BOARD OF TRUSTEES

The Trustees of Arkansas State University serve as a board of management and control of Arkansas State University campuses in Jonesboro, Beebe, Mountain Home, Newport, Mid-South and Heber Springs; degree centers of the university at sites in Blytheville and Forrest City; and other academic programs throughout the state.

In this capacity, the Trustees hire the Arkansas State University president to serve as the Chief Executive Officer, approve the curriculum of the institution, annually approve an operating budget, establish policies for the efficient operation of the institution, and approve those matters which require participation of the governing board of the University. Trustees' duties include: appointing, supporting, and assessing the performance of the president; maintaining the clarity of the mission of Arkansas State University; approving long-range plans; approving the educational program; ensuring the wellbeing of the students, faculty and staff; ensuring strong financial management; approving significant faculty and staff appointments and dismissals; ensuring adequate resources for quality programs; preserving institutional autonomy; interpreting the campus to the community; and interpreting the needs of society to the campus.

The governor of Arkansas appoints members of the Board of Trustees for a period of five years. The Senate of the General Assembly must confirm each appointment.

Arkansas State University Mission Statement:

Arkansas State University educates leaders, enhances intellectual growth and enriches lives.

Arkansas State University's main campus in Jonesboro is located in Northeast Arkansas. Jonesboro is the fifth largest populace city in the state and has a trade, cultural and medical center for a market area of more than a half million people.

HISTORY

Arkansas State University (A-State) was established in 1909 as a state agriculture school. The institution opened as a vocational high school in 1910 and changed to State Agricultural and Mechanical College in 1925. Authority to extend the curriculum, offer senior college work and grant degrees was given to the institution by the legislature in 1925. Senior college work was initiated in 1930, and the first bachelor's degrees were granted in 1931. In 1933, the legislature changed the name of the college to Arkansas State College. Master's degree graduate programs were initiated in 1955 and Doctorate degree programs were added in 1999. Arkansas State College was granted university status in January 1967.

Since 1909, the institution that evolved into A-State has been served by thirteen presidents/chancellors.

HISTORY

As the oldest two-year college in the state, ASU-Beebe has paved the way in making a quality education affordable and attainable for Central Arkansas students. In 1927, ASU-Beebe was founded as Junior Agricultural School of Central Arkansas after Beebe citizens donated 300 acres of land to start the school. In 1931, the name was changed to Junior Agricultural College of Central Arkansas, and a college curriculum was established. The college has been affiliated with the Arkansas State University System since 1955.

HISTORY

In 1991, the Arkansas General Assembly created technical colleges from the Baxter County Vocational-Technical Center and the North Arkansas Community/Technical College Center in Mountain Home. Mountain Home Technical College was established on July 1, 1991. In 1992, the Mountain Home Technical College agreed to seek affiliation with Arkansas State University to form a sister campus. On July 1, 1993, Mountain Home Technical College became Arkansas State University Mountain Home Technical College.

Arkansas State University-Mountain Home (ASUMH) was established on July 1, 1995 due to the commitment of the residents of Baxter County and the cooperation of the Department of Higher Education and Arkansas State University in Jonesboro.

ASUMH has an open door admissions policy. This policy is designed to enhance access to educational opportunities. Standards of quality are maintained and students are required to remove deficiencies before entering certain programs or courses.

Nestled in the beautiful Ozark Mountains, 156 miles north of Little Rock, the environment at ASUMH encourages free expression, leadership and innovation. Small class size means personal attention and support from instructors. Additionally, the construction of a new campus accommodating 1,200 students offers an even more appealing setting for students to pursue higher education.

PROGRAMS OF STUDY

An Associate of Arts is offered for those students needing maximum flexibility in the selection of a course of study to meet individual employment and educational needs. It can be designed to meet the General Education requirements for those individuals planning to transfer to a four-year institution in order to complete a bachelor's degree. Associates of Applied Science are offered in Crime Scene Investigation, Criminal Justice, Funeral Science, Information Systems Technology, Law Enforcement Administration, Management, Nursing, Paramedic Technology, Respiratory Care and Welding Technology. Master's degrees are offered in Business Administration, Curriculum and Instruction, and Educational Leadership.

