Chancellor's Report Arkansas State University-Jonesboro

Academic Affairs and Research:

- The Higher Learning Commission's (HLC) Institutional Actions Council voted to approve the Doctor of Veterinary Medicine degree program for the Arkansas State University (A-State) College of Veterinary Medicine (CVM).
 - Dr. Heidi Banse, Associate Dean for Education Strategy at the Louisiana State University School of Veterinary Medicine, was selected as Dean of the CVM and will begin work on July 22, 2024.
- The HLC ten-year comprehensive evaluation visit was conducted in April 2024. The report from the committee will be available in late May 2024.
- HLC's Institutional Actions Council voted to approve Qatar as an A-State location; it officially opens on July 1, 2024.
- Dr. Kristin Johnson is leading a multi-project initiative called the Howl RESTORE (Research, Education, Service, Transition, and Outreach through Reflective Engagement) Hub. The projects are funded by the Arkansas Department of Human Services for a total of \$31,315,468 over the next five years. Major goals of the Howl RESTORE Hub are to study and improve care for clients, who have intellectual or developmental disabilities and clients in foster care. Additionally, the Howl RESTORE Hub will transform how the Medicaid system supports clients and care providers in Arkansas.
- Twenty-six faculty and staff members from Academic Affairs opted into the Optional Voluntary Retirement Incentive Program. There will be demonstrable salary savings for two years as a result of these retirements.
- Academic units have implemented cost-saving measures this academic year, including canceling low-enrollment classes. As a result, we have significantly increased our return on all summer academic workload, as well as on the December and May interim terms, compared to last year.
- Dr. Cherisse Jones-Branch was appointed as dean of the College of Liberal Arts and Communication, effective July 1, 2024.
- Dr. Brad Rawlins will serve as interim dean for the Graduate School, effective July 1, 2024. A national search for the permanent dean will commence in early Fall 2024.
- Due to the retirement of Dr. Mary Jane Bradley, the process of appointing an interim dean of the College of Education and Behavioral Science has begun, with an expected start date of July 1, 2024.

- Seven faculty members received 2023-24 Faculty Achievement Awards. These
 competitive awards recognize faculty members, who go above and beyond to
 serve our students in the areas of teaching, advising, scholarship, and service.

ATHLETICS

Athletics Administration:

- The "Howl on Wheels Red Wolves Road Show" is returning with additional locations in this year's lineup. The 2024 coaches caravan will feature six stops, beginning May 20 and running through June 18.
- During A-State's fourth annual Day of Giving, Athletics raised \$320,025 as part of the University's \$837,936 total contributions during the 24-hour event. The \$320,025 raised represents a 311% increase over the previous year's amount and was the second-highest total for the Red Wolves Foundation in the event's four-year history.

 Athletics held its annual student-athletes award banquet, the "State Awards," at First National Bank Arena, celebrating the Red Wolves' academic success, athletic achievements, and community service.

Football:

- A school-record of nine student-athletes from the 2023 football team were named to the 2024 National Football Foundation & College Hall of Fame (NFF) Hampshire Honor Society, which is comprised of players, from all divisions, who each maintained a cumulative 3.2 GPA or better throughout their careers.
- The Red Wolves hosted their annual Pack Day Spring Game at Centennial Bank Stadium, which included a free youth clinic, food trucks, and autograph/photo opportunities with the team.

Track & Field:

- Jim Patchell was named both the Men's and Women's Sun Belt Conference Indoor Coach of the Year. Pole vault champion, Bradley Jelmert, earned the league's Men's Field Performer of the Year honor, while Michelle Ogbemudia was tabbed the Women's Newcomer of the Year.
- Jelmert Bradley became the first A-State men's track & field student-athlete to medal at the NCAA Indoor Championships since 2017, taking silver in the men's pole vault. Colby Eddowes placed seventh in the heptathlon as the Red Wolves had two student-athletes tabbed First Team All-America for the first time since 2014.
- The Red Wolves finished the indoor championship 24th in the nation, earning the program's first top 25 finish since 2014.
- Director of Track & Field and Cross Country Dr. Jim Patchell, the program's all-time winningest head coach, was selected as part of the 29th class of the Arkansas Track & Field Hall of Fame.

Men's Basketball:

- Junior guard Avery Felts was chosen Academic All-District by College Sports Communicators (CSC).
- The Red Wolves ended their season as one of just five Division-I programs, under the guidance of a coach in his first year, to go from 20-plus losses in a season to 20-plus wins the next. The program claimed a 20-win season for just the seventh time in school history.
- Head coach Bryan Hodgson signed a new agreement extending his contract through 2029.
- After a stellar postseason run to the Sun Belt Conference Tournament championship game, the Red Wolves advanced to the semifinals of the Ro College

- Basketball Invitational (Ro CBI) after making their first postseason tournament since 1999.
- Senior guard Caleb Fields and junior guard Taryn Todd were both named All-Sun Belt Conference, as first and second-team selections, respectively.
- Senior guard Caleb Fields was named Second Team All-District 23, as voted on by the National Association of Basketball Coaches (NABC).
- The Red Wolves posted 11 Sun Belt Conference wins, their most since 2016-17.
 They also secured the No. 4 seed in the league tournament, their highest non-divisional seeding since 2014.
- The Red Wolves defeated Louisiana in the Sun Belt Conference Tournament semifinals by 27 points, their largest margin of victory ever in an SBC Tournament game, before knocking off No. 1 seed Appalachian State to advance to the finals for the first time since 2007.

Women's Bowling:

- Emma Stull, Karli VanDuinen, Brooklyn Buchanan, and Faith Welch were recognized by the National Tenpin Coaches Association (NTCA) as All-America selections.
- Advancing to the national championship match for the third time in the last four seasons, and for the fourth time in program history, the Red Wolves finished as runner-up in the National Collegiate Bowling Championship.

Women's Tennis:

- A-State improved its wins total over last season by six matches, finishing the year with eight victories that were its most since the 2012 campaign.
- Student-athletes Rebecca Brody, Yasmine Humbert, Sarah Millard, and Nejla Zukic were all selected to the College Sports Communicators (CSC) Academic All-District Team.

