing Technology, and the Computer Networking Technology high school competitions. Students demonstrated knowledge of parts and tools used in each division, as well as troubleshooting skills. Winners were awarded renewable scholarships to attend ASUN.
- ASUN students had another successful competition season. At Arkansas Skills USA, students placed first, second, and third in both Cosmetology and Esthetics. Students placed first in CNC Milling, first in Computer Networking Technology, and third in Automotive Service Technology. Students won five of the six medals in Energy Control Technology, including first place in HVAC, and first place in wiring. Students in ASUN's education program participated in the Educators Rising state conference, after winning first place in the district competition in November. Students presented teaching materials and gave speeches on topics related to their futures as educators.
- The Department of Student Engagement has been working to empower students on campus. The
  Department hosted a retreat for student leaders, covering topics such as qualities and
  responsibilities of a good leader, scholarships, time management, organization, community
  engagement, and service-learning opportunities. Student Ambassadors, members of Student
  Government Association, and other registered student organization officers participated in the
  event. The Department also hosted student focus groups at each campus to learn more about how
  students' experiences compared with their expectations for college; to understand potential barriers
  to success; to gauge knowledge regarding campus support services; and to understand how
  students think about the college's effectiveness in meeting their needs.

### **Strategic Priority 2: Employee Success**

• Kristine Penix has been appointed to serve as President of the Arkansas Alliance of Concurrent Enrollment Partnerships. Kristine will represent Arkansas at meetings of organizational leadership on the state and national levels. She will also serve as a liaison between the Alliance and the Arkansas Department of Higher Education.

- Instructor Greg Slayton has been selected by Data Recognition Corporation to participate in the development of the mathematics portion of the Test of Adult Basic Education (TABE).
- ASUN Workforce Development offered several sessions of free Mental Health First Aid Training for employees. Just as CPR helps an individual assist someone who is having a heart attack, Mental Health First Aid helps an individual assist someone experiencing a mental health or substance userelated crisis. Employees learned risk factors and warning signs for mental health and addiction concerns, strategies for how to help someone in both crisis and non-crisis situations, and where to turn for help. Therapists from Mid-South Health/Arisa Health Systems led the training.

### **Strategic Priority 3: Institutional Excellence**

- ASUN was one of only 17 community colleges in the nation chosen to participate in the Advancing Community Equity and Upward Mobility (ACE-UP) initiative, which aims to bring community colleges and industry leaders together to design strategies that align education and training, increase access to employment, and advance equitable employment practices. ACE-UP is a first-of-its-kind community of practice convened by the Corporation for a Skilled Workforce (CSW), with support from the Lumina Foundation. The Urban Institute – a think tank based in Washington, D.C., that carries out economic and social policy research – will document the project, and experts from CSW will lead the community of practice.
- The Caring Campus Committee hosted a series of lunch-n-learns focused on cross-departmental awareness – one of ASUN's Caring Campus behavioral commitments. The sessions featured discussions on Career Pathways, Academic Support Services, Career Services, and Workforce Development.
- ASUN was awarded an equipment grant from the Office of Skills Development. The grant will be used to purchase a coupon bender for the welding program, which will allow students to test their welds with industry-certified equipment. The grant will also provide for several new pieces of nursing equipment, including training arms and three-position recliner chairs with activity trays. These additions will increase the capacity of the nursing lab, allowing more students to participate in the program.

### **Strategic Priority 4: Community Engagement**

- ASUN hosted the Aviator Athletics Premiere "Let the Games Begin" its kickoff event for athletics, and first major fundraiser. Nearly 250 people attended the event, which raised more than \$55,000. Former coaches, Houston Nutt and Dickey Nutt, attended the event. Premier and Platinum sponsors included Greenway Equipment, Houston Nutt, B/R Trailer, Becky and Robert Foster, and Steven and Misty Furst.
- ASUN hosted its quarterly Board of Visitors meeting at ASUN-Jonesboro, where Board members experienced the Aviator Café and a tour of the campus.

## **ASUN Academic Program Notifications**

ASUN is reconfiguring its existing Technical Certificate in Pre-Health Professions by adding additional elective courses, so that students preparing to enter programs in Traditional Registered Nursing, Surgical

Technology, Physical Therapy Assistant, and Occupational Therapy Assistant can earn a credential while completing their prerequisites.

ASUN is reconfiguring its existing Associate of Science in Criminal Justice, based on a change to the core curriculum requirements. The reconfiguration will provide students with a more comprehensive curriculum that better meets industry standards and prepares students for employment.