HISTORY

Arkansas State University-Newport (ASUN) has been in continuous operation since August 1975. Prior to being named ASU-Newport, the campus was known as White River Vocational Technical School. In 1991, the Arkansas Legislature passed Act 1244 which merged White River Vocational Technical School with ASU-Beebe. In 1992, it became ASU-Beebe/Newport and in 1997 became ASU-Newport. The 83rd General Assembly of the Arkansas Legislature passed Act 297 into law on February 19. 2001, creating a separate budget appropriation for ASUN effective July 1, 2001. The Higher Learning Commission of the North Central Accreditation Association of Colleges and Schools (NCA) granted the college initial accreditation for stand-alone status for five years in August 2002. In April 2007, the college received ten year accreditation status from the NCA. In March 2001, the state legislature approved the merger of Delta Technical Institute with Arkansas State University to produce the ASU Technical Center (ASUTC). In 2008, ASUTC was aligned with ASUN.

PROGRAMS OF STUDY

Programs and services are designed to assist students (both traditional and nontraditional) in determining and achieving their educational, personal and career goals.

These programs and services include associate degrees, certificates, continuing education, workforce development, adult education, ESL and opportunities through the Career Pathways program.

The college offers transfer degree programs, including an online degree (AA in Liberal Arts), an AA degree in Teaching (including Middle School and P-4 grade options) and Computer Information Systems, applied science degrees (including RN and General Technology with an emphasis in such areas as High Voltage Lineman Technology), technical certificates in such areas as Practical Nursing, Business Technology, High Voltage Lineman Technology, and Diesel Mechanics and certificates of proficiency in such diverse areas as CNA and Truck Driver Training (the largest commercial driver training program in the state).

Arkansas State University Mid-South Mission Statement:

To meet these needs, the College provides quality academic and support programs, personnel, technology, administrative services, and facilities necessary to respond in a timely and effective manner.

HISTORY

The evolution of ASU Mid-South began in 1991 following the Arkansas Legislature's approval of Act 1244. The legislation provided for the conversion of fourteen of Arkansas' vocational-technical schools into technical colleges, branches of four-year institutions, or community colleges with the additional support of a local millage. Ten "vo-techs," including Mid-South, accepted the conversion challenge.

The decision could easily be described as a "leap of faith," considering the early history of the institution. In operation since 1979, the school experienced little growth or support during its first 12 years of existence. At the time of its conversion to a technical college, Mid-South served fewer than 100 students annually and offered primarily adult education classes, truck driver training, practical nursing, and data processing/clerical support courses.

Section 22 of Act 1244 allowed newly-formed technical colleges to convert to community colleges with the passage of a local millage and approval of the State Board of Higher Education. Mid-South became the only vocational technical school to take this additional step. The Board of Trustees considered conversion to a community college essential to address the weak economy, unemployment, and alarmingly low college-attendance rate in Crittenden County. The State Board of Higher Education approved the application for conversion on October 23, 1992. A steering committee proposed a county-wide levy of four mills, a recommendation ratified by the Mid-South Technical College Board of Trustees. The voters of Crit-

tenden County put their stamp of approval on the effort with overwhelming support on February 16, 1993. Later that year, the State Board of Higher Education granted the College authority to offer its first degree.

PROGRAMS OF STUDY

ASU Mid-South offers degree and certificate programs to meet student and community needs. Program courses address general education knowledge as well as behaviors needed for good citizenship and successful careers.

Programs offered are Aviation Technology, Business, Diesel Technology, Digital Media, Emergency Tech, General Education, Hospitality, Information Technology, Machine Technology, Mechatronics, Medical Assistant, Nursing Assistant, Process Control, Respiratory Therapy, Teaching, and Welding Technology.

Southern Regional Education Board (SREB) & Carnegie Foundation

SREB CLASSIFICATIONS

The SREB system for categorizing postsecondary education institutions is based upon a number of factors relevant to determining resource requirements. Differences in institutional size (number of degrees), role (types of degrees), breadth of program offerings (number of program areas in which degrees are granted), and comprehensiveness (distribution of degrees across program areas) are the factors upon which institutions are classified.

Institutions are assigned to categories for a report year using the previous academic year's data on program completions. To keep the statistical comparison groups relatively stable over time and to assure that institutions change categories only when their measures on a criterion are relatively stable, institutions change categories when they meet the criterion for another category for the third consecutive year.