Women's Golf:

 Making their first postseason appearance in program history, the Red Wolves finished fourth at the Golfweek National Golf Invitational. They also posted a school-record single-season stroke average of 294.42.

Men's Golf:

- Thomas Schmidt claimed runner-up honors, and for the first time in program history, the Red Wolves won the stroke play portion of the Sun Belt Conference Men's Golf Championship.
- The Red Wolves claimed their second Sun Belt Conference championship and third conference title, also winning the SBC in 2019 and American South in 1989. A-

State went on to compete in an NCAA Regional for the first time since 2021 and for the seventh time in program history.

Women's Soccer:

 Playing Harding in a spring exhibition contest, the Red Wolves competed in both their first-ever night game and contest at Centennial Bank Stadium.

DIVERSITY, INCLUSION, & COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT

Access and Accommodation Services (AAS):

- Forty-two students have registered for AAS since April, bringing the total to 1,110.
- AAS provided approximately 300 van pickups and class drop-offs this quarter.
- AAS staff held seven professional development training sessions with faculty, staff, and students.
- By the end of June, AAS will have awarded four privately funded scholarships to students with disabilities for the upcoming academic year.

ADVANCE:

ADVANCE is a program for faculty from underrepresented groups who provide guidance, support, and resources on their path to tenure and promotion.

- The following workshops were coordinated by the faculty liaison, Dr. Lille Fears:
 - Unlocking Bold Leadership: Challenged participants to discover and cultivate the key traits that define bold leaders;
 - Learning to Lead with Grace: Explored the barriers or challenges faced in navigating higher education;
 - Don't Do This! A Brief Journey through Best and Worst Practices from Pre-Tenure to Tenure: Provided tips for faculty pursing tenure.

AmeriCorps:

- In recognition of National AmeriCorps Week, the NRWCEP held a luncheon for city officials and community stakeholders, featuring a proclamation by the mayor of Jonesboro.
- Two Red Wolf Mentors completed 300 hours of service and received certificates of completion for serving their community through the NRWCEP.
- The NRWCEP director attended the annual America's Service Commission Conference in Minneapolis.

Community Engagement:

 Activities sponsored or co-sponsored during this period included promotional spots on KLEK radio, supported a class visit to the Civil Rights Museum in Memphis, sponsored the performance stage at the NEA Cultural Expo, coordinated

- with Arkansas Game and Fish to host its Family Fun Day event at the A-State Pavilion, and supported the Strong-Turner Association's annual 3.0 GPA Celebration, along with three additional programs.
- The 2024 Excellence in Diversity Awards Ceremony recognized three faculty members with the Excellence in Diversity Award, and presented two additional nominees with a Champion of Diversity Award.

Diversifying Our Curing Community (DOCC):

• DOCC was a grant-funded program for students interested in a career as a medical doctor. Grant funds ended on December 15, 2023.

Multicultural Center (MC):

- The MC staff held their semester graduation program with 40 graduates participating and an audience of over 100.
- The MC staff and ambassadors have begun planning activities for Fall 2024.
- The MC will staff information tables at each New Student Orientation and will attend the annual Diversity, Equity, Inclusion and Belonging Conference, hosted by NYIT and St. Bernards Healthcare.

Student Diversity Recruitment:

 Planning has begun for the fall INSPIRE program, an extended orientation program for first-year students.

ENROLLMENT MANGEMENT, GLOBAL ENGAGEMENT AND OUTREACH

Undergraduate Recruitment:

- We are cautiously optimistic about new student enrollment for the Fall 2024 semester. We are within 100 domestic students preregistered for Fall 2024, compared to our final 11th day numbers last year. Below are some key statistics:
 - Applications: 6,373 Fall 2024 vs. 5,033 Fall 2023 (+26.6%)
 - Accepts: 4,810 in Fall 2024 vs. 2,275 in Fall 2023 (+111%)
 - Accepts from Arkansas: 3,945 for Fall 2024 vs. 1,775 Fall 2023 (+122%)
 - Transfer Admits: +18% for Fall 2024
- We are up 28% in group campus visits from January May compared to 2023
- More than 91% of the 800+ students, who attended a Red Wolf Jumpstart admitted student event in Spring 2024, registered for New Student Orientation, suggesting a very high yield from the event series.
- Early college program numbers are up 21%, due to expansion into Gravette and the Arkansas Arts Academy in Northwest Arkansas.

- As we prepare for the Fall 2025 recruitment cycle, we have already reached out to more than 20,000 seniors and juniors across Arkansas.
- We are moving forward with a new enrollment, management-marketing campaign: Great Minds, Big Hearts.
- We are currently planning major social media, outdoor, TV, and geo-targeting marketing campaigns.
- We are analyzing the success of our current scholarship programs and offerings.

International Programs:

 International Programs continues to track ahead. Numbers are up from 105 in Summer 2023 to 127 in Summer 2024. We also expect significant growth in international students for Fall 2024.

FINANCE AND ADMINISTRATION

First National Bank Arena (FNBA):

- FNBA hosted A-State and several high school commencement ceremonies.
- Tickets are on sale now for Zach Williams and Brantly Gilbert.

Red Wolf Wellness (RWW):

- RWW implemented a 12-week Health & Fitness Coaching Program catered to faculty and staff, spanning from February 5th to April 26th. With 31 participants enrolled, the program features personalized coaching by our team of personal trainers and interns.
- Our team introduced LIFT, a strength training course emphasizing both upper and lower body workouts, with participants attending sessions twice per week.
- We developed a Fitness and Activity Points Challenge slated to coincide with the conclusion of the spring semester.

Training & Development:

- Training & Development hosted 66 new staff members for orientation during the months of January, February, and March and began the third cohort of Leadership A-State in February.
- We added six new courses to the Learn Center, and coordinated Safe Zone Facilitator training for 17 new team members on campus.

University Safety and Emergency Management (USEM):

- Worked with contractor on annual Fire Alarm inspections;
- Worked with JFD on spring fraternity house inspection and follow-up;
- Held spring fire drills for residents' halls;

- Distributed updated Emergency Action Plans throughout campus;
- Hosted G-367 Emergency Planning for Campus Executives Training.

Enterprise Risk Management:

- Continued implementation of the Henderson State University Vehicle Safety Program within Banner and gathered historical data for document imaging and preservation;
- Presently obtaining out-of-state driving reports.