ASUN is reconfiguring its existing Associate of Applied Science in Culinary Arts, Technical Certificate in Culinary Arts, and Certificate of Proficiency in Culinary Arts to better meet the needs of local industry. The reconfiguration, based on feedback from the program advisory board, will provide students with broader, more marketable training.

ASUN is reactivating its Technical Certificate in Advanced Manufacturing – Industrial Maintenance.

ASUN is inactivating its Associate of Applied Science in Collision Repair and Refinishing Technology and its Technical Certificate in Collision Repair and Refinishing Technology.

### Chancellor's Report Arkansas State University Mid-South

#### **Spring 2023 Graduation**

ASU Mid-South's 2023 Commencement was held on May 18, 2023, at the Academy of West Memphis's Lehr Arena. In total, 506 degrees and certificates were awarded to 274 individual students that night, in a very personal ceremony, led largely by the students themselves. We are grateful to Dr. Welch, Chairman Morgan, and Secretary Rudolph for being in attendance and for helping to recognize our students and award their diplomas.

#### **Project Greyhound HOPE**

In early April, the faculty, staff and students at ASU Mid-South worked quickly to collect and deliver relief supplies to victims impacted by the devastation caused by the Wynne tornado. As a result of a two-day, campus-wide effort, called Project Greyhound HOPE (Helping Out our Peeps at East Arkansas Community College Foundation [EACC]). Chancellor West and Vice Chancellors Gray and Reece were able to deliver a large cargo truck of supplies, including cases of drinking water, canned goods, diapers, toys, cleaning items, towels, personal-care items, and paper goods, as well as a check for \$1,130 to the EACC, which had mobilized a relief center on their Forrest City campus.

#### **Greyhound Promise**

ASU Mid-South is participating in Complete College America's Policy, Equity, and Practice (PEP) Initiative, which is seeking to increase college completion rates – and ultimately social mobility – for students of color and from low-income households. As part of that work, colleges were asked to research and implement a project to increase access and completions at their institutions. A SU Mid-South has elected to pilot a last-dollar tuition scholarship, the Greyhound Promise, for eligible, first-time entering freshmen, beginning in Fall 2023.

The college budgeted \$35,000 of institutional scholarship funds for this program in FY2024. Then, on May 11, 2023, the Southland Board voted to match that \$35,000 commitment. This scholarship program will target Crittenden County residents who are first-time entering freshmen, who have a minimum high school GPA of 2.75 or a minimum GED score of 550, and who are seeking either an Associate of Arts or an Associate of Science degree. Applicants will be required to complete the FAFSA and State Scholarship Application and accept all aid for which they are eligible. The Greyhound Promise Program will then fund any remaining unfulfilled tuition (hence the term "last-dollar"). Because this is a pilot project, funds will be awarded on a first-come, first-served basis. Students participating in the

Greyhound Promise will be required to participate in New Student Orientation, complete College Success their first semester, and attend specified meetings with transfer, wellness, and career counselors throughout the term of their enrollment. They must also maintain a 2.75 college GPA in order to retain Greyhound Promise Scholarship eligibility.

#### Information Systems Technology Curriculum Reconfiguration

ASU Mid-South is reconfiguring and modernizing its 62 credit-hour curriculum in Information Systems Technology in order to meet current industry standards and to align with Cisco Networking Academy requirements. Two new cybersecurity courses will be added that include content addressing the critical workforce shortages in network security. Course name changes, course-number changes, and course descriptions are being updated to reflect Cisco curriculum revisions and the newest technology in the field. Revisions will include the following:

Additionally, ASU Mid-South is reconfiguring the Certificate of Proficiency in Networking, and the Certificate of Proficiency in Micro-Computer Upgrade and Repair to remove the one-hour BUSN 1201 Career Preparation course. This course, which is designed to prepare students to seek employment as they exit the program and enter the workforce, is more relevant later in the student's curriculum and will instead be included in the Technical Certificate and the AAS in Information Systems Technology.

#### **Greyhound Athletics**

Greyhound athletics had another phenomenal year, both on the court and off, with both men's and women's basketball teams winning their respective Region II titles, and with the men advancing all the way to the National Tournament. They also set the highest overall athletic department GPA in the history of Greyhound Athletics, with a combined department GPA of 3.11.