- ◆Four-Year 1: Institutions awarding at least 100 doctoral degrees distributed among at least 10 CIP categories (2-digit classification) with no more than 50 percent in any one category. (University of Arkansas-Fayetteville)
- ◆Four-Year 2: Institutions awarding at least 30 doctoral degrees distributed among at least 5 CIP categories.
- ◆ Four-Year 3: Institutions awarding at least 100 master's, education specialist, post-master's, or doctoral degrees with master's, education specialist, and post-master's degrees distributed among at least 10 CIP categories. (Arkansas State University, University of Arkansas-Little Rock, University of Central Arkansas)
- ◆ Two-Year 2: Institutions awarding associate degrees and offering college transfer courses with FTE enrollment of between 2,000 and 4,999. (Arkansas State University-Beebe)
- ◆ Two-Year 3: Institutions awarding associate degrees and offering college transfer courses with FTE enrollment of less than 2,000. (Arkansas State University-Mountain Home, Arkansas State University-Newport and Arkansas State University Mid-South)

CARNEGIE CLASSIFICATION

The Carnegie Commission developed a classification of colleges and universities to support its program of research and policy analysis. With the 2005 revision, the single classification was replaced by a set of multiple, parallel classifications. They are organized around three fundamental questions: what is taught (*Undergraduate & Graduate Instructional Programs*), who are the students (*Enrollment Profile & Undergraduate Profile*), and what is the setting (*Size & Setting*).

A-State's Classifications by Category*

Basic: (Master's L - Master's Colleges and Universities with larger programs) Generally includes institutions that award at least 50 master's degrees and fewer than 20 doctoral degrees per year.

Size & Setting: (M4/NR - Medium four-year, primarily nonresidential) Fall FTE enrollment of 3,000 - 9,999 degree seeking students at these bachelor's degree granting institutions. Fewer than 25% of degree-seeking undergraduates live on campus.

Enrollment Profile: (HU - High undergraduate) Fall enrollment data show both undergraduate and graduate/professional students, with the graduate enrollment accounting for less than 10-24% of FTE enrollment.

Undergraduate Profile: (FT4/I - Full-time four-year, inclusive) Fall enrollment data show at least 80% of undergraduates enrolled full-time at these bachelor's degree granting institutions. At these institutions test scores indicate that they extend educational opportunity to a wide range of students with respect to academic preparation and achievement.

Undergraduate Instructional Program: (Prof+A&S/SGC - Professions plus arts & sciences, some graduate coexistence) 60-79% of bachelor's degree majors were in professional fields, and graduate degrees were observed in some of the fields corresponding to undergraduate majors (but less than half).

Graduate Instructional Program: (Doc/Prof - Doctoral, professional dominant) These institutions award doctoral degrees in a range of fields, with the plurality in the professions other than engineering (such as education, health professions, public policy, or social work).



Geographic Origin of Total Enrollment










Geographic Origin of International Students





Academic Preparation - Admission Test Scores











Academic Progress - Retention Rates







FALL 2013 TO FALL 2014 ONE-YEAR RETENTION RATES (AR Public 4-Yr. Institutions)





AFFILIATION:

Arkansas State University fields sixteen sports - seven for men and nine for women - in NCAA Division I. ASU's football program competes in NCAA Football Bowl Subdivision (FBS).

CONFERENCE:

A-State belongs to the Sun Belt Conference (SBC) in all sports with the exception of bowling.

ACADEMICS:

- ♦ The Red Wolves Leadership Academy (RWLA) again achieved its goal of 100% job placement for all the athletics department's student-athletes upon graduation.
- ♦ The RWLA stengthened with a new study abroad componenet added to foster global awareness, which is often cited by employers as a positive attribute they seek. This past summer, A-State student-athletes took part in the first study abroad program offered by any university and their athletics department in the nation. The program goes hand-in-hand with the RWLA's primary purpose to obtain 100 percent job placement for all its graduating student-athletes.
- ◆ Forty-five student-athletes earned their college degree from Arkansas State University.
- ♦ The atletics department achieved a school record 3.047 all department GPA in the fall of 2014, the same semester a school record 208 student-athletes were named to the Athletics Director's Honor Roll.
- ♦ A-State posted its best ever department wide Academic Progress Rate (APR) score according to the latest data, which also saw the football program show the largest margin of improvement in the nation among FBS programs as it jumped from a 902 to a 964.
- ◆The NCAA issued a Public Recognition Award to a school record five A-State programs for posting an APR multiyear score that ranks among the nation's top 10% in their respective sport. The Red Wolves had the most teams recognized among all Sun Belt Conference and NCAA Division I institutions in the state of Arkansas.