Information and Technology (ITS):

- Three of five campus-wide IT infrastructure refresh projects are well underway.
 This portion consists of underground boring of fiber lines from building-to-building distribution entry points, and supporting last year's full campus network switch updates/replacements.
- During the previous quarter, the focus of the Banner Central Support team was
 working with both four-year campuses to manage the Financial Aid/FASFA
 changes. Banner Central Support, along with Ferrilli consultants, collaborated with
 both the four-year and two-year campuses daily to work through the issues leading
 towards student advising and accurate awarding of financial aid.
- Excellent progress in IT security was achieved and measured at all seven campuses via the internally developed IT Security Maturity Matrix standard rubric and scorecard. This includes coverage for the GLBA (Gramm-Leach-Bliley Act) via a compliance check sheet, along with internal and external monitoring of security threats. Strength in collaboration across all seven campuses allowed for a clear legislative assessment in these areas.
- Overall, the 24x7 use, availability, and support of information technology across each campus is stable, with capacity and scalability for all students, faculty, and staff.

Fiscal Operations:

- Controller's Office: Travel Services is updating its website, training materials, and Concur messages in response to the DFA's updated travel policy for state employees. Property Accounting began departmental inventories and has completed twenty so far.
- **Treasurer's Office:** Student Financial Services is working to communicate with students, who still have outstanding spring term balances, in order to minimize outstanding accounts receivable to the extent possible.
- **Procurement:** The annual vendor show was held March 27 and had an attendance of more than 300 faculty and staff members.

- Auxiliary Services: The Inclusive Access program (Opt-Out), guaranteeing first day access to textbooks and lower prices for students, had nearly \$643,000 in sales this spring semester. Dining's "Late-Night Breakfast," served by University administrators and staff, served 573 students from 10:30 p.m. until midnight on April 25.
- **Budget Planning and Development:** We are finalizing completion of the FY 2025 budget.

Delta Center for Economic Development:

- The Delta Center provided a three-session entrepreneurship training in April. Paul Guess, President of CEO of Guess and Company; Dr. Clint Vogus (NGCOB); and representatives from SBTDC, AEDC, EAPDD, and Arkansas Capital Corporation were presenters.
- We administered the second session of the Arkansas Delta Women's Leadership Academy in El Dorado, and the Delta Regional Authority's Leadership Program in Baton Rouge, LA.
- The Delta Center joined UCA and The Utilities to provide leadership training and information at the 2024 Arkansas Leadership Consortium in Conway.
- The Delta Center presented at the Delta Symposium on the integration of Hoxie Public Schools.

University Police Department (UPD):

- All sworn personnel have completed training in Cultural Diversity, Advanced Use of Force, Ethics, Racial Profiling, Behavioral Health and Crisis Intervention, Sexual Assault Investigations, Prescription Drug and Opioid Overdose (Narcan Use), Domestic Violence, Duty to Intervene and Post Custody Care, and Law Enforcement Response to Autism Spectrum Disorders, for a total of 62 continuing education hours in 2024 to date.
- Annual firearms training and qualifications for handguns and rifles are currently in process.
- New police vehicle graphics were designed and applied to the new patrol
 units. The new graphics incorporate the Red Wolves logo into the design. The
 agency is completing a full transition to new uniforms for all patrol staff. The new
 uniforms include a color change and outer carriers to better distribute the police
 equipment weight which reduces officer fatigue and injury.
- Monthly training has started for our sworn staff, using our new virtual training simulation environment (VirTra). During April and May, we provided training using our virtual simulator for the Jonesboro Police Department cadets, which included officers from around the region, and the Jonesboro Police Citizens' Police Academy.

 The agency is preparing for an annual accreditation review with the Commission on Accreditation of Law Enforcement Agencies.

UNIVERSITY MARKETING & COMMUNICATIONS

University Marketing:

- Marketing has designed and placed ads in the Arkansas Democrat Gazette, Jonesboro Sun, Arkansas Business, Soirée, Arkansas NEXT, Hooten's, Miss Arkansas, Facebook, Instagram, and more.
- We have designed and installed new A-State signage to pair with the newly redesigned "Welcome to Jonesboro" signs.
- The University website project continues to progress. We have finished the discovery phase and are currently working on site maps, wireframes, and design direction. The new website is on pace for an early 2025 launch.
- We are currently finalizing advertising budget and marketing strategies for FY 24-25.

University Communications (UC):

- UC continues to produce news releases to highlight major campus announcements, events, and the accomplishments of our students, faculty, and staff.
- We coordinated PR for the following campus events:
 - Convocation of Scholars Month of April;
 - Women's Business Leadership Conference April 4, 2024;
 - A-State Day of Giving April 9, 2024;
 - Create@State April 18, 2024
 - Wilson Award Ceremony April 25;
 - o 2024 Spring Commencement Ceremonies May 4, 2024.

Publications and Creative Services (PCS):

- PCS has collaborated with the Provost's Office to add new visual elements to the University commencement ceremonies.
- It has designed theme art for the Howl RESTORE partnership with DHS.
- We have a completed design and layout of the College of Veterinary Medicine self-study for the American Veterinary Medical Association Council on Education.
- PCS continues to serve as an internal advertising agency for major campus initiatives.

<u>Digital Creative Media (DCM):</u>

- DCM provided A/V support for the Arkansas Department of Education meeting at A-State on April 11, 2024.
- We launched the website and interest forms for the College of Veterinary Medicine clinical affiliate program.
- Videos and other visuals for New Student Orientation sessions were produced.
- We are starting work on a new website for the First National Bank Arena, and will shift to a platform that is easier to use and requires less maintenance.
- DCM continues to produce high-quality photos from campus events, as well as instudio and candid photography of everyday campus life.

STUDENT AFFAIRS

University Housing:

- The anticipated campus resident total for Summer 2024 is 518.
- A-State is hosting Varsity cheerleading and dance camps during the month of June. High school students from the area will be participating in one of the four residential camps offered during the month. Varsity is expecting a total of 1,160 student participants.