- Men's Basketball The Men's Team won the Region II Title, the Central Plains Division Title, and finished with three wins in the NJCAA Division II Tournament and an eighth place finish in the National Rankings. Coach Chris Parker was named both the Region and District Coach of the Year. In the past seven years (Write out all numbers between zero and eleven.), the greyhounds have averaged 21.4 wins per season; and they've won five out of the last seven Region II Titles. Over the past ten years, they have moved 40 young men onto four-year programs, with three additional players already signed this year. It was also a banner year for them academically, as they posted their highest spring semester and overall GPAs ever, with it being the first season both have been above a 3.0. It is notable that this comes while playing a school-record 37 games, including three games in the National Tournament during spring break.
- Women's Basketball First-year Head Coach Addie Lees (This is her title.) was hired in late summer and, as a result, had to cobble together a women's team basketball team just three weeks before the start of the fall semester. That team, consisting largely of transfers, rallied around Coach Lees to over-perform all season, winning the Region II Tournament Title against nationally 13<sup>th</sup> ranked SAU Tech. They came up short against the more experienced and eventual fifth place national finisher, North Central Missouri, in the Central Plains District Championship. The Lady Greyhounds also performed well academically, posting their highest fall, spring (Seasons are only capitalized before the year, like Spring 2024.) and overall GPAs in the history of the program, with it also being the first time the overall Team GPA has been above 3.0.
- Baseball –Coach Jason Middleton has joined the Greyhound Athletics staff as the college's first baseball coach. Middleton comes to the Greyhounds from Kansas City Kansas Community College, where he served as Assistant Coach and recruiting coordinator. Prior to that, he served for ten seasons as Associate Head Coach & Recruiting Coordinator at William Jewell College in Liberty, Missouri. His coaching stops include five seasons at NJCAA schools, 11 seasons in the NCAA Division II ranks, and three seasons in NCAA Division I. He has coached 20 Major League Baseball Draft Picks/Signees over his career. Middleton is originally from Blue Spring, Missouri. He played baseball at Longview Community College, before his collegiate career was cut short due to injury. He graduated from the University of Science & Arts of Oklahoma with a Bachelor of Science degree in Kinesiology. He will also serve as the College's Wellness Coordinator, overseeing intramurals and campus fitness activities.

## Chancellor's Report Arkansas State University Three Rivers

## **Career Center**

On April 11 and 12, 60 students competed at the Hot Springs Convention Center's SkillsUSA State Leadership and Skills Conference. This represents more than 30% of the students who are enrolled. Five of our students won state championships. We also earned six silver and nine bronze medals, giving us a total of twenty medal-winning students.

All courses offer professional credentials. A total of 97% of students who have taken the CNA test so far have passed the skills portion, and 75% have passed the knowledge test. The OSHA 10-hour certification, SP2 Safety certification, and/or ASE automotive certification have all been awarded to welding, construction, and automotive students.

## Workforce Development

In Lufkin, Texas, we are now offering Professional Development Academy Training at the West Fraser Angelina Mill. We are currently conducting the ASUTR Professional Development Academy for the West Fraser Leola; Huttig; Joyce, LA; and Henderson, TX; Angelia Lumber in Lufkin, TX; Kohler; Xpress Boats and Veranda Luxury Pontoons; the Clark County Workforce Training Group (Siplast, South Central Electric Coop/South Central Connect, Drumco, Samantha's Café and Bakery, Arkadelphia Alliance), Jasper Lumber Co, Jasper, AL; Southeastern Timber Co, Akerman, MS (one class); and the ASUTR Academic Affairs team.


The FY 2022–23 training plan for the West Fraser Qualified Millwright and Electrician programs totals 3,488 hours. To date, we show a totals of \$509,981 in FY 22-23 Workforce Revenue, \$29,100 in West Fraser OSD Grant repayments, and 3,291 in Workforce Training Hours.

## TRiO - Student Support Services

The TRiO program staff worked on reviewing and entering student data on GPA, enrollment status, degree completion, transfer, and persistence from the 2021-2022 academic year for the Annual Performance Report. TRiO met its funded number to reach its objective of serving 200 students for the 2021-2022 academic year. Of those 200 students served, 87% persisted (i.e. enrolled in the Fall 2022 academic year, had a completion, or transferred to a 4-year institution by Fall 2022). A total of 91% of the 200 students had a cumulative GPA of 2.0 or better. Overall, 78% of the students, who were new to the program in the 2018-2019 cohort year (103 students), graduated with an Associate's degree or certificate.

## Chancellor's Report Henderson State University

## **Approximately 460 Students Graduate at Spring Commencement**

Spring commencement ceremonies were held on May 12, with approximately 460 undergraduate and graduate students receiving their degrees.