COMPETITIVE PERFORMANCE:

- ♦ The Men's Indoor Track and Field Team was the 2015 Sun Belt Conference (SBC) Champions.
- ◆The Women's Outdoor Tack and Field Team was the 2015 SBC champions.
- ♦ The Women's athletics program finished #56 in the nation in the Capital One Cup standings its second highest ranking in school history.
- ♦ The football team played in a bowl game for the fourth consecutive season.
- ◆The Women's bowling team made its eighth consecutive appearance in the NCAA Championships.
- ◆The Women's basketball team won 23 games, including 21 during the regular season to tie a school record, and played in the postseaon WNIT. The Red Wolves also played in the SBC Conference Tournatment championship game in back-to-back seasons for the first time in school history.
- ♦ Nine student-athletes from six different sports achieved All-America status.
- ◆ Aundrea Gamble was named the SBC Women's Basketball Player of the Year, volleyball player Markie Schaedig was named the conference's Defensive Player of the Year, Roelf Pienaar was selected as the SBC's Most Outstanding Indoor Field Performer and Jim Patchell was named the league's Indoor Track and Field Coach of the Year.
- ♦ Markie Schaedig bacame the first player in school history to be named an American Volleyball Coaches All-American.
- ◆Tamara Slijepcevic became the first Women's tennis player in school history to be named to four consecutive All-SBC teams.
- ◆Fourteen football seniors completed their career with 35 victories, the most in A-State's FBS history. Those 14 seniors were also the first players in school history to ever compete in a bowl game all four years of their career.
- ♦ The baseball team had four players taken in the 2015 Major League Baseball Draft, including David Owen (19th round), Stuart Levy (27th round), Chandler Hawkins (33rd round) and Zach George (33rd round).
- ◆ Zach George was named third team All-America by both Louisville Slugger and ABCA/Rawlings.
- ♦ The Men's track and field earned a U.S. Track & Field Cross Country Association NCAA Divison I national outdoor top-25 ranking, the highest in school history.

♦ Junior Women's basketball player Aundrea Gamble and sophomore track and field athlete Roelf Pienaar were named the Terry Gwin Award winners. Senior Women's basketball palyer Hanna Qedan and senor football player Kenny Rains were named the Scott and Kay Dawson Award winners.

SPECIAL EVENT, TICKETS, REVENUE & FACITILITIES

- ♦A-State set a school record for football season ticket sales and season ticket revenues.
- ◆A-State achieved its highest ever spot in the Collegiate Licensing Company's (CLC) rankings.
- ♦A-State had a 103% increase in the Red Wolves Foundation total revenue earned (2012-2014).
- ◆The athletics department's operaing budget has surpassed \$20 million.
- ♦ Including 2014-2015, the athletics department is in the process of completing and has committed a combined \$60 in construction and facility renovations since 2012.
- ♦The Red Wolves Foundation received a \$5 million gift commitment from alumnus Johnny Allison, which is the largest donation in A-State Athletics history.
- ◆ A-State completed a 3,200 square foot state-of-the-art Women's soccer and Women's tennis facility, which houses both squads' locker rooms, traing rooms, offices and more.
- ♦ A-State began its "Centennial Expansion" construction project to the stadium's press box and west-side concourse. The entire project covers 40,000 square feet.






FULL-TIME INSTRUCTIONAL FACULTY BY RANK & GENDER





The Dean B. Ellis Library, centrally located in an eight-story building, is an educational center for the A-State community. The Library of Congress classification system is used to organize print books and media, and web-based catalogs provide access to the library's physical and online collections. Fifteen professional librarians and nineteen support staff provide a variety of library services to meet the information needs of the university, including off-campus access to web-based academic resources and acquiring materials in a wide range of formats. Reference and instruction librarians assist users in locating information and in using the library. The library also offers an active library and research skills instruction program which reaches numerous university classes. The library provides access to hundreds of online resource and data services, including more than 350,000 E-Books, via links on the library's web site. Materials that are not contained in the library's collection are accessible by interlibrary loan through the OCLC network.












Jonesboro Campus - Fiscal Year 2015

The Centennial Stadium Expansion project included an overhaul to the stadium press box. The face of the stadium was redesigned to include 42 loge boxes, 20 suites and 300 club seats. The suites average 433 square feet.

Construction was completed on the Humanities and Social Sciences Building in 2015. The four-story structure has 123,832 square feet of space with 29 state-of-the-art classrooms, two 90-seat auditoriums, six computer and multimedia labs, eight seminar rooms, faculty offices and departmental suites. The building is among the five largest instructional buildings on an Arkansas college or university campus. Any student who attends A-State will attend classes in this building. It's a modern, safe facility to replace Wilson Hall.