Student Events on Campus:

- The National Pan-Hellenic Council Greek chapters visited local elementary and junior high schools to highlight campus life at A-State.
- The 2024-25 Student Government Association President/Vice President were installed during the month of April. Micayla McGowen will serve as president and Ahniya Williamson will serve as the vice president.
- Natan Gomez, from Irapuato, Mexico, is the 2024 Wilson Award recipient. He was honored at the annual Wilson Award event. Five additional students were recognized as Distinguished Service Award recipients: Baily Blackmon of Perryville, Christopher Crutchfield of North Little Rock, Ann Long of Jackson, MO, Garrett Partain of Lepanto, and Khushi Singh of Bryant.
- The Student Activities Board hosted traditional campus events during the spring semester, including SpringFest, Day at the Park, and Stock the Food Pantry.
- Rugby players participated in post-season matchups and advanced to the national semi-finals. The team finished the year ranked as a top-ten team.
- The Global Student Leader program traveled to Italy in May. Student participants visited multiple locations, experienced the country's unique culture, and immersed themselves in Italy's rich history.
- New Student Orientation sessions are scheduled for May and June. Each session features an academic college, offers students and parents information about campus life, and provides the opportunity for students to connect with peers. This

- program is designed to welcome students to campus, prepare students for the fall semester, and highlight the benefits of student engagement.
- The Food Pantry continues to offer a much-needed service to the campus community. The pantry served 2,110 during Fall 2023 and 2,157 during Spring 2024.
- Volunteer A-State partnered with several campus departments and Sodexo to promote a "Stock the Food Pantry" drive during April. Campus residents were encouraged to donate food items, clothing, personal hygiene items, or room décor. The items will be used to assist new campus residents during summer and fall.
- The Red WOLF Center student usage total from August 1, 2023 May 15, 2024 is 65,239. Wellness and recreation are key aspects of student life. The Red WOLF Center offers an array of options for student to maintain a healthy lifestyle and interact with peers.
- Group fitness classes include yoga, spin, sculpt, cardio/tone, HIT, and butt/guts.
 Intramural events hosted throughout the semester include pickleball, basketball, bowling, soccer, softball, and table tennis.

UNIVERSITY ADVANCEMENT

Advancement Services:

- For the third quarter, the University recorded a total of 6,025 gifts and commitments from 2,496 individual donors for a total of \$3,252,243.59. The overall giving amount includes outright donations of cash, gifts-in-kind, planned gifts, and new pledges.
 - Included is a significant philanthropic commitment from the Beck Foundation, Inc., which provided the impetus for the naming of the Beck College of Sciences and Mathematics. The Becks' gifts will endow multiple funds within the Beck College.

Alumni Relations:

- Homecoming is set for October 26, 2024. There will not be a Distinguished Alumni Awards Dinner this year. The Alumni Association will be celebrating 100 years on October 25, at the Cooper Alumni Center. More details to come.
- Thanks to Arkansans' support of the License2Howl program, eight seniors from around the state will receive the 2024 License2Howl Scholarship. Campus Cares Challenge

In honor of her 41 years of administrative leadership service at ASUB, the College has established a privately funded scholarship in honor of Dean Teddy Davis, who is retiring on June 30. The Teddy Davis Educational Scholarship is open to full-time ASUB students with a minimum GPA of 2.5. It's an opportunity available to students across all ASUB campuses.

Davis received her associate of arts degree from ASUB in 1978. She then transferred to Arkansas State University in Jonesboro and earned a bachelor of science in education with a focus in social studies in 1980, a master of science in education with a focus in political science in 1981, and a specialist degree in community college teaching in 1983. Davis' teaching experience began as a student teacher of eighthgrade history in Jonesboro in the spring of 1980, and she later returned to ASU in the fall of 1980 to continue her degree, while serving as a graduate assistant from 1980 to 1982, and then as a teaching intern from 1982 to 1983. Returning to ASUB as an Instructor in 1983, she was promoted to Assistant Professor in 1987 and Associate Professor in 2008. Davis' administrative leadership began in 2002 as Division Chair of the Education and Social Sciences Division, until ASUB was reorganized in 2017. She continued to serve as Program Coordinator of the Arts and Humanities Division from 2018 to 2020. Named Interim Dean of the Arts and Humanities from 2019 to 2020, Davis has served as Dean since 2020.

Chancellor's Report Arkansas State University-Mountain Home

ALIGN Grant

Arkansas State University-Mountain Home (ASUMH) and Baxter Health received a grant in the amount of \$625,175, through the American Rescue Plan Act of 2021, for the Arkansas Linking Industry to Grow Nurses (ALIGN) Program. The award will allow ASUMH and Baxter Health to develop an innovative new partnership that will create a clinical pre-residency experience for students at Baxter Health by expanding simulation lab experiences and by standardizing nursing clinical practices. This collaborative initiative aims to increase the LPN and RN nursing admission capacity at ASUMH, to actively recruit and retain clinical nurse educators, and to decrease the time required for graduates to integrate into hospital situations.

Delta Regional Authority (DRA) Grant

ASUMH will receive \$450,000 from the Delta Workforce Grant Program, through the Delta Regional Authority, to establish an extrusion and injection molding program at the Dr. Robert L. Myers Technical Education Campus. The grant is part of a \$10 million investment in projects across eight states, through the Delta Workforce Grant Program (DWP). The new training will be available in the 2024-2025 academic year, and the classes will apply toward a degree in Mechatronics.

Gotaas Hall Expansion Appropriation

A legislative package, presented by U.S. Senator John Boozman and signed into law in March, will help fund enhanced health education at ASUMH, through a \$6 million appropriation. The funding will help support the expansion of the ASUMH healthcare education facility in Gotaas Hall, which currently includes simulation laboratories with lifelike medical mannequins, an ambulance simulator, and classrooms that replicate hospital rooms. The expansion will create more educational opportunities for ASUMH students and will enhance technology to develop our future medical workforce.

Technical Campus Grand Opening and Technical Center Dedication

A grand opening for the Dr. Robert L. Myers Technical Education Campus and dedication of the Czeschin-Newth Workforce Development Center is planned for May 30, 2024, to celebrate the substantial progress that has been made toward the completion of the campus and facility. A ribbon-cutting ceremony will be held, and tours of the facility will be available for guests. Members of both the Czeschin and Newth families plan to be in attendance.