## ANCRC Awards Grants for Caddo Center, Barkman House Renovations

The Arkansas Natural and Cultural Resources Council (ANCRC) has awarded two grants, \$1.4 million and \$586,688, respectively, for renovations to the Caddo Center and the Barkman House. The Caddo Center project is a continuation of funding and renovations to create a one-stop location for Admissions, Financial Aid, Housing, Advising, Student Accounts, and Tutoring. Barkman House is located in the University's historic district and includes offices for alumni, development, marketing, and the Henderson Foundation.

## HSU Band Camp Returns June 13-17 and June 20-24

The Henderson Foundation is partnering with Henderson's Music Department to relaunch HSU Band Camp for Summer 2023. The HSU Band Camp provides a significant recruitment opportunity for students of all majors. It was not offered last summer, due to the financial exigency process.

## Henderson Planetarium Plans Return to Public Programming for Fall 2023

The Henderson Planetarium, located in the Reynolds Science Building, will soon announce a slate of fall programming for school groups and the general public. Additional plans are in progress, with community groups for educational programming, and events associated with the solar eclipse on April 8, 2024.

## Reddie Help Center Envisions Summer 2023 Opening

Opening in Summer 2023, the Reddie Help Center will work with students to navigate

campus resources and to provide critical assistance, including a food pantry, clothes closet, and a life-skills education center. The Reddie Help Center will coordinate community partners in order to stock food and clothing, collaborate with the Henderson Foundation to administer the Reddie Student Emergency Aid Fund, and partner with Sodexo to allocate meals from the Swipe Out Hunger Fund. The Reddie Help Center will be in the Garrison Center.

## Navigate Implementation Planned for Fall 2023

The implementation of Navigate—a dynamic technology platform and app that supports student persistence and graduation—is scheduled for Fall 2023. Students will use Navigate to locate needed resources across campus and to contact and schedule appointments with their Student Success Coach or faculty advisor. Faculty will have the ability, through the Navigate app, to report concerns about student progress, so that Henderson's care team can intervene to help a student get back on track.

## Henderson Increases FAFSA Filings for First-Year Students

Henderson has increased the percentage of admitted first-year students, who complete the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA), from 44.9 percent in 2021 to 52.7 percent in 2022. An increase in FAFSA applications improves affordability for students and builds steadier enrollment and net tuition revenue for the University.

## Lamar Taylor Wins Three NCAA National Championships, Men's Swimming Finishes 9th in the Country in DII, Women Finish in 13th Place

Lamar Taylor, a junior from Freeport, Bahamas, captured three individual national titles at the 2023 NCAA Division II Swimming Championships in Indianapolis, becoming the first HSU swimmer to win a single national championship since 2010. Taylor won the 50-yard freestyle, 100-yard backstroke, and 100-yard freestyle and was named the 2023 National Swimmer of the Year for NCAA Division II.

The men's swimming and diving team had a strong showing behind Taylor's performance and finished in ninth place nationally — the best result for the program since 2007. The women's team also had a terrific showing and took 13th place. Sophomore Kiara Pozvai, from Hungary, was named an All-American in four different events to lead the Red Wave.

## Women's Golf Wins GAC Title, Central Region, Finishes as National Semifinalist

Women's Golf won the GAC title for the third-straight season with a record-tying 50-stroke margin of victory at Hot Springs Country Club. True freshman, Lily Nelson, won the GAC Individual Championship and shot a conference record 6-under par for three rounds to win by 17 strokes.

The Reddie women's golf team captured its second-straight NCAA Central Regional title in Larchwood, Iowa, by erasing a four-shot deficit on the final day of competition. Gracen Blount shot a course-record 7-under par 65 in the final round to lift HSU to victory

The Reddies marched on to the NCAA Division II Championships in Eureka, Missouri, where they finished 7th out of 18 teams to advance to the 8-team match play bracket of the tournament for the first time in program history. HSU defeated No. 2 seed West Texas A&M 3-2 in the opening round of match play before falling to Nova Southeastern in the Final Four.

## Men's Golf Wins GAC Title, Ethan Wilkins Top-10 at NCAA Championships

The Reddie men's golf team won its second-straight GAC Golf Championship at Hot Springs Country Club, defeating Harding by 14 strokes to claim the seventh GAC crown for the program since 2014. Miller Harris was the GAC's Individual Champion, becoming the fifth male golfer at HSU to win the league individually.

Henderson finished in a tie for 6th as a team at the NCAA Central/Midwest Regional. Ethan Wilkins advanced to the NCAA Championships as an individual and shot 7-under par 65 on the final day to finish in eighth place overall — the best finish for any individual in school history at the National Championships.