Strategic Priority 1: Student Success

- ASUN Honors Program student, Zoei James, a shining example of our commitment to student success, presented a poster session on "Adolescent Substance Usage" at the prestigious NextGen Humanities Conference Student Symposium in Little Rock from March 6-9, 2024. Her exceptional work, a part of her honors project for the Lifespan Development class, was completed during the Fall Semester of 2023. Zoei, currently enrolled in the Traditional Nursing program, continues to embody the spirit of academic excellence at ASUN.
- On February 20, the ASUN Marked Tree Campus hosted the highly competitive ECT Wiring Competition,
 a testament to the caliber of students we attract. Eighteen students from five high schools vied for
 scholarships to attend ASUN, showcasing their skills and determination. James Mata, from
 JHS/NEACTC, emerged as the first-place winner, with Kade Johnson and Lawson Tompkins from Piggott
 High School securing second and third place, respectively.
- The fifteenth annual Northeast Arkansas Weld-a-thon event, held on February 20 at the ASUN Jonesboro Campus, was a resounding success. Thirteen high schools participated, and students competed for prizes and ASUN scholarships. These gold medalists are now eligible to compete in the National Competition, which will take place in Atlanta, Georgia. We are incredibly proud of our talented and accomplished students!

- Masen Woodall, an honors student and Aviator basketball player, attended the ACC Student Leadership Association Conference in Little Rock, along with Lana Gonzalez, Student Government President, and Shyler Mcelhannon, Student Government Senator.
- Honors Program Spotlight! Our honors students recently participated in inspiring luncheons with our leadership team as part of their Honors Leadership Seminar course, which Dr. Typhanie Myers facilitated. During the event, the students presented their Vision Boards, which showcased their bold dreams and aspirations, including a piece on self-efficacy. Seeing these students set such high standards for themselves is truly impressive!

Strategic Priority 2: Employee Success

- Congratulations to Zach Altom for earning his Master of Science in Nursing, and to Maddie Staggs for attaining her Bachelor of Science in Nursing.
- Chef Lisa Godsey was featured in April's "Occasions Magazine," showcasing her talents and the remarkable Culinary Arts program at ASUN-Jonesboro.
- Charles Walker, Director of Workforce Development, represented ASU-Newport at a panel discussion on Workplace Best Practices, hosted by the Arkansas Economics Development Commission (AECD) at the Jonesboro Chamber of Commerce. Other panelists included representatives from Hytrol, Life Plus, and UACCB.
- Mark Hanan, the director of Instructional Design and Distance Education, allowed the Diesel Technology IGNITE program students to virtually explore the world of diesel technology on March 29 at the ASU-Newport Campus.
- The Student Career Closet will soon open on the top floor of the Newport campus library. Guidelines for donations will be announced. Kudos to the Dean of Students, Debbie Hardy, and Director of Career and Transfer Services, Christy Mann, for launching this student-support initiative.

Strategic Priority 3: Institutional Excellence

 Achieving the Dream (ATD) has announced that it has selected seven rural community colleges for the second cohort of its Accelerating Equitable Outcomes initiative. These colleges will become part of ATD's nationwide network of more than 300 community colleges. They will collaborate with the network to share strategies and learn innovative, evidence-based ways to serve rural communities. The colleges selected for this program are Arkansas State University-Newport, Chippewa Valley Technical College, Coconino Community College, Eastern Shore Community College, Isothermal Community College, Riverland Community College, and Wor-Wic Community College. - ASUN was nominated for the Best of Northeast Arkansas Contest, sponsored by Jonesboro Radio Group.
- Hytrol donated stainless steel sheet stock, worth \$8,000-\$10,000, to ASUN's manufacturing and workforce programs.
- The ASUN Prison Education Program has achieved a significant milestone: the first female inmates have received AWS certification in Gas Metal Arc Welding and Shielded Metal Arc Welding.
- On February 29, ASUN Career Coaches and Dr. Monica Mobley, Dean for STEM, hosted the Lunch and Learn speaker, Dr. Francisco Muller-Sanchez, an assistant professor of Physics and Astronomy at the University of Memphis.
 - The Lunch and Learn Series was developed in partnership with M&P Bank, in conjunction with efforts by the Newport Economic Development Council, to provide community outreach in conjunction with the Great American Eclipse. Career coaches from various schools participated in virtual outreach with 125 high school students from Northeast Arkansas. Students learned about several career paths Dr. Muller-Sanchez considered in Air and Space Science, such as aeronautical engineering or satellite technician. Coaches distributed outreach materials developed by Dr. Mobley for the regional education cooperatives and ASUJ Eclipse glasses courtesy of the DCTE.
- The Northeast Arkansas Science Olympiad was held on the ASU-Newport Campus on February 24. The
 event was a tremendous success, and we owe much gratitude to our student volunteers from Phi Theta
 Kappa (PTK), the Honors Program, and our Natural Science degree-seeking students.
- PTK, Student Life, and Associate Professor of Criminology Michael Moody provided IGNITE students with Narcan training. The training qualified students to administer Narcan in case of an overdose.
- Our Adult Education Department has been selected to receive D&E funding for its application. This
 means that the department will continue to receive ABE, GAE, and SNAP E&T funds (if applicable) and
 will be able to provide adult education and literacy services in Craighead, Jackson, and Poinsett
 Counties. We congratulate Dr. Amber Grady, Director Barbara Warren, and the Adult Education Staff
 for this recognition.
- The ASUN spring commencement ceremonies took place on May 10, 2024, with two sessions: the Health Professions Ceremony at 11:00 a.m. and the General Education, Adult Education, and Applied Sciences ceremony at 2:00 p.m. A total of 349 graduates received 514 degrees and certificates during the event. Cassidy Chrestman Powers from Bay High School received the Charles L. Welch Presidential Scholar Award, presented to a two-year college graduate in the ASU System transferring to A-State or Henderson State University. Each community college within the System will select one graduating student annually for this unique award.

- On March 28, the fifth McPherson WAGE class had their graduation ceremony. Tonya Gates, the
 Director of Prison Education Program Engagement; Daniel Lee, the Assistant Professor of Adult
 Education; Joe Campbell, the Dean for Liberal Arts; and Assistant Warden Moss were in attendance.
- John Judd, Instructor of Advanced Manufacturing, held a class on Electricity for Homeowners, covering electrical basics and simple repairs.
- Tad Terrell, a representative from Green Point Agriculture, spoke to students in the Agricultural Resource Management course about ag retail and general farming.
- On March 14, we hosted the ASU System Board of Trustees (BOT) meeting. The BOT approved several
 items, including two new program proposals: A.A.S. in Business Supervision and Management and A.S.
 in Data Science. Kudos to the entire ASUN Family for rolling out the red carpet to the Board of
 Trustees, System Office Staff, and System Universities.
- On March 14, the Automotive Service Technology Program held its 24th annual high school competition.
 The event was attended by 23 students from different schools, including Jonesboro, Valley View,
 Brookland, Bay, Greene County Tech, and Nettleton. The students competed for scholarships and
 bragging rights. Gabriel Hosier from Nettleton High School was the first-place winner, followed by
 Dakota Harris from Greene County Tech in second place. Eli Leslie from Jonesboro High School was
 awarded the third-place winner title.
- ASUN student-athletes collaborated with the Newport Economic Development Commission to prepare a mass mailing for the Jackson County Historical Society. As part of their Service Learning for Introduction to Education course, the students addressed and readied 727 letters for mail delivery. The students enrolled in the Teacher Education program, partnered with Jonesboro Parks and Recreation, and completed a service-learning project. Their goal was to plant new trees and prune the existing ones in the downtown area of Jonesboro. This project allowed the students to give back to the community and learn about the vegetation that thrives in Arkansas, the plants that add color and beauty, and the art of pruning trees. The Mayor of Jonesboro, Harold Copenhaver, and the Director of Parks and Recreation, Danny Kapales, joined the ASUN students in this project. The students were highly

- impressed by the knowledge and expertise about planting and pruning of city employees Adam Larson and Antwane Blair.
- ASU-Newport Applied Science programs hosted an Applied Science Day, which allowed Cedar Ridge students to participate in hands-on projects, program overviews, and tours.
- Jonathan Ambs, Instructor of Advanced Manufacturing, led a series of classes on April 20 and April 27, including 3D printing, basic automotive maintenance, and home and hobby welding.

 worked hand in hand with the St. Bernards staff and catered to a record turnout of 1,588 students! It's

Over ten weeks, participants were taught effective workplace behaviors, building trust in the workplace, résumé building, interview preparation, computer basics, and Microsoft Word, PowerPoint, and Excel.

Chancellor's Report Arkansas State University Mid-South

Higher Learning Commission Update

On April 8-9, ASU Mid-South underwent a successful 10-Year Comprehensive Evaluation Site Visit by a Peer Review Team from the Higher Learning Commission. Thank you to ASU System President, Robin Myers, and to Trustees Clark, Eddington, Rudolph, Gardner, and Harpole for taking part in the governance session of this review. While we have yet to receive our official report, the Peer Reviewers cited several areas of strength during their exit meeting with College administrators.

- First, they spoke about ASU Mid-South's positive institutional culture, which they said was reinforced in every interaction they had from students, to faculty and staff, to external partners. They lauded the College's preparation. , Specifically, they cited the quality of the assurance argument, how easy it was to read, and how it provided great supporting documentation. They spoke to the quality of participation in the process–from contributing to the assurance argument, to preparing for the visit, to participating in the sessions. It was noted that everyone seemed to be participating because they genuinely wanted to, not simply because they felt they had to, and that the discussions were robust.
- They cited what they referred to as ASU Mid-South's "obvious program agility." Specifically, they noted that the College had been able to pivot from non-viable programs to those that truly seemed to reflect the community's needs. They also noted that the College's programs were aligned with, and responsive to, the changing requirements of the programs' respective registry and certification exams.
- Finally, they stated that, from a federal compliance standpoint, the consumer information provided on the ASU Mid-South website is "exemplary, a model."

As of the writing of this report, the College has not yet received official notification of its reaffirmation of accreditation. However, there is every reason to believe that it will be received prior to the June Board Meeting.

Paramedic Program Update

On March 6, ASU Mid-South completed a successful Committee on Accreditation for the EMS Professions (CoAEMSP) program review. The results of this review were entirely positive, with no standards violations found and a long list of program strengths noted, including the following:

(1) the quality and experience of ASU Mid-South's EMS faculty; (2) the quality and experience of the program's medical director; (3) the support of the College's administration; (4) the commitment demonstrated by the Arkansas Department of Health; and (5) the highly motivated members of the program's advisory committee and clinical partners. In fact, the site visit was so overwhelmingly positive, we received the official Letter of Review (LOR) from CoAEMSP within 24 hours.

This LOR was the final hurdle to clear in the preliminary accreditation process required by the Commission on Accreditation of Allied Health Education Programs (CAAHEP). Its successful conclusion signifies a huge step forward in ASU Mid-South's ongoing efforts to deliver high-growth, high-demand, high-wage Allied Health programming to residents of our region. ASU Mid-South's first cohort of Paramedic students will enroll this fall.

Inaugural Charles L. Welch Presidential Scholar Named

ASU Mid-South graduate, Remonie Whitelow, has been named the College's inaugural Charles L. Welch Presidential Scholar, named in honor of former System President, Dr. Charles Welch. In addition to being an outstanding student, Remonie is an active member of Sigma Kappa Delta Honor Society and works in our Learning Success Center as a tutor and front-desk receptionist. She completed her Associate of Science in Elementary Education (K-6) in May and plans to transfer to A-State and complete her bachelor's degree in Elementary Education on the campus of ASU Mid-South.

Department of Labor Strengthening Community College's Grant

On April 10, the U.S. Department of Labor announced an award of \$65 million in grants to sixteen colleges in fourteen states. The grant is to be used in expanding each college's capacity to provide training that meets the skill development needs of employers and helps students obtain good jobs. A consortium of Arkansas colleges, consisting of the University of Arkansas Pulaski Technical College (lead); ASU Mid-South; East Arkansas Community College; Southeast Arkansas Community College; and Northwest Arkansas Community College, received \$5,736,624 under this initiative, known as the Strengthening Community Colleges Grants Programs. The funds will be used to enhance Allied Health offerings on each of these campuses. ASU Mid-South's portion of this grant totals \$695,075, and will be focused on the establishment of a Practical Nursing program.

ASU Mid-South Student Among State's Top GED Scorers

ASU Mid-South Adult Education student, Idaysion Caulkins, was honored at the Arkansas State Capitol on April 24, for having the ninth-highest GED score in the state for 2023.

Tommy Goldsby Memorial Wild Game Dinner

This year's Tommy Goldsby Wild Game Dinner and Auction, sponsored for the eighth time by the ASU Mid-South Foundation, was another tremendous success, raising \$356,000 for the Thomas

Goldsby Memorial Scholarship Fund, the most money ever raised at this event. This annual fundraiser benefits the Tommy Goldsby Scholarship for Concurrently Enrolled Students. That scholarship, created in 2001, allows our area's eleventh- and twelfth-grade high school students to receive both high school and college credit, tuition free, in classes offered at Arkansas State University Mid-South, and allows the College to provide these concurrent classes without discounting tuition.

Regional Transportation Plan

ASU Mid-South's Chancellor, Dr. Debra West, was recently appointed by the West Memphis Area Metropolitan Planning Organization to serve as a member of the Technical Committee that is conducting work to inform the 2024 Metropolitan Transportation Plan. The focus of the plan includes existing roads, new roads, bicycle lanes, safe streets, traffic jam relief, and cleaner air for Crittenden County and the cities of West Memphis, Marion, and Sunset. The purpose of this committee is to help shape future policies for efficient and safe transportation mobility in the region.

Memphis Business Journal Women Who Lead Recognition

On March 28, ASU Mid-South Chancellor, Dr. Debra West, was recognized as a member of the *Memphis Business Journal's* 2024 Class of Women Who Lead in Education. 2024 Men of Color Conference

On April 26, ASU Mid-South hosted its annual Men of Color Conference. Funded by the U.S. Department of Education's Predominantly Black Institution (PBI) Grant Initiative, this annual conference is designed to cultivate a community of scholars, who are prepared to excel academically, contribute meaningfully to their respective fields, and positively impact society.

While open to everyone, this year's conference specifically targeted young men of color interested in pursuing studies in Science, Technology, Engineering, Arts, and Mathematics (STEAM) fields. It was facilitated by Deeneaus Polk, a graduate of Mississippi Gulf Coast Community College, Ole Miss, and the Harvard Kennedy School. A former Coca-Cola, Fulbright, Croft Institute, and Presidential Scholar, Dee is currently employed by the U.S. Department of Commerce as an Economic Recovery Corps Fellow.

Through a series of speakers, panel discussions, and networking opportunities, the conference addressed the unique challenges faced by men of color in higher education and STEAM industries. Session topics included *Discovering the Soundtrack to Your Community*, with Offbeat Records Owner Phillip Rollins; *Your Blueprint, Your Grind*, with Cybersecurity Expert Rod Singleton; and *Empowering Voices: Men of Color Heard Around the World*, which was a Zoom panel discussion led by model Lucas Lyle, actor Rob Marshall, and musician Marlin Williford, all of whom live and work in Germany. The keynote speaker for the conference was Dr. Corey Wiggins, Federal Co-Chair of the Delta Regional Authority.

Chancellor's Report Arkansas State University Three Rivers

Arkansas State UniversityThree Rivers Adult Education

Arkansas State University Three Rivers Adult Education recently submitted its Request for Proposal of Funds (RPF). The application was approved and guaranteed funding for the next four years.

Malvern Campus Career Center and Workforce Development Update

Our Workforce Development's partnership with West Fraser Qualified Millwright and Electrician programs continues. We are currently conducting the ASUTR Professional Development Academy for the West Fraser mills in Leola, AR, Joyce, LA, Angelina, TX, and Henderson, TX; Xpress Boats and Veranda Luxury Pontoons; the Clark County Workforce Training Group (Siplast, South Central Electric Cooperative/South Central Connect, Drumco, Samantha's Café and Bakery, Arkadelphia Alliance), RBD Construction, Jasper Lumber Co., Jasper, AL; and Southeastern Timber Co., Akermany, MS (one class). ASUTR Workforce facilitated Excel training for Hostess Brands in Arkadelphia. We conducted Level 1, Level 2, and Level 3 Excel Training.

Student Affairs and Retention

Our registrar reports that 564 students earned 614 degrees and certificates in May. We also received a \$198,464 grant to fund Career Coaches at Benton Junior High School and Benton High School, Malvern High School, and Sheridan High School, as well as the College Learning Advocate at ASU Three Rivers.

The Early Alert program offers assistance to students with attendance, behavioral, or academic needs. Our College Learning Advocate, Ms. Kimberly Stecker, received 30 Early Alerts with 32 students needing intervention. She made in-person and e-mail contacts to help those struggling with academic progress and held 28 in-person student meetings, 7 in-person meetings with faculty members, and 2 in-person meetings with student groups on our campus. The TRiO report total for Computer Lab and Academic Tutoring contacts for January 18, 2024, to April 3, 2024, was 160.6 total hours.

A team of ASUTR administrators and directors met with local high school counselors and administrators for "Let's Talk" sessions to share program, scholarship, and support offerings related to their specific student populations. Counselors have responded positively by calling and emailing for more information and encouraging and assisting students to apply to ASUTR for Fall 2024 enrollment. These meetings were held in conjunction with our informational assemblies and ASUTR T-shirt distributions for Juniors in the following districts: Malvern, Magnet cove, Glen Rose, Bismarck, Poyen, and Ouachita. The team was comprised of Dr. Rook, Vice-Chancellor for Student Affairs Carla Crutchfield, Malvern Career Center Director John Bratton, Director of Admissions Keesha Johnson, Vice-Chancellor for Academic Affairs Pat Simms, Associate Vice-Chancellor for College Advancement Amber Childers and Associate Vice-Chancellor for Student Retention Vergina Smith.

Financial Aid

The 2024-25 Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) required a new Banner financial aid setup. Testing is nearing completion; training is ongoing for aid processing. In response to multiple errors created by the legally mandated new FAFSA, the US Department of Education has provided free professional assistance from Blue Icon, the National Association of Student Financial Aid Administrators consulting service for higher education institutions administering federal student aid. ASUThree Rivers will have a Blue IconTechnical Consultant and two Blue Icon Processing Consultants to assist us through June 30.

Finance and Administration

Construction on Phase IV of the RitzTheatre renovation project by Clark Contractors began in April.

College Advancement and Community Outreach

College Advancement streamlined internal communication with employees by combining the employee newsletter and the Monday Morning Minute videos sent to employees via email. This weekly email includes updated links to the athletic schedules, upcoming events, and café specials for the week. Monthly links are included to show employees celebrating Years of Service milestones and the birthdays for each month. The video is uploaded every Sunday evening and scheduled to be delivered to employee mailboxes at 8:00 a.m. every Monday. These

videos and links directly respond to our campus-wide survey indicating communication preferences.

Associate Vice Chancellor of Student Retention, Ms. Vergina Smith, and the C.A.R.E. (Campus Assessment Response and Education) team met with U.S. Secret Service Special Agent Bryant on April 11 to discuss implementing the "Enhancing School Safety" program. The C.A.R.E. Team provides support for all students, faculty, and staff at Arkansas State University Three Rivers. The team offers counseling services, addresses food insecurities, and creates spaces to improve the well-being of our entire campus community.

Academic Affairs

The College currently offers an Associate of Applied Science in Accounting and an Associate of Applied Science in Management. The Associate of Applied Science in General Business streamlines the existing business degree plans by developing a business core with specializations through directed electives in management, accounting, marketing, and data. Alternatively, students can obtain a more generalized business degree by taking a variety of business electives.

The Associate of Applied Science in General Business degree was unanimously approved by the ASUTR Board of Visitors on May 7, 2024.

Chancellor's Report Henderson State University

Heart Start Registration Days

Henderson State University's Heart Start summer registration days for freshman is trending now at about 7% above last year's numbers. Many personal recruiting methods have been implemented including handwritten notes, phone calls, personal meetings with recruits and t-shirt days with prospective students.

Transition to Colleges Well Received

On May 22, 2022, the Board of Trustees approved HSU's recommendation to restructure the University Colleges into four Learning Communities:

- (1) Business, Innovation, and Entrepreneurship; (2) Applied Professional Science and Technology;
- (3) Health, Education, and Social Sustainability; and (4) Arts and Humanities.

Based on input from HSU faculty, staff, students, and alumni, Chancellor Berry proposed re-establishing the academic units into four University Colleges, as follows:

- 1. Teachers College
- 2. College of Performing Arts and Social Sciences
- 3. College of Aviation, Science, and Nursing
- 4. College of Business

The transition to Colleges has gone smoothly and has received thorough support on campus.

Acquisition of Golf Cart for Campus Tours

Southern Bancorp has donated the funding for a six-seat golf cart for campus tours. We are grateful for their generous contribution to making campus tours more comfortable.

Insurance Settlement

An insurance settlement between HSU and the Arkansas Insurance Department resulted in \$850,000 to be used to restore the University's largest chemistry lab.

Sale of Property

Appraisals and surveys have been scheduled for properties approved to be sold by HSU. These properties include Newberry Hall, Hickory House, Smith-Garner House, Ramsauer House, and two vacant lots that are not contiguous to campus.

Nursing Program Grant

Henderson's Nursing Program received a grant of \$761,200 from the Arkansas Department of Workforce Skills Development to expand nursing education. The grant will cover upgrades in equipment and the hiring of additional nursing faculty.

Cabe Foundation Grant

The Cabe Foundation awarded HSU \$100,000 to upgrade and enhance our recruitment efforts for 2024-2025.

ACADEMIC AFFAIRS

Criminal Justice to Return

HSU has announced that a bachelor of arts in criminal justice is returning as a major degree. It is offering the degree due to two key factors—available career opportunities and student interest in the program. The search for a professor and revising curriculum has begun.

HSU and NYIT

The NYIT College of Osteopathic Medicine is a medical school that operates on the University's Jonesboro campus. Its mission is to train doctors to help fulfill the increasing need for physicians in Arkansas and the greater Mississippi Delta region. The medical school actively leads a number of health outreach and health education events throughout the state and region. NYIT and Henderson will provide preferred admission to NYIT for 10 prospective HSU freshmen. A joint committee will select the 10 freshmen, and if students meet the requirements, upon graduation they will matriculate into the medical school.

Arkansas Aviation Academy

Henderson's Department of Aviation is Arkansas's only university program that offers a four-year bachelor of science degree specifically in aviation. It seeks to provide a quality, safe, and professional aviation program that will meet or exceed the FAA standards in preparing our students for careers in the aviation industry.

Education Specialist

Henderson submitted a Letter of Notification (LON) to the AOHE to add a Special Education Supervisor option to the Education Specialist degree in Curriculum Leadership.

25 Letters of Notification

HSU submitted 25 Letters of Notification to the ADHE to revise existing academic programs and the new academic restructure for approval at the July ADHE Coordinating Board meeting.

Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) with the Bowen School of Law

The Bowen School of Law and HSU have signed an MOU to create a partnership to begin a preferred admissions program offering qualified students, who attend Henderson, a direct path to law school at the Bowen School of Law. This is part of their Pathway Program.

Biology – HSU Students and Faculty

A contingent of four HSU students and their faculty mentors, Drs. Brett Serviss and Renn Tumlison, presented their research at the annual meeting of the Arkansas Academy of Science, held this year at UA-Fort Smith on April 5-6. HSU Biology students, Zoie Autrey, Michael Brotherton, Lydia Serviss, and Tiffany Taylor delivered the results of their research to a scientific academic forum.

NYIT Population Health Course

The first NYIT Population Health Course, taught by NYIT faculty, was completed on Henderson's campus this year with over 30 students enrolled.

NYIT Project H.E.A.R.T. Camp

The NYIT Project H.E.A.R.T Camp, to be hosted on Henderson's campus, is scheduled for June 6-9, 2024.

Digital Media Camp/Band Camp - June

A Digital Media Camp is scheduled for June 25-28.

Special Ed Endorsement

Henderson was awarded the Special Education Endorsement grant, bringing in 60 graduate students.

ESOL Grant

Henderson was awarded ESOL grant, bringing in 75 graduate students.
